

2021/2022 Committees: President Elect Craig : There are still a few people that need to send in their committee preferences. Please help Craig by returning these documents asap.



Vulnerable Person's Policy: Carol Graham: At the May 20th meeting President Penny announced the Board decision to pass the revised "Protecting Vulnerable People Policy" after much debate. She noted the debate regarding the Policy (based primarily on the new District Policy), was because it was considered an overreach in many areas and challenging for Clubs to implement, maintain and administer. It does result in a centralization of control with the District. The decision to pass it was to ensure our continuing coverage by District liability insurance associated with Committees and programs dealing with the vulnerable population.





Current Statistics

We currently have 66 students that are in or have been in the program, since it's inception. The following is a breakdown of our current situation:

Junior High:	8 students
Senior High:	12 students
Post-Secondary:	16 students
Graduates:	21 students
Taking a year off:	2 students
Left the program:	7 students

Total: 66 students

We currently have approximately 4.6 million dollars in the investment fund, which is more than enough to continue to finance the program.

Since the beginning of our actual funding of the program in 2007, the costs of this program have totalled \$967 000. These costs have essentially been funded by a combination of proceeds from the 19 SIS Golf Tournaments, donations from members of our club and investment returns earned from those proceeds.

Of the 39 students who have graduated or are currently enrolled at a post secondary institution, 10 of them, or 26% have essentially consumed their full \$30 000 scholarship.

Ernie Yaskowich: SIS Golf Tournament Update:

It's with great pleasure and a big sigh of relief that I can tell you today that the 2021 SIS Golf Tournament is a go for July 22nd. The golf tournament committee has been working very hard since the beginning of the year to make this years event a very special one with the theme being "A Celebration of Success".

The uncertainty of the AHS covid 19 restrictions over the last few months and where we would be and what we could do or couldn't do certainly made for some anxious planning moments. However that being said and done we feel we'll be able to provide a covid safe environment for all participants and that a good time will be had by all.

I would like to thank all of our many Sponsors and Donors. Your ongoing support over the last 20 years has been nothing short of incredible, it has helped many kids fulfill their educational goals. Furthermore your generous support has helped the SIS program reach the self sustainability goal ensuring perpetuity for the program. My hat's off to all of you.

This year we're implementing some exciting changes to the tournament which we expect will improve the overall level of enjoyment and the pace of play.

There will be 2 sets of tees for the men, 0 to 14 hdcp will play from the blue tee box and 15+ will play from the bronze. The ladies will play from the gold tee box.

All 4 par 3's will once again be hole in one opportunities, however the distance tee to pin will be reduced to 150 yds for the men and 125 for the ladies. The hole in one prize will be \$50,000 cash, resettable offering 2 possible payouts per hole.

For the Million \$ shootout we will be qualifying 8 golfers with the 2 KP's from each par 3 participating. All contestants will be shooting from 165 yards.

The first tee gift has been replaced by a special one time scholarship which will be presented to one of the SIS grads to help with their ongoing studies. The format for the rest of the tournament will be the same as in years past. Each hole will have a skill prize and the top 6 teams will place in the prize money.

Another new aspect is the introduction of an "Online Auction" where there are approximately 42 items listed. The online auction and the donation link allows everyone the opportunity to participate in supporting the kids in the SIS program. The online auction will open July 12 at 11:00 AM and will close July 22nd @ 5:00 PM.



On the website you will also find the list of very exciting live auction items as well as the “Make Rotary an Offer” listing.. There are some incredible world class vacations offered as well as the generous donation by the winner of the 2019 dream home of the complete playground that came with the dream home package. All you grandparents should take a look as this item would make a great gift for some lucky grandkids.

The website is where you will find the golfer registration link. Open the website, go to the bottom of the page and click on the register button, it will take you into Event Caddy where all you have to do is follow the prompts. As of yesterday we had 10 golfer spots still available, you have to register and pay online to guarantee your spot. If you're a Sponsor and are entitled to golfer spots you will have to email Spencer Tonkinson with your list of golfers c/w names email addresses and hdcp or index. If as a Sponsor you wish to add additional golfers you will have to register them and pay for same through Event Caddy.

In closing we're very hopeful that Alberta enters into stage 3 late June or early July which will facilitate the hosting of a “Normal” golf tournament. Take care, Stay Healthy

Stan Cichon: SIS Student Selection

The process begins in September/ October of the year with the SIS Chairperson **Bill Sumner** making a school visitation to our two sponsored schools. This presents an opportunity to meet with the two school administrations to update and establish the timelines and procedures required for our scholarship program.



In December our club selection committee meets to review program updates, application form and timelines for the school visitations. January has the entire selection committee attending an information session for all the grade 6 students and their teachers at each of the two schools. This is a session where Rotary and the mechanics of the program are shared. It also includes a Q&A portion.

Application forms are presented to the students. Their homeroom teachers are encouraged to assist the students by way of an academic exercise in the Language Arts curriculum. The application form is very detailed allowing the committee to gain much information about the applicant including the financial need. All committee members are privy to and review every applicant to create a short list of usually 4 girls and 3 boys for each of the two schools. There are about seven main areas of interest we focus upon:

- Attendance and marks per subject area
- Students' current goals regarding career and education
- Community involvement with the emphasis on their volunteerism
- Extracurricular student involvement
- Parental statement of their assistance in the child's education.
- Teachers' input
- Student's interest in the program.

March is the deadline for the program application. The application forms are then picked up and distributed to the two schools Rotary Team members.

After the individual application review by our Rotarians, the Rotary teams discuss the applications together to agree on the six or seven students from each school they will interview. The school is then asked to schedule the interview on a fixed date in April with the student. Their parent or parents will be in attendance. Interviews generally begin at about 3:00pm and finish around 7:00 pm. A very honest and confidential discussion amongst the interview team follows with a girl and a boy chosen from each school. The deliberation is usually an hour in duration. The Chairperson of the SIS selection committee calls all the interviewed candidates and informs them of our decision. We suggest the school give recognition to the individuals at their yearend awards day. Our club President and our SIS chairman attend these two sessions and present each runner up, those who have been interviewed, with a \$100.00 prize. The successful candidate is then matched with a Rotary mentor and introduced at the yearend Rotary Stay In School luncheon held in the month of May.

Covid regulations since the start of 2020 have dictated much of what we as a committee were able to do. Fortunately, the Rotary teams had already short-listed applicants from both schools. However, we were unable to conduct personal face to face interviews with any of the candidates. Bill Sumner has done a great job in tracking down the selected candidates and we are hoping to conduct live interviews early in this coming school year to complete our 2019-2020 cycle.

Keith Bekker: Finance


Keith has been involved in SISP since the Yorkton Securities days and is currently with Richardson GMP, in charge of the endowment fund finances. The current financial commitment to enrolled students is \$1.2 million. With an expected fee escalation to \$8,000 from the current \$7,500/year, this is increased to \$1.28 million, and with a contingency plan to cover two extra years, it further increases to \$1.536 million. The operating fund stands at \$1.6 million, enough to cover all current obligations, and there is another \$3.0 million invested to cover future expenditures.



Earl Huson: Mentoring

Earl noted that we will need 4 new mentors in the fall to work with our new students. The mentor is a liaison between the student and their family with the SISP Committee. They are responsible for updating the Steering Committee on a regular basis. The focus continues on the academic process as part of the mentoring responsibility. Mentoring responsibilities include:


- To monitor scholastic progress of the student with copies of report cards and attendance records, etc. We must ensure that the student is keeping grades and attendance that aligns with the criteria required to stay in the Program.
- To establish a rapport with the student and their family, such that positive reinforcement of the student's progress is established and maintained.
- To offer assistance in the event of difficulties, always keeping the family unit in mind.
- To encourage the student to maintain a satisfactory level of achievement
- To present a bimonthly report of the student's progress to the Mentoring Committee
- To bring to light any issues that may impede the progress of the student and to offer advice and encouragement to address the situation.
- To ensure that the student and their family are aware that any decline in performance could and would result in the termination of that student from the Program



And, finally, to set and maintain a high standard of citizenship both for the students and their peers. A formal contract is entered into between the Student and their family and the Committee, outlining all responsibilities of both parties.

Bryan Targett: SIS History:

The Stay In School Program Committee began in 2000-2001 under the leadership of Gary Nazar. Rotary members were very concerned that the Club could be financially liable if the program was unsuccessful. A new program was developed under the leadership of Bill Cuthbert that was financially independent of the Club and actuarially sound. We began looking for funds.



Bonar Irving directed us to Yorkton Securities. Yorkton Securities under the leadership of Keith Bekker came aboard and donated \$25,000.00. This was matched by the Club.

It was decided to select two students, one from each of two schools suggested by the Calgary Board of Education. It took six years to raise funds before we had to fund a student. The Club tried a Golf Tournament to raise funds but that was marginally successful.

Keith Davis became the Golf Tournament Chair and decided to go big or go home. Keith obtained Ann McKenna of Supreme Windows as a major supporter. The Golf Tournament was a huge success due to the support from Club members and the general public and we haven't looked back.

Because of the success, we increased the number of students we were supporting to four and began choosing one boy and one girl from each school. In 2021 we reached our financial goal and the program is now financially independent and can operate in perpetuity




