
With that, Madam President Penny, I stand ready to assist you and your team.

Thanks President Chas. Fellow Rotarians and guests,



As most of you know, World Community Service has a mandate to manage the clubs donations to international projects. Our committee this Rotary year was made up of 13 members (shown in the slide) that met 8 times this last Rotary year, until our budget of \$115,000 was allocated to international projects. We accepted project proposals throughout the year and those proposals come from a variety of places but mostly they come from our members. Christine Kyte and I shared the chair duties this year and Jamie Moorhouse was our Board Director.

This year we were fortunate to have a significant budget of \$115,000. Thank you board members for displaying such confidence in the committee. The funds available to us were allocated to 20 projects in 14 different countries. We collaborated with 14 NGO's and 8 other Rotary clubs.

Let's get some of the statistics out of the way before we get to the stories.

The Rotary Foundation recognizes 6 areas of focus for any Global Grant type project and we attempt to follow these same guidelines in support of smaller non leveraged projects. This past year we supported projects in 4 of the 6 areas of focus.

The WCS committee tries to leverage funds from all possible sources but that usually depends on the size and nature of the project. An NGO might in their funding proposal to us commit to some form of matching via one of their other donors or perhaps in-kind. On larger projects financed with Global Grants, we are sometimes successful in getting other Alberta clubs to collaborate with us by contributing cash and/or District Designated Funds. We try to maintain good relations with other Alberta clubs and we will sometimes support a Global grant that they are leading. Quid Pro Quo!

For the last 5 years we were very fortunate to rely on government of Canada funds. Matching from The Rotary Foundation has been stable for the last 7 years but that is about to change, with both sources of funds no longer being available.

This table will give you some appreciation for what these changing rules for leveraging might mean.

Comparing what we raised through leveraging over the last 5 years to what the new rules would have meant over the same 5 years, you can appreciate that going forward Rotary Clubs will be doing much smaller and fewer projects. These revised rules will impact Rotary clubs in other Districts even more since almost all have much less access to District Designated Funds than we in District 5360 have. In fact these new rules will make projects using Global Grants rare in most Districts. Our District is most fortunate due to the Ev Mayhood bequest a few years ago which will allow our clubs to continue to do international projects but of a reduced value.

The Rotary Foundation limits clubs to 10 open grants which we have now reached, so our 3 applications not yet submitted will be "on-hold" till COVID allows our partner Rotary Clubs to finish their projects and give us some room. These new applications will each be approximately USD 30,000 smaller because of these new rules.

WORLD COMMUNITY SERVICE PRESENTATION



The WCS committee members have a wide range of connections with international NGOs but we also rely on our entire club membership for additional connections. There are 2 projects with registered NGOs that we supported after members recommended them. Not every mention by you, the membership, is taken up but we highly prefer to deal with organizations where we have a personal connection.

Coincidentally both of the registered NGOs are working in Malawi.

Not every NGO that we support is registered with Canada Revenue. In such cases we sign an agreement with the NGO that includes information required by Canada Revenue. Raksha Ascent, for example, was recommended to us by Nancy Spence but is not registered in Canada. It focuses on empowering Nepalese girls who have survived or are at risk of sexual assault and sex trafficking.

CORE Nepal is a registered Canadian charity run by a friend of Janet Matthews and supported by the club in Canmore. It gives marginalized groups the tools and skills to educate young children with a focus on girls.

Given the leveraging structure of Global Grants, our club has been fortunate to lead up to 3 grants a year. We also have the good fortune to support our neighbour clubs in their own Global grants, wither with cash or cash and DDF.

This past year, we supported Malawi Water's 2020 goal of constructing 480 biosand water filters. This Global Grant is between the Rotary Club of Calgary Centennial and Rotary Club of Limbe. The Canadian charity Malawi Water has good relations with the Limbe club and will be the implementer. With small foreign clubs, it can be advantageous to include a Cooperating organization that will actually do the work.

We collaborated with the RC of Calgary Chinook who are leading a Global grant with RC Islamabad Metropolitan. This Global Grant, via a Pakistan Hearing Clinic, will work to identify and support children with hearing loss to improve academic performance.

This year we allocated funds for four Global Grants to be led by members of our WCS. Because of the changing leveraging rules and the limitation of 10 open grants, we have had a lot of juggling to do. Calgary Centennial took one off our hands and will be leading it. Unfortunately these two shown are being delayed because of quarantine rules, the limit of 10 open grants and the changing leveraging rules.

The Rotary Club of Ipiales has done a large project with us before and this new pending project will provide 350 indigenous families living on small farms near the Ecuador border with safe water. The Ipiales Rotarians have a significant amount of skin in the game, contributing cash and their own District Designated Funds.

And **Christine** will speak on Kenya School Water Tank

In February 2020 **Jamie Moorhouse** and **Christine Kyte** utilized a District travel grant to travel to Kenya. The purpose of our trip was to complete a needs assessment for a community water tower project at Eating Stone Orphanage just outside Nairobi. A needs assessment is a requirement for a Global Grant. Eating Stone Orphanage is currently the home to 52 orphans, and Wisdom Academy School which operates at Eating Stone teaches an additional 150 students. The project will be in collaboration with the Rotary Club of Kikuyu and will provide water for the orphanage as well as 200 individuals in the surrounding community.

While we were there we spent quite a bit of time with **Dr. Cyprian Lumumba**, the owner and head educator at Eating Stone, as well as **District Governor Joseph Githengi** and the Rotary Club of Kikuyu in Nairobi. RC Kikuyu will be our international partners on this project.

Eating Stone was one of the organizations that our club supported last year with solar panels for their water tanks, and they recently worked with RC Grand Prairie to dig a bore hole. This bore hole will be the source of water for the water tower, which will then have a fill station for community members to access.

RC Kikuyu has done many water projects in the area, the centre picture is similar to what we will be building, but quite a bit larger. The picture on the right was another project at a primary school that combined rainwater collection with water pumped from a bore hole to fill the cistern, to then be distributed to the community.

These projects proceed slowly, but we hope to have this completed within a year or 18 months.

Michael Ruttan thanked **Bob** and **Christine** for their report and all the hard work this Committee does in identifying, assessing, accessing matching funds and executing their projects. Their dedication is appreciated.



Tribute to the Outgoing President: Sherry Austin, on behalf of PP Ron Prokosch, presented a tribute to outgoing President Chas.

President Chas, Fellow Rotarians, Special Guests: Thank you for the honour of recognizing our President for his dedication to our Club during his Presidency 2019-2020. Normally, the Past President would be providing this tribute. This Rotary year has been anything but normal.

Not long ago I was visiting Past President Ron and he asked me to help him with his presentation to recognize President Chas. We highlighted some major areas but I never saw the document he prepared. I will do my best to recall our discussion and fill in a few gaps.

President Chas, you have had a year like 'none other' in the history of our Rotary Club. It all started as planned with a wonderful Dream Home kick-off at Heritage Park amongst the falling rain and a record breaking Dream Home event. The fall saw our first 'Rock'em Sock'em Rotary Rib Fest' to raise funds for our club operations and it was a smashing success. During a field trip to Supreme Windows in October, you awarded CEO Ann MacKenna a Paul Harris Fellow for her nearly two decades of title support for our SIS Golf Tournament.

Each week meetings commenced with historical facts both old and new and were always filled with the laughter and good will of fellowship and friendship made all the more fun with our President's quips to delighted members. We really are quite irreverent. Hugs of happiness were commonplace and the table discussions rousing. You ensured our meetings were always available to all wherever one may have been on the planet thanks to weekly videos and the talents of two of our colleagues.

There were some major accomplishments during the year that will have a profound effect on our Club in perpetuity. With huge support from our membership our name was changed to the 'Rotary Club of Calgary at Stampede Park' to honour our 60+ year meeting location. President Chas was the first president to ever welcome us all with our new name. Shortly thereafter, we received great news from the Stampede that our beloved Rotary House would remain insitu for at least the next 8 -10 years and potentially beyond. Thank you, President Chas, you worked really hard to make this happen!

Our one million dollar, five year Legacy Project with the Stampede took shape with the naming of the bursary program that was to be used for students with economic challenges as the 'Rotary Accessibility Fund'. The restoration of the old 'Oliver House' was begun with a new Rotary name under development. Our President took every opportunity to promote our Club with the Stampede and ensure our relationship was solid and would continue to grow and flourish. Fundraising activities for the Calgary Rotary Clubs Foundation (CRCF) and the Rotary Foundation (RI) were supported and enthusiastically endorsed and promoted by our President at every chance he got. He even attended CRCF committee meetings to learn as much as he could about our local foundation.

A multi-year review of our Constitution and Bylaws was completed and ratified by our membership. The new 'Lifelong Membership' category was launched. A companion 'Policy Manual' is under development and the first 'Member Handbooks' were distributed online. President Chas never lost sight of the end game regarding our club governance. Through his leadership, a newly structured 'Communications Committee' became operational to ensure consistent branding of our image and consistent messaging to our members and the public. Strategic Planning continued to be an important element for moving our club forward in a coordinated manner. Growing our membership was emphasized and our club was rewarded with a significant boost in enthusiastic and talented new members.

Youth activities continued to flourish with an increased number of students taking advantage of short term youth exchanges. President Chas and his partner Terri have been strong supporters of our youth programs for many years. They even visited with past Exchange students during their International Convention in Germany.

Yes, the 2019-2020 Rotary year was growing into a most memorable one. Then, 'IT' happened.

The world was hit by a tiny but powerful virus that changed the way we live in a flash. All of a sudden there were no more opportunities for face to face interaction. Gone were our weekly meetings, our committee meetings, our fundraising activities, our social activities and most importantly gone was our ability to be with one another. One would have thought that things would collapse and that would be the end of our Rotary year.

But no, our fearless President was not going to allow an invisible invading enemy to force us into retreat. Together, with his trusty administrative partner Kathyann, his determination led to our very first Zoom meetings. His leadership kept our Club together and ensured that all members had access to club activities and to one another. He encouraged us to reach out to those who might be alone in the isolation created by COVID-19. He kept our social activities alive including the wine club, evening 'fun' events, and weekly business meetings. A new member was inducted online and a new scholarship was created for our students who completed their exchanges and named in the honour of Past President Ron Prokosch. President Chas delivered food created by our own Rotarian and used the opportunity to check on members to ensure they were doing well. He led by his actions and while his heart must have been heavy at times he never let us know.

No one does this job without support and our President had the strength and intellect of his wife Terri at every turn. They are an outstanding team that graced our Club for this past year when it seemed everything changed around us. President Chas, you have taken on challenges never seen before by any of your predecessors during the past 64 years. Your Rotary year, 2019-2020, will go down in our Club's history as one of challenge and triumph. We thank you from the depth of our hearts for your undying positive spirit and your amazing leadership through unprecedented times.

Changing of the Guard: In light of our current social distancing situation, a special video of the formal changing of the guard and passing of the gavel was presented. **PP Terry Allen**, on behalf of **PP Ron Prokosch**, presented outgoing **President Chas Filipski** with his PP pin and the traditional Rotary House print and ceremonial gavel. In turn **PP Chas** presented incoming **President Penny Leckie** with her President's pin and new gavel, noting that she was the right person at the right time to be taking over the reins. **President Penny** then presented her PE pin to **PE Craig Stokke**.

CRCF Cheque Presentation: **Neil Fraser** presented **President Penny** with the RCCSP proceeds from the Calgary Rotary Clubs Foundation, a cheque for \$221,000. He thanked **PP Sherry Austin** and **Pres Penny** for their service on CRCF, and welcomed **Jim Fitzowich** as the new Chairman of CRCF. He noted that the Club will receive over \$1 Million over the next 5 years from the Foundation, and **Penny** noted that the current cheque will be the only funds received by the Club in her year, so it is doubly important to us.



President Penny's Closing Remarks: At the end of a Rotary year, there are so many people to thank. However, in the interest of time, I will echo President Chas' comments and will focus my attention on Chas. Chas, I paid very close attention to what you said at the beginning of your year. I heard you say you wanted to **focus on Communications and Fellowship**.

You saw that in the constantly evolving world of social and other media, our Club requires a **Communications Committee** to support the Executive, the Club Members and other Committees. The messaging and imagery for all communications by our Club needs to be consistent and professional. Everyone knows the incredible value of a good reputation, how quickly it can be damaged and how long a damaged reputation can take to repair. Our Club cannot afford this risk, and the Communications Committee you created is there to oversee and mitigate this risk. The importance of a Communications Committee and consistency in branding became even more obvious and imperative during our Club's name change.

As incoming President, I have already reached out to the Communications Committee, more than once. I have received support and assistance from this tremendous committee. Sergeant-At-Arms: Brett Albers picked on **George Deegan** and **Jim Hutchens** for a game of personal knowledge.





You captained the team in our hockey best.


Meetings rolled on, the program was strong,




