### Sergeant at Arms: Keith Davis:

The first bicycle was invented in 1817 in Germany by German Baron Karl Von Drais. He called it his "Laufmaschine" and the English called it a "Draisine", after its maker. The Laufmaschine was a bit like a Fred Flintstone contraption. It had no pedals, chains or anything – you got on it and then propelled it forward with your feet on the ground. I think those people must have loved going downhill, but not so much going up. It wasn't until the 1860s, after many design changes, that people finally got the idea to take their feet off the ground and learn to balance on a bike, as well as various forms of pedalling it.



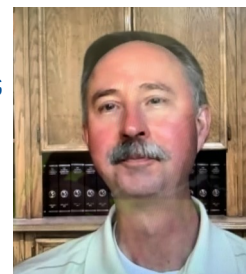
So here are a few questions that any knowledgeable bike rider should know the answers to:  
***Which country in the world has the highest ratio of bicycles to population?*** (Answer: the Netherlands, with 22.5 million bikes among a population of only 17 million).  
***Which country in the world has the most bicycles overall?*** (Answer: China, with 450,000 bikes).  
***How many working bicycles are currently in the World?*** (Answer: More than 1,000,000,000; that's 1 Billion).  
***To the end of this month how many new bikes will be built and delivered world-wide?*** (Answer: 63,000,000 will be built by June 30<sup>th</sup>. More than 100,000,000 new bicycles will be produced in all of 2021).  
***How many bicycles are currently in use in Canada?*** (Answer: 10,000,000 (that's 10 million), a large number of which are in the Calgary Police Service's bicycle impound lot).

**Calgary Rotary Clubs Foundation Chair : Jim Fitzowich:** As a Board Member on Calgary Rotary Clubs Foundation, Jim gave us an overview of the Foundation year to date. This month we will be hearing more from others on CRCF. Jim had some slides which are self explanatory. The other slides are somewhat sensitive and will only be on a restricted site.

In summary we have \$6.09 million in the Foundation which represents 10.34% of the Foundation's total \$59.0mm. President Penny asked Jim about the idea of an Investment Committee to oversee the Club's funds. Jim indicated that he had been exploring this with President-Elect Craig and something could be put together this fall. Please contact Jim if you have questions.

**Stay in School Golf Tournament:** Toby Oswald-Felker showed up in her golf attire as the tournament is a GO.

The Tournament has **121 paid for registrants** with **Only 23 spots left**. Today is Early Bird Prize day and with a pretty fancy high tech spin of the wheel, **ALAN HREHIRCHUK** won golf for 4 at Cottonwood.



**WORLD COMMUNITY SERVICE; SERVES us all:**

Our Club is extremely blessed and fortunate to have some very special people looking after our World Community Service committee. This committee is always very active, is a leader in the District in generating worthy projects, and is incredibly effective at multiplying funds from our Club into substantial amounts that make substantial impact around the globe. The more I know about this committee, the more impressed I am.



The only problem with this committee is its humility. They work quietly, are not wanting recognition and you have to push them to share accomplishments. My observation is that our Members are always impressed with what they hear from this committee, and would like to know more. So, I pushed them, and I think you will be so proud when you hear their presentation.

Bob Wiens: World Community Service has a mandate to manage the club's donations to international projects. Our committee this Rotary year was made up of 12 members (shown in the slide) that met 4 times this last Rotary year. Average attendance was 8 and I want to thank all the active members for their interest and support in this special year when we had no club funds to work with.

We accepted project proposals from local clubs and committee members. Christine Kyte and I again shared the chair duties this year and Mike Ruttan was our Board Director. Christine's current job prevents her from participating today but her thoughts are with us.

**Brenda McKinley:** When I started at Rotary, I had the task of going through the list of committees to see which ones I wanted to participate in. I had done some volunteer work in Mexico and had a fabulous time and really enjoyed seeing the joy on the peoples faces we helped, so I chose World Community Services. And I love it

We have been able to help students in Jamaica get desks, African children get dental supplies and check ups, ventilators, school supplies, water filters and beds for an orphanage in India and so much more. I am very blessed to be part of the sharing and caring of Rotary, how through the grant process \$5000 can become \$60,000 or more.

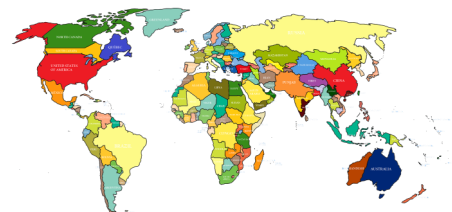
I have many friends that have come from other parts of the world and when asked what they are grateful for, in the top three is always clean drinking water, which for the most part we take for granted. This work has helped to teach me to be more grateful for the little things, to appreciate more.

I find projects because of other groups I belong to as well as if my friends or acquaintances are looking for funding raising dollars or ideas. It is a terrific feeling to be able to support these causes. The funds used this year came from 4 projects that were cancelled. These cancellations happened over the course of the year so the committee selected new projects as funds became available.

The committee sometimes approves projects with conditions related to time to approval and meeting the budget in the Request for Funds. One project was cancelled for that reason. The Kenya School Water system was conceived as a Global Grant by Christine and Jamie but Rotary Foundation matching rules changed to the point where TRF conditions could not be met. The committee tries to support other Alberta clubs with their Global Grants but sometimes the projects encounter unexpected complexities.

**In a year with no new club funds WCS managed to fund 6 projects in 4 countries.**

President Penny brought to our attention that D5360 clubs were looking at ways to help India in their time of need. The WCS committee considered three options and decided to support the initiative already underway with The Child Foundation, a registered charity with medical experience and contacts in rural areas north of New Delhi and with fundraising well advanced.





The WCS Committee is always looking for ways to leverage their funds and this year has been no different. Bob Wiens presented a couple proposals for District Project Grants where the District leverages club funds 3:1

An organization in Colombia called Investing Hope Foundation has developed a program of micro savings groups where members learn how to self manage their group after a period of training and evaluation. Given that many members are from the poorest strata of Colombian society, their level of savings each year are very impressive. Members of a group can withdraw their savings after a year, carry them over into the next year or lend them to others within the group. Groups once formed, tend to continue for years. A key component of training is how to budget to purchase items, whether for university fees or a cow or whatever.



A second leveraging opportunity using District Project Grants was approved to provide 60 rural families with safe water systems. Bob Wiens has worked with the young couple shown on the left for more than 6 years. Ivan and Rocio are highly educated but have a strong desire to work with the poor and rural populations. Recently CAWST has certified them as trainers and has hired them on a part time basis. Ivan and Rocio have done several small projects in collaboration with CAPD – a charity that Bob is involved in.

The Rotary Club of Santa Rosa de Cabal in Colombia is in the midst of a Global Grant with RC Calgary Centennial. The current project is to provide 350 families with safe water systems. The club is highly motivated and experienced and has asked for help with a new Global Grant (Phase 2) to provide 250 families with similar safe water systems. The WCS committee has approved the funds to trigger a Global Grant but the District has allocated all District Designated Funds for the coming year, so this project may be delayed up to 14 months.

A point of interest – Ivan and Rocio who are leading the District Project Grant mentioned above, have provided training to this club in all aspects of this type of project. For the last few years they have provided training to all Biosand Filter related Rotary projects – a big relief for Bob who used to do this himself.

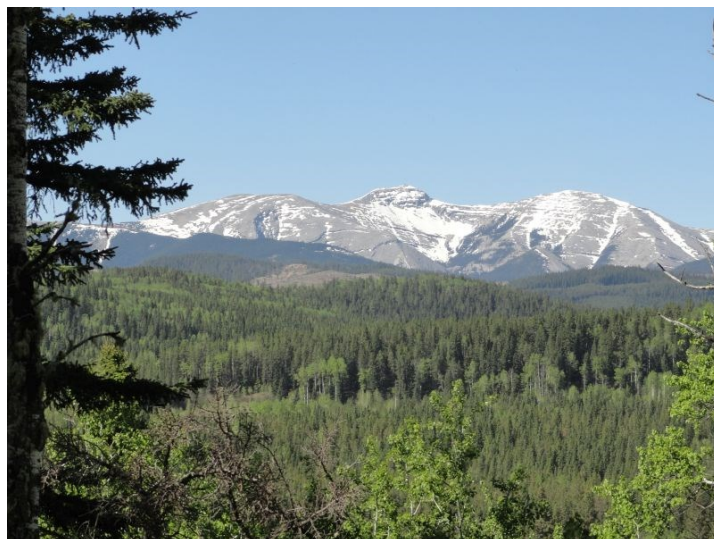
