In August, with Country Thunder, we have an additional opportunity through a separate 50/50 lottery, to raise extra funds for community projects. The sale of drinks and staffing admissions



will also generate substantial <u>"non-lottery" funds</u> which can be applied to "Club Operations" This is an incredible opportunity ... one we have not had before!Non Lottery funds are golden ! They help us reduce the cost of running our club. Depending on the amount raised, we hope to keep the costs of lunches, social events and membership fees from rising. Having the flexibility to subsidize a social event, or help a member with his membership fees are luxuries we currently do not have.

In brief, my goals are to first of all be very focused during July and August on all three of these incredible fund raising opportunities, making our club financially secure is a top priority for me. Also, to be prudent on club expenditures, so the rewards can be seen by members in attractively priced social events, reasonable membership fees and more frequent fellowship opportunities. However, we cannot lose sight of the importance of FUN in all we do for others!

Calgary South together with other Rotary Clubs are exploring future Legacy Projects in Senior's Care. There are logistics that need to fall into place before we bring it to the membership, but it is our desire that Calgary South have a meaningful presence in Calgary's Senior's Care.

World Community Services 2015-2016: The Year in Review

The World Community Service committee has had a busy year. We kicked things off in September and didn't let up until the end of May. We participated in 20 projects in 10 different countries. We have 6 in Colombia, 3 in Cambodia, 2 in Peru, and 1 in each of Guatemala, Rwanda, Kenya, Panama, Honduras, Vietnam and Jordan although it was for Syrian refugees.

We had a \$100,000 budget and through the many matching opportunities we turned that \$100,000 into participation in \$657,988 worth of projects. Only 6 of our projects didn't involve some sort leveraging.



In will come as no surprise that there are biosand filter projects in Santa Marta, Meta, and Sincelejo, Colombia. **Bob Wiens** has a long history of working with Colombian clubs on water projects. Steve and I had the good fortune to travel to Colombia to spend some time with Bob and see some of the projects. It was amazing to see the high regard and respect the Colombians, both recipients and Rotarians, have for Bob and his knowledge of not just biosand filters but also his ability to bring people together and get projects up and running. One day while visiting a potential site for biosand filters, Steve and I couldn't help but joke that when we saw Bob and some Rotarians from Monteria come up around the bend with his scarf flowing that he looked like the Clean Water Prophet leading his flock.

Bob also found, in Medellin, Fabric of Hope, a program that improves teenage mother/child bonding and helps them to develop a vision for their lives and avoid further unplanned pregnancies. A shed renovation at a fruit sorting facility and a program for Savings and Entrepreneurship for Youth round out our Colombian projects.

In Cambodia we supported Place of Rescue with some window repairs. We also supported Education First Cambodia by purchasing laptops for 8 female students. Each student is selected from students just finishing 1st year at the university and Education First then provides them with scholarships and the tools they need to complete their degrees. The last project in Cambodia we are contributing to is Child's

Future which is a \$220000 global grant project led by Manon Mitchell of the downtown club to improve education in the province of Pursat.

In Peru we worked once again with Desea Peru on their water and health program in the Peruvian Andes. Desea works primarily with the most isolated communities that have very little access to potable water and health care. In addition to using biosand filters they also train local women as community health workers. The program has aided over 3000 people in 4 districts.

World Community Services 2015-2016: The Year in Review

Live Again Rwanda is an amazing organization that, through counseling, is bringing together people that 20 years ago were killing each other during the Rwandan genocide. They are so successful that the president's wife has taken part in their program. With our donation they bought some new furniture for their expanding office and a car to be able to do more house calls.

With the plight of Syrian refugees top of mind in Canada we were very fortunate to partner with War Child Canada in their efforts to support Syrian refugees in Jordan with Psychosocial support, early child-hood development for pre-school children, education programs for school aged children and life skills training and legal rights awareness. Our donation was also matched by the Canadian government. Putting together all the pieces of a project can take a long time as evident by the recent go ahead of a \$128,000USD Global Grant project in Pursat, Cambodia.

The committee initially approved this project in May of 2013. Coordinating with the funders, RCCS, RC Medicine Hat Saamis, Downtown Club, Alberta government's CIP program, RC Las Vegas, District 5360 and District 5300, Rotary International, the Rotary Club of Pursat and the implementing agency Sustainable Cambodia took some time. We also learned a very valuable lesson; that when asking for more than \$50,000 from TRF you get put into the bonus round of scrutiny from the cadre of technical advisors at the TRF. All this is to say it took 3 years to bring this project to the start line and having visited Pursat and meeting the villagers I am thrilled that we stuck with it. This was a difficult project, but everyone on the WCS committee has the desire and dedication to follow these projects through to completion.

Through the clubs generous support of the WCS we have provided medical equipment, clean water, farming aid, counseling for refugees and genocide survivors, and educational opportunities and tools. On your behalf, we have helped provide hope and a hand up to 100's of families all over the world and we are anxious to get back to it.

President Murray thanked **Jamie** for his presentation and noted how amazing it was to have leveraged so much more funding for these very important projects. He also extended thanks to **Don Taylor** and **Bob Wiens** for their contributions.
