For our Club, each Rotary year begins with the Calgary Stampede, and for those of us who spent time at the grounds this past year, Stampede 2021 was AMAZING. After 18 months of Covid, having the opportunity to finally reconnect with our friends and raise much needed money for our community felt so good.

As a Board, we recognized how important it was to keep that personal connection going as we returned to our regular Thursday meetings. So, our Club committed to meeting live, in person, every week. And we did. We were the only Rotary Club in our District to do so, and I believe the health of our Club today is a direct result of that decision.

On its own, planning to meet in person each week was never enough. We had to have great meetings and our Programs Committee did not disappoint. We had absolutely AMAZING speakers all year and great speakers is what this Club is known for. It didn't matter if we had 20, 30 or 80 people in the room, the programs and the speakers knocked it out of the ballpark. Of course that made my job WAY easier. Thank you.

Our Greeters and Registration volunteers made everyone feel welcome - which is always important, but this year it meant even more. Our House committee made sure that the podium and equipment were ready to go each week and the technology was spot on.

The Sergeant of Arms and Songs and Stunts committees picked our pockets and kept us laughing. Our photographers, videographers, and bulletin editors made sure those who were unable to attend, or not yet ready to attend due to Covid, remained connected and part of our Club. Thank you.

I'm not going to lie. In the first half of the year, the meetings were not always easy. We didn't always have great turnouts, there was frustration on a new registration system and there was a lot of nervousness from members who attended. Understandably, many of our members were either concerned about their own health or concerned about bringing Covid home to a loved one. As a Club, I believe we moved from first gear to second gear when your Board voted to implement a vaccination policy to attend Club events. While a small number of members felt the Club was over-reaching and we should simply follow Provincial guidelines, based on feedback we received, the vast majority of our members appreciated the Club's commitment to your safety. As it turned out, the Province implemented their own vaccination policy a few days after we did, but I can tell you that I received an incredible number of calls and emails expressing appreciation for our Board's decision. Of course, as people began to feel safer, we started seeing an uptick in weekly visitors, a trend which has continued.

During Covid we did what we had to do, but I can never overstate how important it was to meet in person every week - even if we had to book our meals a week in advance. But rest assured, a crack team is working on the meeting registration process as we speak and we anticipate smoother sailing when we arrive back in Rotary House after the Stampede!! Stay tuned.

Having said all this, weekly meetings are only one part of the equation. Our Dream Home project, Golf tournament, and Casino put us back in business. In a regular year (if there is such a thing), there is tremendous need in our community. Throw in a world pandemic and negative oil prices and this city really needed us. Corporate donations to charitable organizations dried up, so the Rotary Club of Calgary at Stampede Park had to step up.

Our Club and community benefitted greatly from the endowment funds we received from the CRCF and Rotary Foundation. The donations our Club members made yesterday are paying off today and I am so grateful to everyone who has supported our foundations over the years. I am also appreciative of the great work of our Foundations committee. Thank you.

Of course, once we had money we needed to spend it. I can assure you we spent our money very wisely. I am so proud of our Club's due diligence and skill in investing money to deserving projects and charities. This is why we are here, and this is what we do best.

This past Tuesday, Bill Sumner and I had the honour of representing our Club in presenting Stay-In-School scholarships to deserving students at Sherwood School. Anytime I talk up our Club, two of the things I emphasize are our Dream Home Project and our Stay-in-School scholarships. Now, with the SIS program fully funded in perpetuity, our Club has been able to leverage our highly successful golf tournament to fund our new Kids at Heart initiative. This is very exciting. No doubt Kids at Heart will make a big difference in the lives of deserving kids.

As well, a special thank you to Club Secretary Luanne Whitmarsh, Treasurer Don Mintz, and Partner's President Rhonda Yaskowich. I cannot say enough about these people. Each and every one of them represented our Club in the spirit of the four-way test; with transparency, honesty, and integrity and I am so grateful for their support and friendship. Thank you all.

Large Grant Presentation

Greg explained the process that the Large Grants Committee used to select Kerby House as the recipient of this year's grant. There were 9 applicants this year, which was reduced to 5 because 4 did not meet the criteria for a large grant. Three applicants made the cut and were asked to present to the Committee. Kerby Centre was a clear winner of the Large Grant. , to hear the entire presentation please watch the video, link is on page 7 of this Bulletin.

Karen Wakemore of **Kerby Centre** thanked the Club and explained that our funds are being used for upgrades to the Kerby Elder Abuse Shelter. This facility is wholly owned by the Kerby Centre, and was the first such shelter established in North America. Elder abuse is defined as abuse by a person who is in a position of trust, and is usually financial or psychological in nature. The shelter has 14 beds, but because of staffing levels it can only operate 9 on a full time basis. It has a 99% occupancy rate and last year it had to turn away over 300 clients. The grant will be used to upgrade the shelter's mechanical and environmental equipment to the level that a long term maintenance contract can be entered into.


