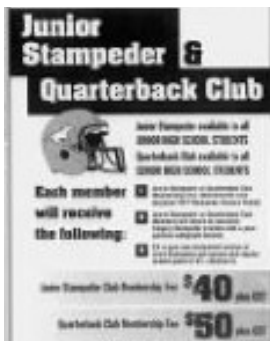

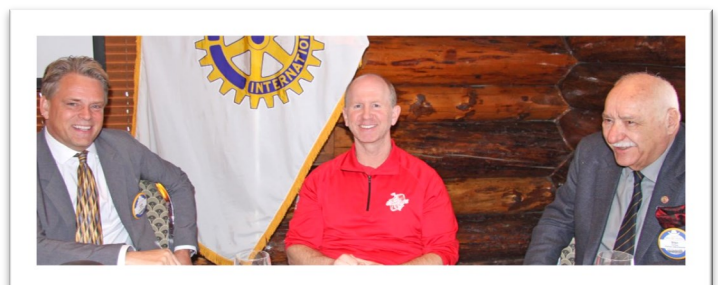

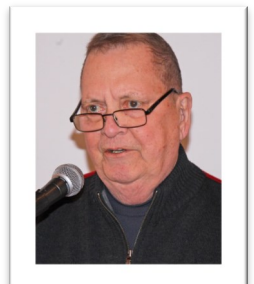
So, to say I have great memories of Stampeder games would be an understatement. And with that, I would ask that you join me for the singing of O Canada followed by Rotary Grace.

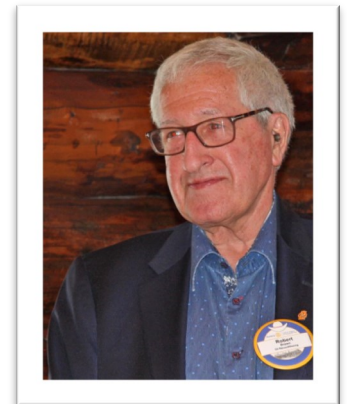

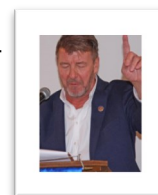

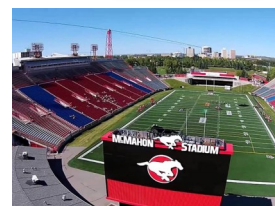

## DAVE DICKENSON: CALGARY STAMPEDERS

**SPEAKER INTRO: Stan Cichon:** It is truly my honour to introduce our guest speaker. He is Montana's "Legend of the Fall" who also is known throughout that state as "Super Dave", Mr. Dave Dickenson.

Dave Dickenson joined the Stampeders in 1996 after a stellar career at the University of Montana. There he was a three-time conference MVP with the Grizzlies and in 1995 led the nation in passing while guiding Montana to the NCAA Division 1-AA national title. He was named a member of the College Football Hall of Fame's Class of 2018 and was also part of the Big Sky Conference's inaugural Hall of Fame class in 2020.



### Now a little bit about his coaching history:

- ◆ Coach Dickenson is in his 14th season on the Calgary coaching staff and seventh as the team's head coach. His regular-season record is 61-23-2 through the 2021 campaign.
- ◆ Last season, Dickenson helped guide the Stamps to a 16th consecutive playoff appearance as the Red and White won six of their last seven regular-season games.
- ◆ In 2018, the Stamps advanced to the Grey Cup for the third straight season. Coach Dave led the Stamps to their eighth Grey Cup title in franchise history as Calgary defeated the Ottawa RedBlacks 27-16.
- ◆ From 2012-15 under Dickenson's tutelage as offensive coordinator, the Stampeders led the CFL in cumulative points scored over the course of those four seasons, finishing either first or second each year.
- ◆ In 2010 he was named quarterbacks coach. That year the Stamps quarterback Henry Burris was voted the CFL's Most Outstanding Player.
- ◆ Coach Dickenson's first assignment when he joined the coaching ranks in 2009, was offensive assistant where he tutored the Stampeders running backs and helped Joffrey Reynolds claim the CFL rushing crown.
- ◆ Dickenson joined the Calgary coaching staff after an outstanding 13-year professional playing career. He spent 11 of his 13 seasons in the Canadian Football League, six of those with the Stampeders (1996-2000 and 2008).



### Now a bit more about Montana's "Super Dave":

- ◆ A potent combination of intelligence, athletic ability & courage, Dickenson set a number of CFL passing records and was named the league's Most Outstanding Player in 2000 after throwing for 4,636 yards, 36 touchdowns and only six interceptions while guiding the Stampeders to a 12-5-1 record.
- ◆ After spending two seasons in the National Football League; with San Diego in 2001 & with Seattle, Miami and Detroit in 2002; Dickenson returned to Canada & signed with the BC Lions. After 5 seasons with the Leos – including a 2005 campaign in which he established league records for highest completion percentage and quarterback rating in a single season and an MVP performance in the 2006 Grey Cup – Dickenson returned to Calgary in 2008 for what proved to be his final season as a player.
- ◆ He and his wife Tammy along with children Avery and Cooper live in Calgary year-round. His coaching role extends into the off-season as he annually operates the Dickenson Passing Academy to work with young quarterbacks and receivers.

## DAVE DICKENSON: CALGARY STAMPEDERS



Dave began his address with the fact he loves coming to meetings like this because he gets to hear "how good he was!" He had to replace Jeff Garcia so he had to live up to expectations.

He thanked the Club for inviting him and enjoyed Joe's use of facts about McMahon and posed the question, "can we do something about it?"

He indicated that he didn't have any prepared notes but would just like to talk. Apparently his wife thinks he is a "very good" talker!! She even calls him "Chatty Cathy"

Coming to Calgary from Montana was not a difficult transition – there were many similarities in both the game and the city culture. The fans are also similar and he indicated that the team cannot function with their appreciative fans. He supports the concept that the players have to get out into the community and this is a priority in a post-covid environment and especially to develop a "younger" fan base.

### Last Season:

It was a season full of "the Good; the Bad; and the Ugly. As he was looking at films, he realized that there were a lot of significant changes in the team as people had moved on. From players to the coaches that went to the Argos in Toronto. They do seem to pickup some of Calgary's best. This meant that as a coach he was going to have to "grow the team". BUT covid meant there was no pre-season – this was a huge problem – football is NOT A SAFE SPORT – he recognizes this but you do everything you can to make it as safe as possible and part of that is the whole aspect of "getting physical" and having "full contact". He is the classic example of this, after having four of his joints replaced!



The season started and they played Toronto and even the stars were making errors, he aged ten years and it seemed that everything was going to be hard. The Labour Day games were a split and then the team "laid an egg" in Hamilton!. Suddenly you're 2 and 5 and a losing season is looming. Not something that you want to consider. In the BY-week the coaches realized that communication with the players was a problem. McMahon didn't have a "big enough" space to meet safely with the team.

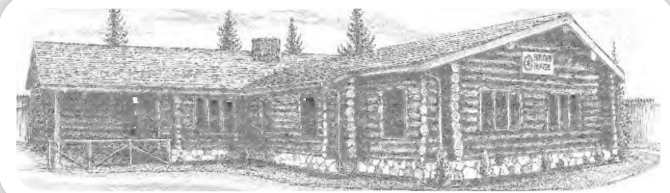
They found that players were often simply using their phones in a variety of situations to analyze the team efforts. Finally they were able to utilize the Dino's space – they put in plastic dividers and finally got down to meeting "one on one". At the end of this process a number of cuts had to be made and the team saw what needed to be done to bring about change. They began to win, made the play-offs and as a team felt good when the season was finished.

### Looking Forward:

Dave then moved to talk about the team for this year. He felt that Bo will have a "come-back" season. He's a great player, community supporter and has done everything you could ask for to be successful. Jake signed at a lower salary to make things fit and the team has two outstanding QB's for the upcoming season. It will be quite competitive as unlike the rest of the team there really is only room for one QB. They have been able to sign several local "big" boys who really want to be on the team. An important part of the building process is the be able to local talent that can fulfil the roles. Dave feels their Canadian content is very good and they will be able to switch both US and CDN players at several positions. Dave talked of the various players in some of the positions who will be more recognizable as the season progresses. There are several veterans who will be a big asset to the young talent coming up.

Dave wants to continue the focus on developing "young fans" and making our community a better place.

### Questions and Answer Period:

The question period had a variety of comments for Dave to reply to ranging from contrasting the American four down system, to how the makeup of the game is changing. He even reflected on his time in the NFL following Doug Flutie and working with Drew Brees, someone he felt had an amazing degree of self-confidence.

### SPEAKER THANKS: Chas Filipski

**Coach Dickenson:** it has been a real pleasure to have you speak to us today. Your insights into football and our beloved Calgary Stampeders are fascinating and a real treat for us to share. When Stan Cichon asked me to offer the Club's thanks to you today, it was immediately clear to both of us he was not asking me based on my athletic accomplishments. He was asking because I happen to have a connection to a former Stampeder. My late father Gene a former member of this club played for the Stampeders many years ago. I know many of his friends still in this club as well as myself sincerely wish that he could be delivering this thank you today but unfortunately, you'll have to settle for me.



Quick Stampeder fact: A month ago I got a call from Daryl Slade who does a lot of historical work for the Stampeders. Daryl got my number from Don Luzzi's son, Tom and called me to tell me that he had recently viewed some archival film that had been stored for many years and was finally produced. In that film Daryl verified that my father scored the first Calgary Stampeder touchdown at McMahon stadium on August 15, 1960. Pop continues to impress me!

Now, like most in this Club, I have been rooting for the Stamps for many years. I share season tickets with a Rotary friend of mine on the sunny and fun side. Coach; I have watched through your years as a player, an assistant coach under Huff and of course under your leadership the consistent and continued success of this football team. It reminds me of a quote my father kept on his office wall.

It is a quote from Vince Lombardi. My father thought highly of him as Coach Lombardi was my father's backfield coach with the New York Giants. The plaque read:  
"Gentlemen, we will chase perfection, and we will chase it relentlessly, knowing all the while we cannot attain it. However, along the way, we will catch excellence!"

Coach Dickenson; on behalf of President Craig, our Board of Directors and the membership of the Rotary Club of Calgary at Stampede Park, I thank you for speaking to us today, for relentlessly pursuing perfection and catching excellence so often with our beloved Calgary Stampeders. 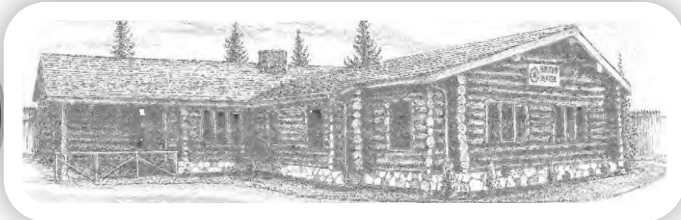

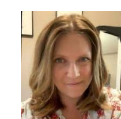
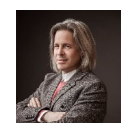
