Today we are going to have our annual St. Patrick's Celebration, brought to us by our own Irish Impresarios "Big" Joe Connelly and the dulcet tones of Hugh Delaney. A few facts from the Calgary Herald archives about the Irish in Calgary:

1880's – Irish born immigrants start to settle in the Ft. Macleod area. Many were ex-NWMP that received their service land grants.

1916 - By this date the Federal census stated there were approx. 6500 Irish Immigrants in Calgary, out of a total Provincial Irish population of approximately 51,000. Curiously, most were from Ulster (the northern counties) and all came for the pioneer opportunities available in Alberta.

1920's – St. Patrick's Day celebrations become more popular in the Calgary area after the 1916 rebellion tensions in Ireland subsided.

1930 - Our favorite Irish Baritone Hugh Delaney is born...

Guest Speaker: Laureen Regan

Joe Connelly introduced our guest speaker Laureen Regan. She is the Irish Vice Consul for Investment and Trade. Laureen is a business woman and is well known in the Calgary Community. If you go on the Vancouver SkyTrain, you would have heard her lovely voice announcing all of the stops!

Guest Speaker: Laureen Regan

May I say how delighted I am to be invited to share a few remarks with you today, on the eve of St. Patrick's Day. I would like to start by bringing each of you greetings from His Excellency Eamonn McKee, Ireland's Ambassador to Canada and Cathy Geagen, Consul General for Ireland in Vancouver.













Guest Speaker: Laureen Regan

Laureen asked by a show of hands 'who here is Irish born or claims Irish Heritage' and lots of hands went up. Then she asked 'who here has been to Ireland' and way more hands went up! She asked 'what are some things you think about when you think about the Irish, and the membership had lots of examples. Laureen then said the Irish are resilient, hard-working, innovative, persistent, daring and gentle and many more attributes. Ireland is not a large island, but we have had a large impact on the world. 70 million people around the world claim Irish ancestry with 40 million in Canada and over 500K in Alberta.



The Irish have a long history of coming to Canada for better opportunities, to connect with family and most well-known, to escape hardship and starvation – either by force or by choice. The earliest known people from Ireland living in Alberta were ranchers near Fort Macleod in the 1870s and 1880s. The Canadian government promoted the Western Prairies as the main area of settlement and gave new settlers 160 acres of land for free. By 1916, Alberta has around 6,500 Irish immigrants.

March 10th marked the second anniversary of the declaration of being Irish Heritage Month throughout Canada to celebrate the contributions the Irish have made in Canada. The Irish influence in Canada has been significant in building this wonderful country from bridges to buildings, canals and the railway we helped lay down the foundations of the country as we know it today. And, we have been deeply rooted Irish communities throughout Alberta – Irish people in our province have contributed to politics, journalism, arts, building, exploration, business and more. 19

In the past year and half, we have seen significant interest in bi-lateral trade between Alberta and Ireland. We share a wealth of similarities from a young and highly educated workforce, low tax rates, access to larger economic markets, similar population size a focus on market diversification and more. Last year we did two investment missions to Ireland which involved stakeholders from both Ireland and Alberta to foster collaboration and understanding between us on a face-to-face basis, build awareness of each other's strengths and the synergies of various sectors and to identify opportunities and long term connections for future growth. In May we are bringing over 10 Alberta companies to Ireland in the Agribusiness sector who are looking at Ireland and the EU for future growth.

Now, back to the fun part – St. Patrick's Day!

Laureen teased **President Jim** as Jim had already stated some of the information that Laureen was about to share!

St. Patrick's Day is celebrated around the world. In the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland it is a public holiday, BUT it is also a holiday in Newfoundland and Labrador.

The Toronto Maple Leafs of the NHL used to be known as Toronto St. Patricks from 1919 – 1927 and they wore green jerseys. In 1999 when they had a nationally televised game on St. Patrick's night, they wore green again. Why March 17th? The date marks the saint's death. Patrick died in 461 in County Down. He is buried in the grounds of Down Cathedral in Downpatrick, County Down. The first St. Patrick's Day parade actually took place in Boston in 1737. Ireland's first parade was held in Waterford in 1903. But Canada has the longest running St. Patrick's parade held in Montreal uninterrupted from 1827 – 2019.

Was St. Patrick Irish? No, he wasn't born in Ireland. He was thought to have originally come from either Wales or Scotland. Why do people wear green? The colour green is now synonymous with St. Patrick's Day and Irish prided but until the 19th century the colour associated with St. Patrick was actually blue! Why is St. Patrick associated with shamrocks? According to legend, St. Patrick used the shamrock as a metaphor for the Holy Trinity when he first introduced Christianity to Ireland.

Today we celebrate more than a century of independence. We celebrate over 50 year membership in the EU and next month marks 25 years of the Good Friday agreement bringing peace, hope and reconciliation to the island of Ireland. St. Patrick's day is our special opportunity to deepen and celebrate the bonds of heritage and affection which link the global Irish family and its friends world-wide. I bring each of you a message of friend-ship, of laughter and of fun as you look to celebrate St. Patrick's day and your own Irishness! Slainte! Happy St. Patrick's Day!



We were then treated to a wonderful dancing Irish group! They were totally awesome! Following this, our own **Hugh Delaney** had us join with him singing 'When Irish Eyes are Shining' and then he presented 'Dear of Donegal'. What an absolute treat!


We celebrate the legacy of James Wheeler Davidson by focusing on the impact of clean water and sanitation projects around the world.




Hiking Club
