His mentors will be Brett Albers and Carey-Ann Ramsay.








Bill Sumner introduced student **Leah Rachar:** Leah spoke of being part of the SISP since 2007 and is now graduated!


Bryan Walton attended the Paris Quai D'Orsay Rotary Club in France.
