Jim Smith began by saying on behalf of all his fellow Americans in the club Jim expressed condolences to the people of Pittsburgh on the recent tragic event which took place in their city.

Jim pointed out that he was a sub for **Art Borzel** who possessed far better qualifications to introduce our guest speaker. Art's pilot's license was certified by none other than **ORVILLE WRIGHT** – the person who flew the first airplane!!

Jim drew attention to the concept of being a "Tail Dragger" and how the tricycle landing gear of the A1 Sky raider forever changed the role of the fighter pilot.

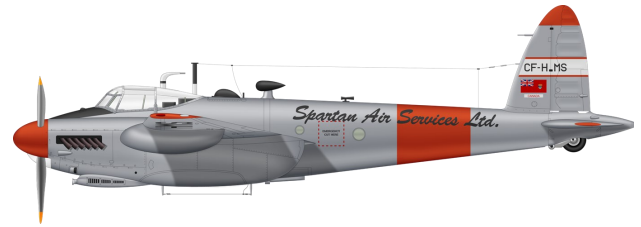
Jim pointed out that our guest speaker was born in Calgary and at the age of 17 began a life-long interest in aviation. He would cycle from his home to watch the comings and goings of airplanes at the Calgary Airport. Jim informed us that Richard was a skydiver and that clubs of this nature claimed that, "if you failed to return, the return of your money was fully guaranteed!"

Jim then told Richard about an old Dutch saying, **"if you ain't Dutch, you ain't mutch"** Having got the room aloft, Jim turned the podium over to our speaker, **Richard DeBoer.**

Richard began his presentation by informing us that air-planes were the vehicles for telling stories, stories that honour the designers, the builders, the flyers and those who sacrificed their lives while involved with aircraft.

The Mosquito aircraft was designed by de Havilland – and was unique in the fact that it was made entirely of wood. At first rejected by the Royal Airforce, in it's trial runs, it proved to be a "stunningly successful aircraft!" With a top speed of over 400 miles an hour it was one of the fastest aircraft in WWII. Over 7000 were made, - 1100 here in Canada, near Oshawa. Shortly after it's introduction the Mosquitos were equipped with machine guns enabling it to assume the role of a fighter as well as a bomber. By the end of the war it had earned the reputation of having the lowest loss rate of any fighter of the war.

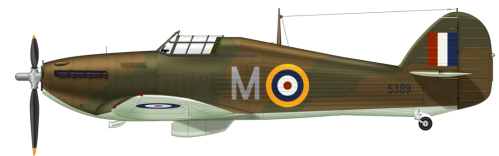


Richard showed a picture and told the story of the famous "F" for Freddie aircraft. The Mosquito and crew arrived in Calgary after having flown over 200 combat missions in Europe. Unfortunately after a fly-by of the city, the plane struck a guy wire on the tower of the airport and it crashed killing the crew.

The aircraft currently being restored was made in Canada and at the end of the war was purchased by Spartan Air Services along with several others. Spartan Air was a company who specialized in mapping and photo-graphing much of Canada and they mapped over two million square miles of the nation. After seven years this aircraft was retired.

Richard's story now shifted to the 60's and a person by the name of Lynn Garrison. He was a pilot and collector of aircraft and decided to create an aircraft museum for Calgary. Unfortunately the monies he raised and the aircraft he purchased were in fact owned by him under some very false pretenses. Garrison purchased the Mosquito from a farmer in Saskatchewan for \$25.00. Thanks to Milt Harradence, Art Smith and others, the scheme was discovered, Garrison was discredited and left town and for the price of \$1.00 the aircraft were purchased by the city. Some were displayed at the old Planetarium site and others like the Mosquito and the Hurricane were placed in storage. A new museum society was formed which Richard was a part of and later employed by. Unfortunately over time, many of the aircraft in the collection were sold in order to pay for museum expenses.

Richard now shifted the story to that of Calgary's Hurricane. Of importance in our history is the story of William McKnight. William was born in Calgary but grew up in Edmonton. He learned to fly here and early in WWII, was flying Hurricanes in the "Battle of France". He flew over Dunkerque and shot down three German aircraft during this battle. He was the highest scoring Canadian pilot in the early part of the war. Unfortunately, he was killed on Jan. 23rd, 1941 while flying over France. His body was never recovered.

The second person of relevance was a woman named Elsie MacGill. She was the first female aircraft design engineer in Canada. In 1940 she was placed in charge of the production facility in Fort William where Hurricanes were being built. She was not yet 30 years old and had been stricken with polio earlier in her life. Most of the workers in this facility were women.

Early in 1943, Hurricane #5389 was built at this facility. The plane was shipped to Boundary Bay on the west coast where it was to serve in the defense of Canada against the Japanese.

Lt. General Don Laubman, actually flew this hurricane. He was the highest scoring Canadian ace in the second half of the war.

The story of the Hurricane and the Mosquito continued to take some interesting twists and turns. In 2008 rumours surfaced that members of the museum board wanted to sell the planes to Peter Vasher from England for \$1.5 million dollars. He would take the Mosquito and restore it for in England but also would take the Hurricane off the hands of the Museum as part of the same deal.

This led Richard to form another group/society to try and prevent these planes from leaving Calgary. Over the period of the next five to six years, amid meetings and letter writings the planes were saved. Richard brokered a deal with the city. The cost of restoration of the aircraft would be approximately \$1.6 million dollars. Shortly after he was elected, Mayor Nenshi became interested in the project and Richard met with the mayor and his chief of staff and a proposal came forward from the city that they would cover one-half of the restoration in the amount of \$800,000 and the Mosquito society under Richard would have two years to raise the remaining amount and begin and complete the restoration of both aircraft.

Fund raising began and within a short period the society had raised over \$900,000 dollars. The Hurricane was sent to a company in Wetaskiwin that was part of the Reynolds museum, who had already restored a Hurricane. The Mosquito is in Nanton at the Aircraft Museum there. The engines for the planes were restored in Nanton and the Hurricane is expected to be back in Calgary for display in 2019,

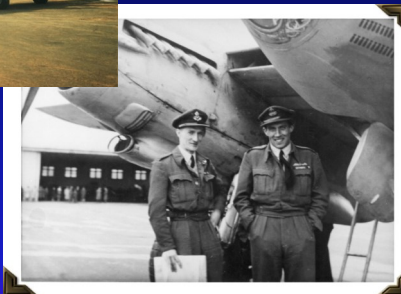
The Mosquito is an on going project with no specific completion date. Volunteers, many from Calgary drive down to Nanton on Tuesday nights and Saturdays to help in the restoration. If you're interested in this, please contact Richard.

Richard closed by stating that the purpose of the Society was to Retain, Restore, Honour and Educate. He thanked the club for allowing him to achieve two of those goals today -to Honour and to Educate.

Brett Albers thanked Richard for presenting to us an interesting and informative talk about the history of aviation and it's relationship to the City of Calgary.

Global Grant Scholarship (for study starting in Rotary Year 2019-20)

- Global Grant Scholarships (value: US\$30,000) support graduate study in one of Rotary's six areas of focus, by students from District 5360 at universities outside of Canada.
- Preference is given to students starting new programs of study, normally at the master's level.
- Rotary's six areas of focus are peace and conflict prevention/resolution, disease prevention and treatment, water and sanitation, maternal and child health, basic education and literacy, and economic and community development.
- Scholarships are available for 2019-20 and study must start after July 1, 2019.
- Rotarians, descendants of Rotarians, or ancestors of Rotarians aren't eligible for this scholarship.
