ry Clubs of Calgary Remembrance Service.

The Service commenced at 10.30 with a welcome from **District Governor Rick Istead**.

LAC (ret) Des De Freitas then recited " In Flanders Fields".



He introduced the poem with a bit of history on the author John McRae.

> Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

> We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders Fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe: To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders fields.

📌 Our own Frank King brought us the "Meaning of Remembrance Day"

Remembrance Day...November 11, 1918 marks the anniversary of the official end of the World War 1 hostilities. World War 1 was a massive conflict played out over the whole globe, but particularly in Europe, where troops from Canada supported the Allied Forces.

"We will remember" is a call heard at many military ceremonies and parades, but it was only in 1931 that Ottawa passed an

act **permanently fixing Canada's national military memorial day to the anniversary of Armistice Day, November 11th, 1918, marking the end of the Great War.** The day was named Remembrance Day. The same act moved Thanksgiving to October, from its traditional November date, which is still adhered to by our American neighbors.



Remembrance Day honors those who have sacrificed their lives in the line of duty in World War One, World War Two, and the Korean War.

Every November 11th, at cenotaphs across our country, as well as across Europe and the Commonwealth countries, services, parades and silences take place to pay respect to soldiers who died for us in battle.

Red poppies are seen on the lapels of coats as a symbol of remembering and inspired by the World War 1 poem, "In Flanders Fields where Poppies Grow". Poppies were the first flowers to grow in the earth around the graves of our soldiers, buried in Flanders, a region of Belgium. As well as being a flower of remembrance, the red poppy is also important to help the living. Today funds raised are used to help servicemen and civilians suffering from the physical and mental hardships as a result of war, as well as the many families whose military members are serving our country. This year the Canadian Legion expects to distribute 20 million poppies throughout the country.

However, in Calgary, this is the 9th year that the Field of Crosses is appearing along Memorial Drive. Over 3400 crosses are placed there from November 1st to 11th, each cross brings back the memory of an individual soldier from Southern Alberta who made the ultimate sacrifice.

A good friend of ours, Calgarian Murray McCann was the co-founder of this wonderful memorial celebration here in Calgary. We had hoped that Murray could have been able to join us here today, as he did in the past, but he is busy right now completing the last few days of this year's Remembrance Plan. I assure you that I will bring our "thanks" to Murray tomorrow for everything he has given to help us and many others to confirm the real meaning of Remembrance Day and Flowers. Thousands of people come out with tears in their eyes as they walk at Remembrance time through these rows of named crosses on the north side of the Bow River in downtown Calgary. Students attend daily sunrise and sunset ceremonies, experiencing a heart-felt history lesson and feeling a real pride in our country.

My friends ... this is the true picture of our Remembrance Day today for young and old.

Please take time starting now, to thank those who have already fought for our liberty to give us a better way of our life today to continue to support the future opportunities in this great country of Canada.





At 11am we observed two minutes of silence with the Bugler playing the Last Post and Reveille.

This was followed by the traditional Rotary Honour Roll presentation with the Presidents of the Clubs (President Bill LeClair for Rotary South) reading the names of members who had served in the Forces.

Joe Hooper of Calgary Chinook introduced the Guest Speaker, Jim Hennessy. Dr. Jim Hennessy was born in Peterborough and educated at Trent University and University of Toronto. He joined the Canadian Army Reserve at 16 and moved through the ranks to eventually become a Company Commander with the Queen's Own Rifles of Canada.

He joined the regular force as a Dental Officer and was posted to Calgary in 1980. He retired from the Forces after a total of 38 years and started a private dental practice along with being the staff dentist at Bowden and Drumheller Penitentiaries.

Jim is currently a member of Chinook.

LCol (ret) Jim Hennessy CD started by thanking those on the organizing committee, headed by Doug Hood.

"War is hell, nothing glamorous, its kill or be killed"

With these sobering words Jim gave us a history lesson of Canada's involvement in various wars then talked at length about one of the most significant moments in our history. The Battle of Vimy Ridge in April 1917.

He took us back to how war was being fought up to then with huge losses of men and not many gains of territory. After 2 years of trench warfare the forces, on both sides were spent. Fresh Canadian Forces arrived and they were charged with capturing Vimy Ridge. They were to capture the ridge in one day, many others had failed before them and they were not given much chance of success. However the started preparing, training, used photo reconnaissance and planned carefully. They rehearsed and knew their individual jobs. They introduced a "Creeping Barrage"



and some 250,000 rounds of shells were fired along with 7 million rounds of ammunition.

Hill 145 was taken by noon and they spent the next 3 days consolidating their position.

They had 3500 dead and over 7000 wounded out of a force of 15,000. Four Victoria Crosses were awarded that day.





Vimy Ridge became the Symbol of sacrifice of a young Canadian Nation. Dr. Hennessey closed with the final verse of the song "Green Fields of France"

And I can't help but wonder, no Willie McBride, Do all those who lie here know why they died? Did you really believe them when they told you "The Cause?" Did you really believe that this war would end wars? Well the suffering, the sorrow, the glory, the shame The killing, the dying, it was all done in vain, For Willie McBride, it all happened again, And again, and again, and again, and again.


Dr. Jim received a standing ovation !


