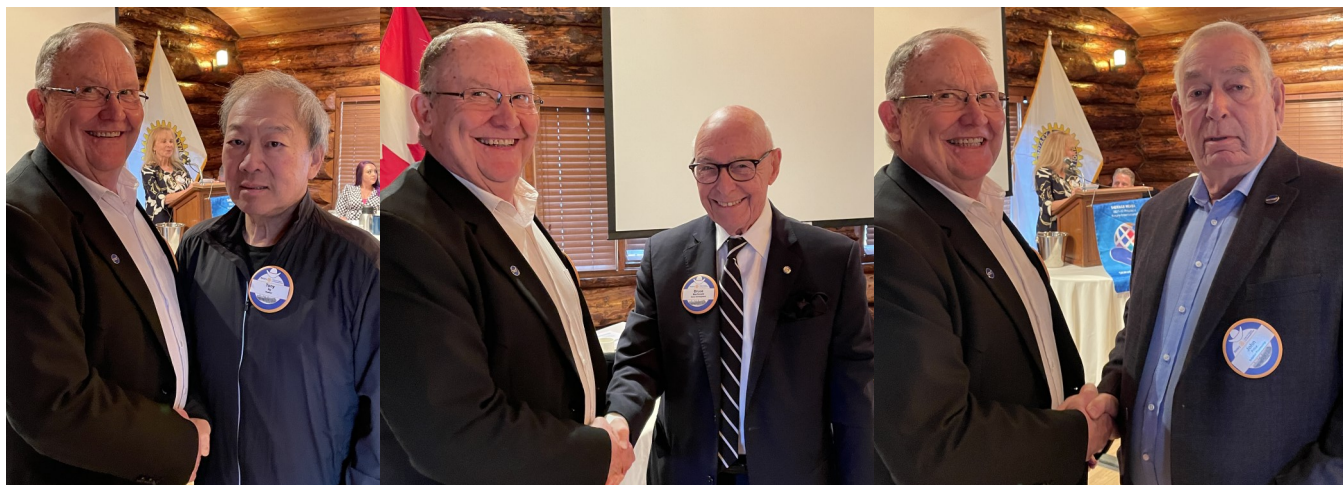

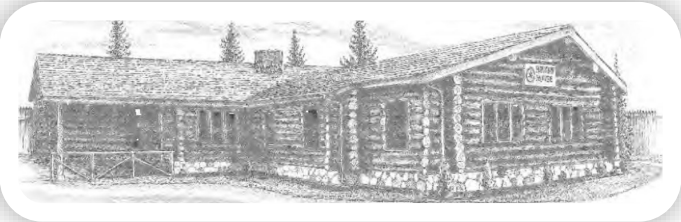

Driving Test at the start of winter

(Answer): This is not an argument for SUVs. National Highway Institute testing has proved that four-wheel drive vehicles, while having better traction on ice and in snow, so not stop one inch sooner than a two-wheel drive.

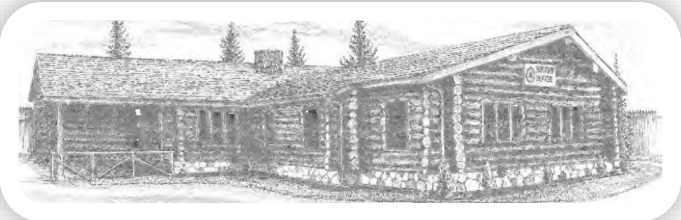

Of course I am talking about **Deb Sands** who joined Rotary in the summer of 2019. When the club put out a call for help with Social Media Deb answered the call. She has learned the power of Social Media as a way to promote her business during the pandemic and is super excited to promote the features and values of the Rotary Club of Calgary at Stampede park to our community, our country and the world! AND to promote the 2025 Rotary International Conference in Calgary. Social media can be a little daunting so Deb studies the power of social media from industry experts. And to that end she has recruited some highly qualified help. Which leads us to our Social Media expert, **Sarah Brown**.

So now that we understand how Social Media has the power to reach out and influence large groups of people, Sarah will outline the goals of the Social Media committee as they relate to our club.

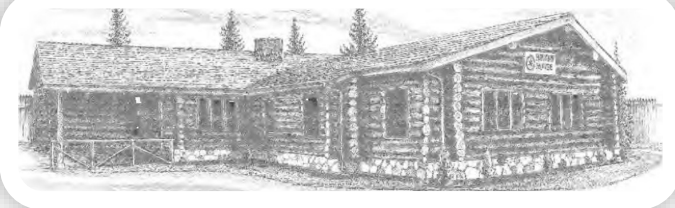

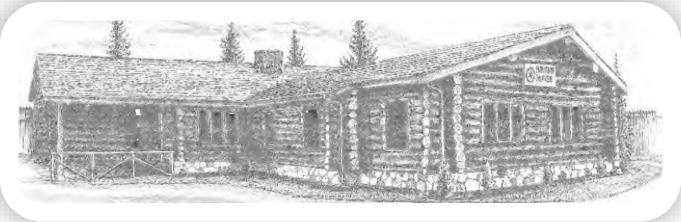
This wonderful event will be held in our own Rotary House - called "Home for Christmas".

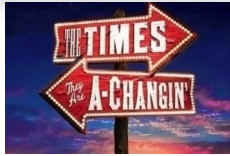
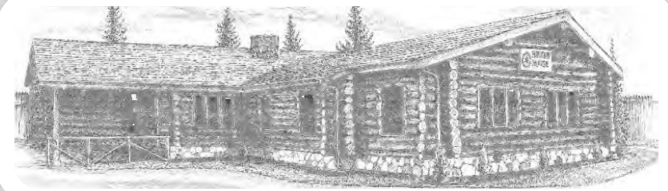
All applications will be reviewed by the Rotary Kids at Heart Committee and a worthy and deserving charity(ies) will be selected and announced by the Committee.

BULLETIN: Clarification from Keith Davis for last week's writeup:

- ◆ The War of 1812 – 1814 (which despite its name, was from 1812-1815) between Britain (Canada) and the United States. My GG Grandfather was at the Battle of Fort Detroit in August of 1812. The Americans surrendered without a shot being fired.
- ◆ My Great Grandfather fought in the Fenian Raid of 1866, when ex-patriot Irish soldiers (most of whom served in the US Civil War) attacked Canada and were defeated.
- ◆ My Great Grandfather fought again in the Fenian Raid of 1870, when the ex-patriot Irish attacked Canada once more and were again defeated.
- ◆ Again, my Great Grandfather fought in the Northwest Rebellion in Saskatchewan and Alberta in 1885.
- ◆ Subsequently, other family members served in WW1 and WW11, as well as in subsequent peace-time armies in Canada (Royal Canadian Armoured Corps and the Princess Patricia Canadian Light Infantry – the famous PPCLI).
