Jamie Moorhouse began today's meeting by advising us that we were going to be thoroughly entertained by a Dance Group from Rescue Cambodia.

Rotary Club of Calgary South has been supporting this organization through World Community Service for a number of years.

Jamie introduced **Marie Ens**, a Canadian who first went to Cambodia in 1961. She is now 85 and continues to live and work in Cambodia at their first Place of Rescue.

Marie gave us an overview of the history and scope of this organization and the following is taken from their Brochure with even more details on their website:

#### How it all began ...

In 2002, the AIDS crisis was at its height in Cambodia. Up to 3% of the population was infected. Believing that everyone should make a contribution, Marie Ens and Cambodian friends, Sokhan Lao, Sakhon Men and Kim Kong became involved in partnership with missionaries Tim and Darlene Ratzloff. The sixteen small thatch and brick homes that the Ratzloffs built for families coping with HIV quickly filled up.

With no anti-retroviral drugs available, the adults soon passed away leaving their precious children in our care.

In 2003, a non-government organization was formed and registered with the Cambodian government. Ten orphan homes were built and one by one supporting buildings such as an office, medical clinic, meeting hall, library, baby house, primary school, wading pool, Granny houses and staff housing were added. As the ten houses filled up with 100 children, another group of ten houses was added and before long, an additional 100 children called them "home".

#### And so it continued ...

Rescue Cambodia gained favor with supporters and friends in many countries. Even the Cambodian government authorities took note and Place of Rescue I was honored to have a visit from Prime Minister Hun Sen in 2016.

A second Rescue Center was established in the town of Mongkol Borey, an hour from the northern Cambodian border of Thailand and then a third in the town of Pailin on the western border. By 2019 Rescue Cambodia was responsible for more than 500 children, adults coping with AIDS and Grannies cared for a host of dedicated Cambodian staff.

#### What is most important ...

We will always trust Jesus to meet all our needs. Our children will be taught that Jesus loves them. They will learn to praise and trust him.

Our children will be cared for by Cambodian Moms and will live as other Cambodians do, so that their identity as Cambodians will be firmly established in their hearts and minds.

Our children will receive a good education with the possibility of attending university. Our children, Grannies, and adults coping with AIDS will receive good medical attention.

We will offer opportunities for sports, music and traditional Cambodian dance. We will have a large vegetable garden and raise fish, chickens, ducks, rabbits and bees.

Marie then introduced the first dance, "**The Blessing Dance**". After a few unfortunate technical problems it was elegantly performed by five of the young girls.

The second number was "**The Karma Dance**". We would call the Karma a shawl or scarf. The dancers used it in their routine as they demonstrated its many different uses. The entire group of 6 boys and 6 girls participated in this number.

The third dance was the "Coconut Shell Dance" and in this number the dancers had shells attached to elbows and knees along with one in each hand. They were skilled in clicking their own and their partner's shells to produce an enjoyable number.

The performance closed with a few comments from **Blaine Sylvester**, a Calgarian and the Representative for Rescue Cambodia.

**President Chas** thanked everyone on behalf of all our members and guests for an entertaining and informative presentation.


