Myrna Dube-Thompson had the pleasure of introducing her son in law today:

Dr. Todd Pugsley has a B.Sc. in Chemistry from Mount Allison University; B.Sc. in Chemical Engineering from University of New Brunswick; M.Sc. and Ph.D. (both in Chemical Engineering) from University of Calgary.

Todd Pugsley has worked in technology development at Suncor for the past 7 years. Currently he is Technology Development Manager and Strategic Focus Area Lead for Bitumen Value Chain Optimization. This includes work on partial upgrading in the Fort McMurray region and developing opportunities to integrate more bitumen into Suncor's Canadian refineries.

Prior to joining Suncor, Todd was a chemical engineering professor for 16 years, first at the University of New Brunswick and then the University of Saskatchewan. Over that time he taught almost every course in the Chemical Engineering curriculum and ran a world-class research lab in the area of gas-solid fluidization.

"The oil sands sector is a Canadian success story of engineering and innovation, but one that is currently faced with several challenges. Today Todd will speak about some of the technology development work at Suncor that is designed to address these challenges."

Presenter: Dr. Todd Pugsley – Oil sands Technologies: Technology Development Manager and Strategic Focus Area Lead Bitumen Value Chain Optimization

Technology has played a central role since the earliest days of oil sands development when Karl Clark invented the hot water extraction process at the Alberta Research Council. Suncor pioneered oil sands commercial operation in 1967 (then known as Great Canadian Oil Sands) and since that time has been a leader in technology development and deployment.

Examples include adoption of truck and shovel for mining to replace less reliable bucket wheel and conveyor belt technology in the early 1990's and the first implementation of steam assisted gravity drainage (SAGD) for in-situ bitumen recovery at the MacKay River facility in 2002.

Today, technology development and innovation continue to be fundamental to Suncor's business. Suncor has adopted an approach to technology development that balances continuous improvement (step change improvements in existing processes) and strategic technology (game-changing, disruptive). In 2017, Suncor invested approximately \$350 million in technology development and deployment as part of a robust technology strategy to optimize current assets and develop next-generation facilities.

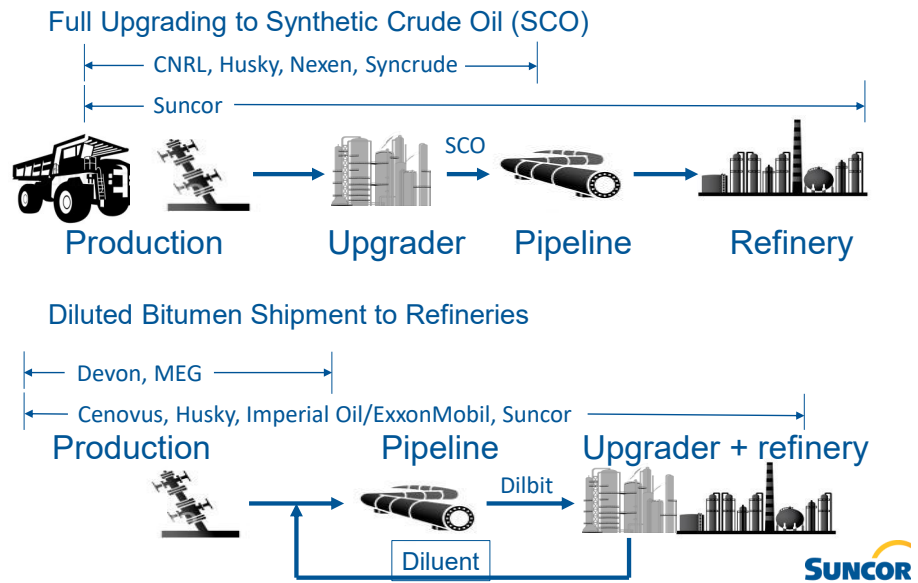
Technology development at Suncor is built around Strategic Focus Areas (SFA's) that include:

- (i) in-situ; (ii) mining and tailings;
- (iii) upgrading and refining; and
- (iv) mine closure.

Today's presentation will provide a high-level overview of Suncor's operations and approach to technology development and then move on to talk about two example technology projects, one related to alternate steam generation methods and the other to oil sands upgrading (paraffinic froth treatment).

Direct Contact Steam Generation or DCSG, is a technology that has been under development at Suncor and in partnership with other operators through COSIA collaboration for several years. DCSG is a tubeless boiler technology for generating steam that may eliminate the need for the large water treatment facilities when using low quality boiler feedwater. The steam produced in a DCSG is mixed with CO₂, a portion of which may be co-injected with steam into a SAGD reservoir to enhance recovery and potentially store CO₂. Results of a steam-CO₂ co-injection pilot at MacKay River showed promise in this regard, with only about 10% of the injected CO₂ returning to surface with the produced oil.

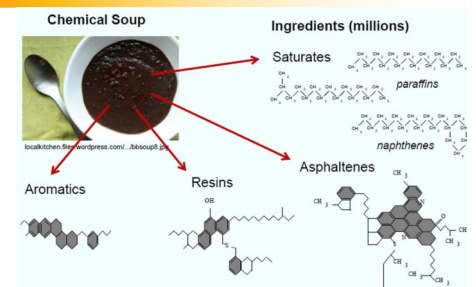
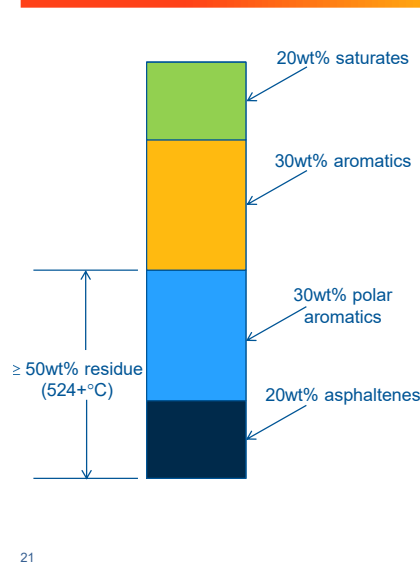

Bitumen can be considered as a naturally occurring, stable mixture of asphaltenes, polar aromatics, aromatics, and saturates. Under ambient or low temperature conditions, this mixture is close to equilibrium and the components of this mixture are compatible with no tendency to spontaneously separate or precipitate.

If this equilibrium is perturbed by changes in composition, separations can occur. This is the basis for paraffinic froth treatment (PFT), whereby the mixture is perturbed by mixing with a paraffinic solvent. PFT has revolutionized the oil sands industry by allowing mined bitumen to be mixed with diluent and transported by pipeline without the need for upgrading in the Fort McMurray region. PFT also increases bitumen netbacks by reducing the volume of diluent needed for transport in pipelines and removing some of the metals and other impurities that lower bitumen value.

Bitumen – a complex mixture

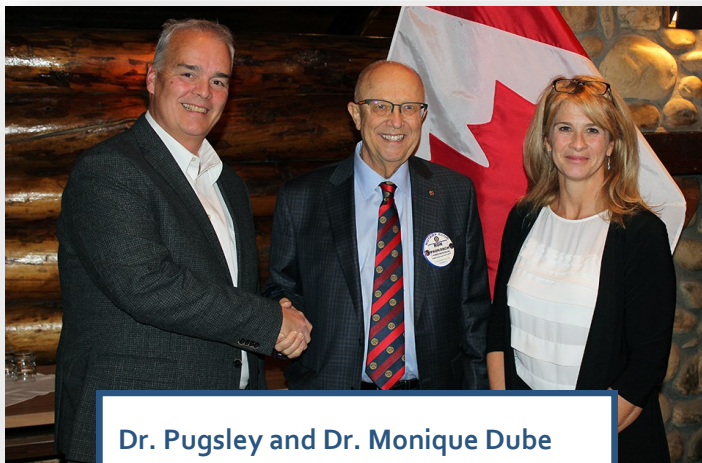


- A naturally occurring, stable mixture of asphaltenes, polar aromatics, aromatics, and saturates.
- Under ambient or low temperature conditions, this mixture is close to equilibrium \Rightarrow no tendency to spontaneously separate or precipitate.
- If this equilibrium is perturbed by changes in composition, separations can occur.
- This is the basis for PFT, whereby the mixture is perturbed by mixing with a paraffinic solvent.
- The stability of the mixture can also be perturbed by chemical reactions, typically at temperatures over 300C, giving rise to unstable asphaltenes or coke, which can separate or precipitate.

GLOBAL GRANTS WORK IN ACTION

The Rotary Club of Fonseca collaborating with The Rotary Club of Calgary South on a Global Grant will provide Household Water Treatment to 800 homes. In the group shot with filters, members of the Fonseca club appear on the right, filter contractor next to me. Rotarian Harold Bonilla, champion of the program appears in the middle with the cap. They have 120 filter boxes ready to paint and then will start the community education and delivery/installation processes. CAPD has supplied the molds and some of the necessary training.



The community of Potrerito, first on the list to get filters, prepared a Sancocho for me, the Rotarians and many community members. Sancocho, a very popular soup for large groups, must be made over an open fire and contains everything but the cow and the kitchen sink. Delicious.



The community leader took a couple of us to the spring supplying water to 35 families and some nearby farms. Water bubbles out of the ground at the base of the large tree into a nearby concrete box and then runs to the users via PVC hose laid on the ground.. Fortunately they have been able to protect the forest around the spring from logging and cattle but it is challenging when they do not own the land. Being outspoken on behalf of oneself or the community, when powerful or violent people may want to exploit this piece of property, whether they own it or not, is a risky business and can be fatal. So far this has not happened in this particular hamlet.

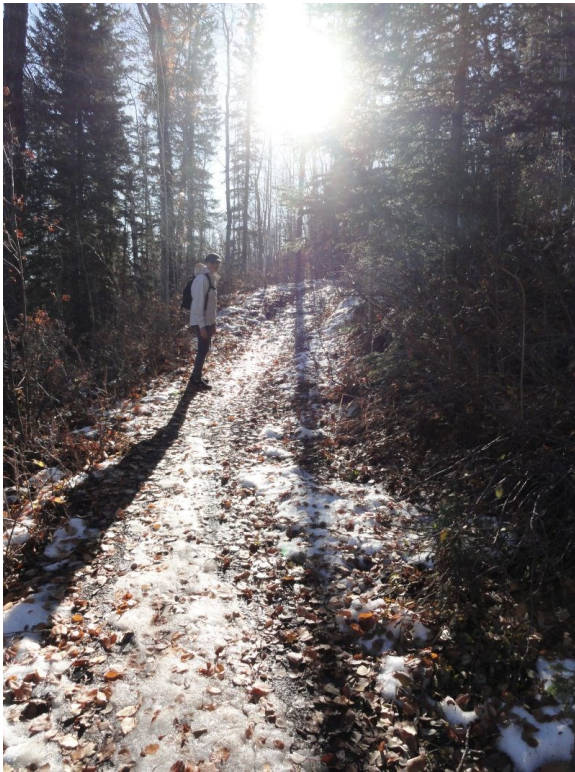
Marlene Doherty: District Chair, End Polio
