Announcements: President **Jim Fitzowich**

In honour of our guest speaker today, I am going to share some history about the Glenbow museum:

1955 – The Glenbow is established as a non-profit foundation by Calgary businessman and lawyer Eric Harvie. He names it for his ranch near Cochrane, AB. It is initially located in the William Roper Hull Ranch House.

1964 – The Glenbow and its Western Canadian artifact collection moves to the old Calgary Courthouse, courtesy of the Alberta Government.

1966 – The Provincial Legislature established the Glenbow Alberta Institute and Eric Harvie donates his collection as a centennial gift.

1973 – A new Glenbow museum building starts construction across from City Hall on 8th Avenue, and is finished in 1976. The rest will have to wait for our speaker...



Rotary Remembers Event: Greg Smyth reminded everyone about the Rotary Remembers 2022 event with guest speaker Lt. Col. Dr. Jim Hennessy (Ret.). The topic will be "Under-Appreciated: Canada's Role in World Affairs Since 1914". The event will be held at the Carriage House Inn on November 11th from 10:00-1:30pm (dinner 12:00-1:30pm). Greg noted that our Rotary Club of Calgary at Stampede Park has been the biggest supporter of this event since its inception. President Jim Fitzowich noted that there is no regular Thursday meeting that week, and that this event counts for our attendance records.

Speaker Introduction: Darlene Switzer-Foster

I am humbled and honoured to introduce our Guest Speaker today, Mr. Nicholas Bell, President and CEO of Calgary's beloved Glenbow Museum. I have not personally met an individual with the breadth of knowledge and passion for all things "museum" as Mr. Bell, who joined the Glenbow in 2019.

Mr. Bell is originally from Vancouver where he attended Simon Fraser University, receiving a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science. He went on to attend the University of Delaware where he received a Master of Arts Degree from the Winterthur Program in American Material Culture. It is also rumoured that Nicholas was a Rotary Exchange Student.

For 8 years Nicholas was at the Smithsonian American Art Museum, and led the Renwick Galleries' relaunch, increasing attendance from 150,000 to one million annually. Nicholas came to Calgary and the Glenbow in 2019 from his position as Sr. Vice President for Curatorial affairs at Mystic Seaport Museum in Mystic, Connecticut. During his 3 years at this preeminent American maritime museum, he launched a formidable exhibitions program. At the Glenbow Museum, Nicholas heads the Senior Leadership Team. He and his team are committed to the success of the museum, its employees and volunteers, and the Calgary community as a whole. It's exciting times these days for the museum from the total re-imagination of a new facility, temporary relocation of exhibits to the Edison, and the JR Shaw Centre for Arts and Culture.



Main Speaker: Nicholas Bell, President and CEO Calgary Glenbow Museum

Nicholas has a great appreciation for Rotary as he was a Rotary Exchange Student in grade 10, when he went to France for a year, learning the culture, travelling and visiting museums which created his passion for the museum world. He also attended many Rotary meetings and understands the values of volunteerism, philanthropy and community support.









Nicholas talked about why the experience he had in Washington, DC was so formative for why he came to Calgary, and talked about what's happening to the Glenbow physically. His work at re-opening the Smithsonian Renwick Gallery showed that when you close an institution and reopen it, you earn a new opportunity to gain a newly engaged audience.

What this Renwick experience taught him is that he has two passions in life. One of them is objects and things and the stories they tell, and the other is turning around museums. Therefore in 2019 he saw an opportunity with the Glenbow to renew one of Canada's preeminent cultural institutions, which was beloved but without a sense of urgency for change.

We wouldn't be having this conversation if it wasn't for Eric Harvie who opened the museum in 1975 with artifacts from around the world, so that Albertans and Canadians have a public place where they can commune with the arts and culture of the world. The building was built like a cold war bunker to house this priceless collection which is easily worth over a billion dollars. While the collection is well protected, there are no windows, no natural lighting and a lack of easy and open accessibility. Previously there was access to only 4 of the 8 floors at the Glenbow. The public had access to 50% of the 4 stories. In total there is 312,000 square feet of space across 8 floors that will ultimately be opened to the public.

The Glenbow museum is currently closed for renovations. Tearing down the building on prime real estate was never an option. To build a new building on the site would cost four times what it costs to renovate this building. The Glenbow at the JR Shaw Centre for Arts & Culture will anchor the downtown culture district. For the first time, all eight floors of the museum will be accessible to the public, creating more diverse visitor experiences across a more open and transparent museum. At street level, a new museum entrance along Stephen Avenue will better engage passers-by. The Glenbow will help provide the cultural infrastructure citizens of Canada and the world look for when deciding where to live and work.

The Glenbow has provided free access to indigenous communities, partly because the Glenbow has one of the largest indigenous collections in the world. Much of what is being done now is driven by the JR Shaw Family Foundation, whose goal is to level the playing field for everyone. With their generous donations admission to the Glenbow will be <u>free to everyone</u> in the <u>future</u>. This model is challenging the status quo in Canada and will help to engage the public in the future.









The Glenbow has raised \$160 Million to date since January 2020 through both public and private sources. People no longer have to consider the cost benefit of going to the museum, and can freely enjoy this new facility which will be opened in Q1, 2025. Then Nicholas is expecting to see 35,000 Rotarians come to see the Glenbow in June, 2025 to help demonstrate this new museum model to the world!

Bonus for Rotary Members - At the end of the presentation Elizabeth Reade, Director of Development Glenbow Museum, said she would be happy to give tours of the Glenbow renovation construction site to groups of 1 -8 people. Cleven Award

"This special internal award of the Rotary Club of Calgary at Stampede Park was established in 2006 to recognize the outstanding contribution of club members who take on significant responsibilities and commitments in furthering the work of our club.

The award is named the "Cleven Award" in honour of and recognition of Harry Cleven, first president of the Manchester Rotary Club 1955 now known as The Rotary Club of Calgary at Stampede Park. Cleven was a very active Calgary community leader and a well-known and respected businessman. He was one of 62 people who were killed in the crash of a TransCanada Airline flight which crashed on Mt. Slesse near Chilliwack on December 9^{tth}, 1956. He made many positive contributions to the start-up and laid a strong foundation for our club.

Members are nominated by Club Members with a review by a Committee, followed by our Club Board of Directors' support. Club Cleven Award nominations may be submitted by any member of the Club."

Nominations with supporting letters will be accepted from **October 13 – November 17**. Award will be presented at the Club Xmas Social on **December 22** at Rotary House.
