Transition Remarks: President Ron began by explaining how thanks to Canada Revenue Agency we needed to separate out the two entities of Club Finance and Volunteer Contributions.

This began in 2017 under President Bill LeClair and we now have the **Rotary Club of Calgary South Society** and the **South Calgary Rotary Club** to delineate how our funds are utilized.

Don Taylor District Rotary Foundation Chair

Thank you for inviting myself and **Cheryl Naglis** to speak to you today about The Rotary Foundation. November is Foundation month throughout Rotary worldwide and we would like to explain what makes this such a great organization.

I know you have heard all about the CRCF lately so we will only talk about TRF once – just today. There will be a table at registration for 3 weeks and I will stay behind there after this meeting to accept any donations you would like to give – credit cards or cheques accepted.

I will start out with a comment about an event I was at last night, also attended by **President Ron**. I walked away with purple fingernail polish on my left pinkie. Can anyone explain the significance of this? It was World Polio Day and this is how they mark children to know that they have been vaccinated in the last day or two so the team can ensure nobody is forgotten. There was a live streaming event at the Globe Theater last night that really gave an emotional and inspirational presentation on past and current status of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. If they have one next year, please consider attending – hopefully there won't be many more. Only Ron and I attended from our club.

I have heard a comment from one of our members that they don't really understand why the cash in the Foundation is "only" about a billion dollars US\$. There is a simple answer – it is not mainly an endowment fund, although there are endowments set up and you can have your own endowment established under certain conditions, but the need for the funds is now – not future oriented. There are people dying of disease, poverty, poor water, no health care right now and there is urgent need for the funds.

In 2016 contributions were at an all time high of \$265 million but in 2017, the 100th anniversary of the Foundation, we hit another all-time high of \$300 million and it looks like 2018 will be about \$350 million. I will show you a slide on how this money was spent in a minute.

Another point about TRF that makes many of us proud to contribute and proud of the high esteem Rotary is held in. About 2 years ago, at the 100th birthday of the Foundation, the Association of Fundraising Professionals recognized the Rotary Foundation with its Most Outstanding Foundation Award. Charity Navigator, a third party entity that reports on all charities has consistently give TRF is top ranking. This considers a number of factors such as wide support from its members and the public, minimum administrative fees and expenses, sustainability, transparency and reporting/management of projects. Much of the success is because it is a grass roots organization where the clubs initiate and manage the projects. No projects are run by the Foundation itself and in most cases, including ours, the Districts don't run the projects.

Polio Plus is the exception since it is such an extensive undertaking that it could only be done with a massive world wide effort including our partners such as World Health Organization, CDC, UNICEF, the Gates Foundation and national governments. We are likely to eradicate it entirely within 3 years. As an aside, I will tell you of an amazing happening at the Atlanta convention in 2017. The TRF Trustees met along with other of their partners to consider further funding requirements. It was estimated that another \$1.5 billion was needed to finish off the job in the next 3-4 years. No future funding had been promised by anyone before that day.

Rotary committed to \$50 million per year for 3 years. As soon as the cheering died down, Bill Gates walked onto the stage and said that his foundation would match that 2:1 giving a total of \$450 million.

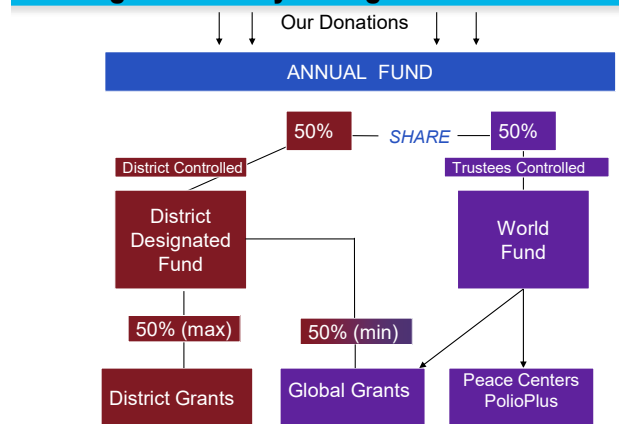
A cabinet minister from Canada walked out then and pledged \$100 million. Followed by a business woman from India who also pledged \$100 million.

Once the attendees of the morning trustees meeting all came out \$1.2 billion of the 1.5 had been raised. Incredible! You don't raise that amount of money without having a glowing reputation.

That is what we are dealing with here - a Foundation that is managed by Rotarians to do good in the world who get how to do it effectively and efficiently. The four way test gets applied here in all aspects of the Foundation's work It is something we should all be proud of and warrants being the charity of choice for many of us.

Cheryl Naglis will now say a few words. Cheryl has recently been appointed to the District Foundation team as **District Giving Chair** and is also an assistant governor. She is currently a member of Calgary North and previously an Olds and Sylvan Lake member and a Past President of her club.

Cheryl gave a very personal and emotional introduction about the effects of poverty and the impact that poverty has on an individual. Cheryl told her story of growing up in a poverty environment – the lack of education which affected many of her family and how she became the first in her family to complete high school and to go on to university. She joined Rotary on the advice on her daughter after they had attended a function which revealed how Rotary had a positive effect in the world.



A trip to the Honduras brought back all her childhood memories and increased her desire to help in the betterment of mankind. While in the Honduras she asked about the effects that the bio-degradable water filter had upon a family and was informed that “the family no longer suffered from serious digestive ailments and that this enabled the children to better attend school”. Education was an essential key to development.

She reminded the membership that the Club will continue matching contributions to help a member get a Paul Harris Fellowship. The Club will continue to match every contribution between \$100 and \$500 converting it into USD. This means for \$500 Cdn you will receive a Paul Harris Fellow.

Carol Rosdobutko thanked Don for providing us with information about the role of the Rotary Foundation in the World and to Cheryl for an emotion loaded presentation about how the Foundation is key to relieving poverty and improving the quality of people’s lives.



A message from **Foundation Trustee Chair** **Ron D. Burton**

Every year we celebrate November as Rotary Foundation Month. How fortunate we are to have a world-class Foundation that allows us to do so much good in the world. We should all take pride in the fact that something good happens every second of every day because of Rotarians and our Rotary Foundation.

Remember how excited we were at the 2017 Rotary International Convention in Atlanta, where we celebrated the Foundation’s first 100 years? The fundraising goal for that year was \$300 million, and, as you recall, we raised \$304 million to exceed that goal. It was a landmark year for the Foundation.

In the 2017-18 Rotary year, as the Foundation entered its second century of service, we had an even more ambitious fundraising goal of \$360 million. At the convention in Toronto in June, outgoing Trustee Chair Paul A. Netzel told attendees that we once again had a landmark year for our Foundation, setting a one-year fundraising record of \$373 million.

This year our fundraising goal totals \$380 million. Our goal for polio is \$50 million, which will be turned into \$150 million through the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation matching grant. Add to that a \$137 million goal for the Annual Fund, \$61.5 million for the Endowment Fund, and \$31.5 million for global grant cash and other outright gifts, and our many programs will be fully funded and Rotarians will be completely equipped and empowered to continue making real change.

Now, it’s up to you and me. We have the chance to forge a path of ever-increasing relevance and influence — to choose the direction and tempo of the Foundation’s second century.

I’m challenging you to increase your involvement in our Foundation — by doing, by giving, and by inspiring. Together we can make tomorrow even brighter than today. We can make every month Rotary Foundation Month. So, *Be the Inspiration*, build your Rotary legacy, and let’s make this yet another landmark year in our history.

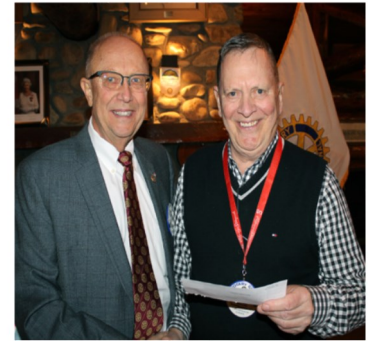
President Ron presented a cheque for \$125,000 to Bill Summer to pass on to the "Stay In School Committee.

In 1988, David Bercuson was elected to the Royal Society of Canada and in May 1989, he was appointed Dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies at The University of Calgary. In 1997 he was appointed Special Advisor to the Minister of National Defence on the Future of the Canadian Forces. He was a member of the Minister of National Defence's Monitoring Committee from 1997 to 2003. Since January 1997 he has been the Director of the Centre for Military and Strategic Studies at the University of Calgary. He is also the Director of Programs for the Canadian Global Affairs Institute, which is based in Calgary.

Dr. Bercuson's newest book is *The Fighting Canadians: Our Regimental History from New France to Afghanistan*, published by HarperCollins.
