Cleven Awards: Bryan Walton announced the opening of nominations for the annual Cleven Awards. He provided a form on each table today and it will be in the Bulletin as well. It is the most important award a Rotarian can receive. The nomination form must be accompanied by a testimonial letter. He asked the members to consider nominating someone and send to Bryan by email. Nominations close on November 12 and the presentation will be made during the Christmas period.



This special internal award of the Rotary Club of Calgary at Stampede Park was established in 2006 to recognize the outstanding contribution of club members who take on significant responsibilities and commitments in furthering the work of our club.

The award is named the "Cleven Award" in honour of and recognition of Harry Cleven first president of the Manchester Rotary Club 1955 now known as The Rotary Club of Calgary at Stampede Park. Cleven was a very active Calgary community leader and a well-known and respected businessman. He was one of 62 people who were killed in the crash of a TransCanada Airline flight which crashed on Mt. Slesse near Chilliwack on December 9^{tth,} 1956. He made many positive contributions to the start-up and laid a strong foundation for our club.

Members are nominated by club members with a review by a committee, followed by our club Board of Directors support. Club Cleven Award nominations may be submitted by any member of the Club.

CRITERIA

- The award recognizes a strong commitment to and involvement in all club activities.
- The nominee should be an active participant in club committees, who accepts major responsibilities in the committee. They should demonstrate a strong work ethic and timely completion of commitments.
- Members of Rotary Club of Calgary at Stampede Park with membership of at least 5 years qualify for this award.
- Nominees for this award must have an attendance over the last three years of at least 75%.
- This award does not have any repeat recipients.

NOMINATION PROCESS

- Submission of a Nomination can be made by members of the Club accompanied by a supporting letter and/or by members of the Recognition and Award Committee.
- Deadlines for nominations will be published in the Bulletin.
- The Recognition and Awards Committee will receive the nominations and make recommendations to the Board for those club members who will receive this award.
- The Board is responsible for approving the recommendation of the committee.
- The Award will be presented at a time to be determined by the Board.

GUIDELINES FOR THE RECOGNITION AND AWARDS COMMITTEE

- There will be 1 to 3 recipients per year.
- Presidents and District Governors are not eligible until 5 years after serving their term.
- Members of the Recognition and Awards Committee are eligible to be nominated.
- The profile of club committees varies with the type of work, it is therefore important that the Recognition and Awards Committee ensure that all nominations which are received for this award are given equal consideration.
- The Committee will meet within two weeks of the nomination deadline to review the nominees and choose appropriate recipients which will be approved by the Board.

- +1 receives a pin with a star over Rotary House (\$2000 donation)
- +2 receives a pin with two stars over Rotary House
- +3 receives a pin with three stars over Rotary House
- +4 receives a pin with four stars over Rotary House
- +5 receives a pin with five stars over Rotary House (\$6000 donation)
- +6 (\$7000 donation) +7 (\$8000 donation) +8 (\$9000 donation) receive an Honourable Mention

LEADER: donated \$10,000: receives pin with 5 stars & moon over Rotary House (final pin in series) BUILDER: donated \$50,000 and receives Honourable Mention MAJOR DONOR: donated \$100,000 and receives a crystal ornament commemorating the event.

All of the above Four Levels are listed on our Recognition Board located in Rotary House in a glass cabinet.

ELECTION GUIDELINES: Past President Penny Leckie:

According to the bylaws of the Rotary Club of Calgary at Stampede Park the Election Process for President-Elect Nominee and Directors is declared open this first day of **October 7th**, **2021**. The nomination process will remain open for additional candidates from the club membership through to 1:00 pm **on October 21st**, **2021** for a three (3) week period. Thereupon, acceptance of additional nominations will cease. Nominations from Rotary Club of Calgary at Stampede Park Members can be submitted for each of the following positions: **President-Elect Nominee**, **and 3 Director positions**. Nomination forms for all positions will be attached to this week's bulletin and are posted on our Club Website.



Members are requested to prepare a nomination form for each of the candidates, to be signed by the nominee showing their willingness to serve if elected and finally, signed by the first and second sponsors which are known as nominator and seconder. Again, these must be dated and submitted to the Club Secretary, Luanne Whitmarsh no later than 1:00 pm **on October 21**st, **2021**

In the event we have more nominations submitted than there are vacancies to fill, we will then have an election. Ballots will be electronically mailed to Members of the Club with a response requested within two (2) days to the attention of the Chair of the Nominating Committee.

All candidates involved in that process will have a short profile published in the bulletin prior to the election and members will be asked to return their voting ballot within two weeks of the mailing date.

President-Elect Nominee:

- * Has been a member in good standing for at least five years.
- * Has previously served on the board of directors for at least one year.
- * Has not previously held the office of President of our club.
- * Has been a member in good standing of our club having maintained 70% or higher attendance in the most recent applicable two years prior to this nomination.
- * Has demonstrated a strong commitment to club activities such as committee work and fundraising activities and the completion of Dream Home shifts as expected by the club.

Director:

- Has been an active member in good standing and has been so for a recommended period of at least 3 full years.
- * Has demonstrated a strong commitment to the objectives of Rotary throughout their tenure with the club.
- * Has maintained a 70% attendance in the previous applicable two years prior to this nomination.
- * Has demonstrated strong commitment to all club expectations for involvement in club activities such as committee work fundraising activities and completion of Dream Home shifts as required by the club.

The current Vacancies are as follows: President-Elect Nominee and three Directors. The President-Elect Nominee will serve in that capacity for a period of one year commencing July 1, 2022 until June 30, 2023. At that time; they will assume the role of President-Elect and serve for one year from July 1st 2023 to June 30, 2024. On July 1, 2024 until June 30, 2025 they will serve their term as President of our club.

Following our club's bylaws I convened a meeting of the Past Presidents of our club that took place on **October 5th**, **2021**. The Past Presidents made their selection for President-Elect Nominee in that meeting. On behalf of my fellow Past Presidents I am pleased to announce to all of you our nominee for President-Elect of the Rotary 2023 to 2024 is **Bryan Walton**

"Our current President-Elect **Jim Fitzowich** is currently courting potential Directors for the 3 Director vacancies available for the 2022-2023 Rotary year. He will announce his nominees shortly. Any nominees that Jim may announce are not intended to exclude any nominations from the general membership.

Now, the nominees that have been announced today are not intended to exclude any nominations from the general membership. Our club bylaws provide for an open election wherever there are more nominations than vacancies to fill. Each week until **October 21**st, **2021** I will announce the names of any additional nominees that are put forward from the general membership.

GUEST SPEAKERS: STAMPEDE BRASS: JOEL COWLEY AND STEVE MCDONOUGH

Joel Cowley, Chief Executive Officer



Joel Cowley, Chief Executive Officer (CEO) is responsible to the Board of Directors for leading the organization. Before taking on the role of CEO, Joel was most recently the president of Angus Genetics Incorporated, following 15 years with the internationally renowned Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. As president and CEO of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, Cowley oversaw 135 full time employees and 35,000 volunteers and brings considerable strengths in leadership, communication, administration and business to the Calgary Stampede.



Steve McDonough, President & Chairman of the Board

Steve has spent his professional career building organizations and taking on new challenges. A lawyer by training,

Steve has served as a policy advisor to the federal government in Ottawa, built and sold an advertising agency, is involved in commercial property development and has built a franchise retail business. Steve has a wide array of skills and experience.

Speaker Introduction: John Fitzsimmons introduced Steve McDonough as a man well known to us, who "wrestled the bear" to host the 2021 Stampede and needing "no introduction".

Steve McDonough: began by saying it warmed his heart to see the Rotary House full again & while he and his team "wrestled the bear" our Rotary Club stepped up to make it happen. Steve wanted to to tell us about the CEO succession and introduce our Club to the successful candidate Joel Cowley. The succession was expedited due to the former CEO passing away. The Board came up with a shopping list of qualities they wanted in the successful candidate including:

- Tone at the top
- Problem solver
- Excellent people skills
- ♦ Presence
- ♦ Experience that was Calgary-specific
- His personal favourite quality was "the best person on the world".

Steve had just been appointed the President and Chairman of the Stampede Board when he was handed the daunting task of recruiting a new CEO. They went "through the world" to find the right person and had many excellent candidates but Joel differentiated himself by speaking of his passion of working with volunteers while carrying out a worthy vision.

Speaker: Joel Cowley began by saying he was humbled and honoured to be named as CEO and thanked our Club for our commitment and service to the community. He will be happy to join us in Houston in 2022 for the Rotary International Convention and excited about helping to host the 2025 Convention in Calgary.

Joel spoke of his background, upbringing, education and career to understand why he is passionate about this industry. Born and raised in the US, he and his two brothers lost their parents at a young age and were raised by their paternal grandparents. His grandfather was a jack of all trades and enrolled the boys in 4H where they learned to love and appreciate animals and agriculture. Joel's self confidence grew raising livestock and he received a livestock judging scholarship. He went on to receive his Master's and MBA. He was involved in coaching livestock judging teams and provided his expertise in cattle evaluation in Alberta. He spent 15 years with the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, first as Executive Director and then as CEO. He oversaw 135 full time employees and 35,000 volunteers. Joel was most recently the President of Angus Genetics Incorporated. He has a passion for community service and community engagement as well as the importance of agriculture. Of all of the fairs, exhibitions and festivals in the world, only two stand out: Houston and Calgary.



OBITUARY RICHARD FRANK SHAW (June 18, 1928 - September 27, 2021)

It is with deep sadness that we announce the passing of Richard Frank Shaw on Monday, September 27 at the age of 93. He will be lovingly remembered by his daughter, Rebecca Jo (Becky) Shaw; his son-in-law, Andrew Robert Wreggitt; his granddaughter, Cayley Jane Wreggitt; his brothers, Tommy Jay and William Malcolm Shaw and their families (Oklahoma City); and his sister-in-law, Virginia Milner Ross and her family (Dallas, Texas).

He was pre-deceased by his wife of 67 years, Jo Ellen Milner Shaw, in 2017. Richard was the oldest of three boys born in Oklahoma City to Dorothy Aletrice Hawk and Richard Frank Shaw, Sr. After graduating from Classen High School in 1946, Richard studied geology at the University of Oklahoma. His studies were interrupted by the Korean war when he was called to active duty at Camp Polk, Louisiana. By then Richard had fallen in love with Jo Ellen Milner whom he married October 1, 1950. A 1st Lieutenant and Battery Commander, Richard received transport orders to Japan in 1952 but the war ended before he was shipped overseas. After he completed his Master of Science degree in geology, Richard began his career in Shawnee, Oklahoma with the Carter Oil Company. In 1961, Richard formed his own exploration company, Sigma Oil and Gas.

In 1968, Richard had the opportunity to take his geological skills to Calgary, Alberta, so he, along with Jo Ellen and Becky, began their northern adventure. In 1969, Richard formed Glen Isle Exploration, which became a successful mid-size Canadian oil exploration company. He was also a leader in community activities such as the 1988 Calgary Winter Olympics and was a long-time member and past president of Rotary Club of Calgary South (Stampede Park).



In 1982, Richard turned his scientific mind to breeding Canadian thoroughbred racehorses and he and Jo Ellen created Glenview Stables Ltd. Over the years, several Glenview horses became Canadian stakes winners (two were named Canadian Champions of the Year) and Richard and Jo Ellen won a number of awards, including Canadian Thoroughbred Breeder of the Year. Their horse-racing adventures took them to Japan, Ireland, France, Kentucky, and California and led to them meeting Queen Elizabeth II at the Queen's Plate in Toronto in 1997, where their horse Love View finished a respectable fifth. Richard also served as Vice President of the Canadian Thoroughbred Horse Society (Alberta Division) and was elected a Steward of the Jockey Club of Canada.

Richard will always be remembered as a curious and creative scientist; a gentleman and thoughtful friend; an involved member of many communities; and a generous and loving father and grandfather. A private grave-side service will be held for family and a celebration of life will be held at a later date.
