Myrna Dube-Thompson began by introducing Janice McTighe and Renfrew House to us:

Every time I walk through the Janice McTighe Renfrew Educational Centre I leave with tears in my eyes. You see room after room each with small groups of children all requiring some form of special assistance; whether it's from Downs Syndrome, Autism Spectrum Disorders, Attention Deficit disorder.

Each room has a teacher and assistants and you often see a child receiving one on one care because they were having a bad day. You are shown a sensory room where special therapy treatment is helping a child with severe needs achieve calmness.

It's an environment where you often hear staff cheering because a child in a wheel chair that requires everything to be done for them for them has learned to move a limb or a child that has never spoken has just uttered a word.

The staff are Saints and the Leading Saint that launched this world of learning that supports all children; those typically developing and those with special needs is **Janice McTighe**. She founded it 47 years ago and what started then with one classroom now operates out of 5 locations throughout the city where 650 children are enrolled, with more than 400 staff. And they have a waiting list of many more who need their special help.

Janice has been awarded for her vision and development and on-going leadership of Renfrew. She is the proud recipient of a Paul Harris Fellowship award, the Alberta Order of Excellence, the City of Calgary Life Time Achievement award and the City of Calgary Education award.

In closing friends, can you imagine as a parent having a child that needs assistance every waking minute of a day. But because of Renfrew your child is picked up 5 days a week in a specialized bus and transported to a place where specialists help them maximize their potential in an environment that provides individualized learning opportunities and returns them safely home to you in the afternoon.

Your child is progressing and as a parent you have some reprieve. I can only imagine what a difference that would make for your family.

JANICE MCTIGHE: RENFREW EDUCATIONAL SERVICES



Janice began by showing a photo of the bus currently used by Renfrew Educational Services which was purchased by The Rotary Club of Calgary South through the Large Grants Process. Renfrew has had a long standing relationship with Rotary.

Renfrew began in 1986 with a van, not a bus and the original Driver was Rick and he is still driving with Renfrew today. They always make sure that the bus he drives is: Bus Number One.

All Drivers must go through a training program and all students are secured with a 4 point belt system. They use car seats and specially designed seats when needed.

The buses receive regular maintenance and usually last for over 300,000 kilometres.

Steve Mason's daughter, Amy attended Renfrew Education Services and was a passenger on their bus.

Renfrew Education Services has been in existence for 46 years as a Non-Profit Charity and they currently operation five centres around the city.

They also offer specialized in-home programs and services to the Native community.

Tom Buchanan is here today and has been a Board Member since the beginning and Janice McTighe said his efforts and contribution and highly regarded and valued.



Renfrew Educational Services started with one classroom in the Renfrew Boys and Girls centre and soon realized that exceptional learning required special facilities for these children and so it began.

Janice McTighe is proud to say that Renfrew is debt free.

They also assist parents when they recognize that their child may have a developmental problem.

A child's continuing development is often a life changing moment and the teacher are often involved with Renfrew because of a combination of "wonder" and "duty"

Steve Mason thanked Janice for the tremendous work Renfrew did with his daughter Amy and continues to do on behalf of parents, for "walking the journey" with them.

Calgary oil patch icon **Bob Brawn** is helping Heritage Park develop a new attraction to celebrate natural resources and is in the early stages of creating a visionary 14-hectare seniors retirement complex with myriad housing and recreational options. Brawn said the excitement of living gets him up in the morning, adding he still exercises every day.

"Get involved," he said. "Get an education, for sure, but don't be afraid to do anything. Just do whatever turns you on. Get at it, do it well and get involved."

This means that all of the achievements prior to this time cannot be used in the evaluative process. However, this was not a problem when dealing with our own **Bob Brawn**.

We are all familiar with his enduring work in the oil and gas industry beginning in 1958 with Mobil Oil and led to Turbo Resources. This was followed by another series of mergers and acquisitions concluding with Penn West Energy Trust. He still presides over an investment company and has led many community organizations including Calgary Economic Development Authority and the Calgary Olympic Organizing Committee.

Notwithstanding all of that, I was asked "Why Does This Individual Deserve a Top 7 Over 70 Award?"

Since turning 70 years of age, Bob Brawn has escalated his contribution to our city through embracing change and overcoming challenges. He is an outstanding businessperson, visionary, entrepreneur, community supporter, and volunteer. He is a tireless builder, a revered leader, and a person of extraordinary action on a continual basis. Bob creates a vision and using his superior skills and expertise, brings it to life through sound planning and continual collaboration with others. He is a model for "Service Above Self".

Since age 70, he has started a new venture to enhance individual health and wellbeing by developing his own city land into a senior retirement complex unique to our city. His continued work with our Rotary Club has significantly enhanced our community outreach including our current Legacy Project the Stampede Foundation, Dream Home sales, Feed the Hungry, and Calgary Rotary Clubs Foundation (CRCF). His work with Heritage Park to recognize the mavericks who built our oil and gas industry is underway. Amongst all of this he still makes time to actively mentor young entrepreneurs.

In conclusion, Bob Brawn speaks the loudest and clearest with his actions. He inspires those around him by bringing them into his world, his thoughts, his ideas, his visions, his planning and his implementation. His boundless enthusiasm encourages those around him to want to be a better version of themselves, to serve those in need with a great capacity, to build successful and humane businesses. He is undaunted by obstacles and challenges and shows others how to overcome whatever stands in their way. He exudes a quiet confidence that is infectious. One feels invincible when working with Bob. He is a natural leader and just by being around him one is inspired to reach greater heights. He is a most humble individual but when he speaks, all stop to listen. While his extraordinary accomplishments inspire creativity and shape innovation, it is him, as a person, as a leader, as a friend, as a colleague, as a mentor that truly inspires all who are fortunate to walk through his life.

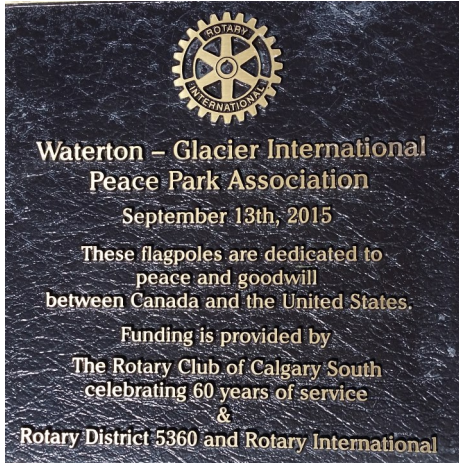

2019 WATERTON PEACE PARK ASSEMBLY

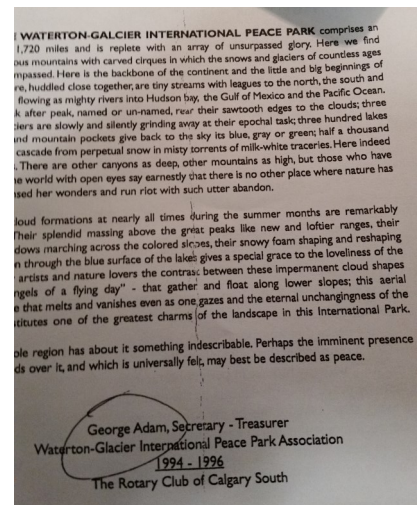

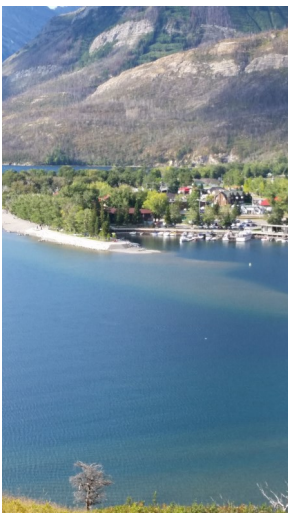

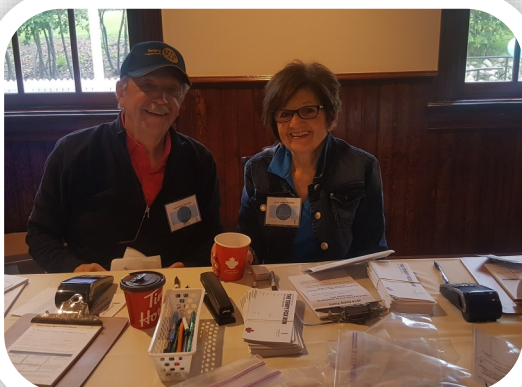
TERRY FOX RUN: SUBMITTED BY GLEN GODLONTON

We welcome Karen to our unique Club and appreciate her role on the Board for the next 3 years

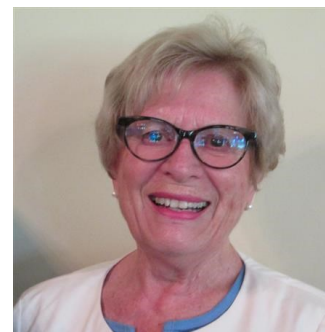
Fellowship: Being Part of Rotary Partners
