GUEST SPEAKER: PATRICK LOR: HIGH TECH IN ALBERTA

Speaker Introduction: John Fitzsimmons: John noted that Patrick was a former member of our Club and joined in 2004 during Len Hamm's year as President. John saw Patrick as a special member who was destined for great success. He also admitted that he, along with other younger members such as himself would sit at the back of the meeting room and cause trouble. John creeped Patrick on social media for 20 years and followed his success with great interest.



Patrick holds an MBA degree and is the Managing Partner at Panache Ventures, a seed-stage venture capital firm that will invest in over 140 Canadian startups over the next 3 years. Although no longer a Rotarian he lives by the values of Rotary in his approach and intent. He is the proud father of two children now 23 & 25.


Today's presentation is "Alberta's Technology Ecosystem" highlighting some of the people and organizations that are helping entrepreneurs build great companies and diversifying the economy. WE always focus on Alberta as an oil-based economy. 16-20% of our economy comes directly from oil and gas. It affects the entire economy. In the early days of the pandemic startup funding dwindled due to the coronavirus (March 2020).

By May 2020, Reuters reported \$15 trillion and counting for global stimulus. Global funding to startups rose to an eye-popping new record-a 157% increase year to year from 2nd quarter of 2020 to Q2 of 2021. There was an acceleration of digital platforms, e.g. Zoom. Due to the savings created during the pandemic, there has been a lot of money going into the technology ecosystem. There have been new record highs for the development of tech companies along with many advances due to digital transformation. Although the volume of deal flow is lower in Calgary than Vancouver, Toronto and Montreal, a lot is happening behind the scenes.

Reflecting on Alberta's technology ecosystem Patrick reviewed 5 key elements to success in digital economy:

1. Goals 2. Supporting Entrepreneurs 3. Funding 4. Investment strategy 5. Community

Alberta's target goal to transform and diversify our economy is the creation of 75,450 jobs by 2031 (representing 5% of the GDP) and 5,556 core tech companies Supporting entrepreneurs through education and mentorship: This is available by a variety of companies: Creative Destruction Lab, SAIT School for Advanced Digital Technology, Startup Edmonton, Innovative Masterminds Edmonton, Platform Calgary and Combine. Funding has been made available through Alberta Enterprise Corporation. \$703 million has been invested into Alberta companies.



Investment Stages were identified: Stage, Ideation, Pre-Seed, Seed, Series A, Series B, Series C and IPO.







GUEST SPEAKER: PATRICK LOR: HIGH TECH IN ALBERTA

Four Key Investment themes to watch that informs the Investment Strategy for Alberta were identified:





Nothing happens without community support. Many entrepreneurs are giving back to the community, through mentorship and investment in startups. Patrick suggested looking at Start Alberta which is a database of all the startups to consider supporting.

Patrick closed by thanking the Club for having him back and noted that Sherry was encouraging him to rejoin us. Good work Sherry! Patrick's contact information: pat@panache.vc and (403) 560-2384.


PANACHE VENTURES

There were a questions about the future of biotech and transformation of jobs due to the advance of technology. Patrick advised there is investment into biotech in Alberta and it's a big trend with the potential for custom tailored drugs and quicker development of drugs. Patrick noted there will be a generational shift to more jobs online requiring a different skill set as well as a massive amount of automation reducing current workloads. The transition will be painful but there will be greater opportunity to increase social benefits and do more societal good by lifting people out of poverty.

With all that our region has endured over these past years; now approaching a decade it is indeed inspiring to see that the same vision shared by many of the senior members of this club who - themselves - shaped our city and province is now being carried on - through a new generation of entrepreneurs who still see - and who still value - the potential here. 
