

Rich Vesta Harmony Beef




Bryan Walton introduced our Guest Speaker *Rich Vesta from Harmony Beef.*

Harmony is working on reopening a beef processing plant in Balzac that was closed down for 7 years after being open for just a very short time.

The plant is state of the art but just needs another 20 million dollars in renovations before it opens again.

When the plant is fully operational it will process 800 head per day, create 325 jobs and put close to 1 billion dollars in to the Balzac economy.

Harmony is committed to the best safety for their employees, best treatment of the animals they process and the best food safety possible.



Grey Cup Pool: Bill Sumner: Bill announced the Pool Winners:





There are many organizations competing for financial gifts. h fact, even within Rotary, there are different pools competing for these dollars. I focus on local giving, because I can see my dollars at work and am comfortable that they will be used appropriately. | have never had much comfort about international giving. Once l learned about the Rotary International Fund, I felt comfortable that people with similar values to mine would conduct due diligence and ensure the funds were placed appropriately. My International gifts have been placed in the Rotary International Fund. I receive recognition as a Paul Harris member, and am awarded a pin for my gifts. I attended a conference in Washington, DC. This October. I have never attended a Rotary meeting outside of Calgary. I am one of those bad Rotarians who don't always wear their Rotary pins. They just aren't big and sparkly enough for my taste. However, knowing I would be going to a Rotary meeting I thought I would wear a Rotary pin. Lincluded my Paul Harris pin in the jewelry I took to Washington. My cab pulled up to a beautiful private club near the Whitehouse. I went in and was talking to another Rotarian. A



second lady joined us and said to the first lady, "Would you like to come in to our meeting and meet the President of Rotary International? The second lady turned to me and said "I can see by your Paul Harris pin that you are one of us and you should come in with us _" It was Rotary week at the White House and the Rotary International President was in town for meetings with the President of the United States.


This is how I found myself in a meeting with and introduced to the President of Rotary International, Mr. Gary C.K. Huang. The meeting was about the upcoming convention in Brazil and some of the bgistical challenges for the convention. Ican give anyone going a "heads up" if you wish. Following the meeting Mr. Huang permitted pictures to be taken with Rotarians. You can see the picture on the screen and note to self, wear makeup next time... Another thing in looking at the picture, you can see that my jacket had lots of things happening, and how that lady spotted my Paul Harris pin, I will never know. Mr. Huang spoke at the meeting. As you know, the theme for Rotary this year is Light Up Rotary. He spoke of how one candle can light another and how our energy can spread. It was a very inspiring meeting to attend.

President AI and I curl together and so you can bet that as soon as the meeting ended. I was on the phone to AI telling him that I had been in a meeting with the President of Rotary International. Poor AI travelled all the way to Australia to the Rotary International Convention this June and didn't get within D000 feet of the President. I am here today to encourage you to donate to Rotary International and to share my experience as a donor. By contributing to this fund, and by becoming a Paul Harris member I had an amazing travel experience which I could never have imagined. As previously noted, the funds we contribute to this fund are stewarded by like- minded individuals around the world, and applied where true global need exists. Before finishing, I also want to tell you about my experience as a resident of High River. I am not sure how many of you are aware that after the floods in 2013, Rotary International provided financing to local businesses to ensure they remained viable through the recovery process. This hand up made a significant different in the local business community and was the sustaining life breath that many of those businesses required. It was greatly appreciated. Someone once told me that they invest their charitable dollars with a particular foundation on the same premise that they use a portfolio manager, i.e., the foundation picks the best charities, similar to a portfolio manager picking stocks, for the investment and allocation of their charitable dollars, for the greatest return on investment. I believe the Rotary International Fund is the best portfolio manager of my international charitable dollars, and the fact that some of those dollars found their way back to my own community when truly needed was further evidence of this. Thank you for letting me share my story with you.

Yesterday, District Governor Garth Toombs distributed a memo to District 5360 Rotarians from the Rotary Club of Canmore concerning their efforts to fight the spread of Ebola using a long-term partner of theirs, CAUSE Canada. Those of you wanting to donate on an individual basis are encouraged to do so.


However, you should be aware that our club has been active on this front also. Within the past 2 weeks Calgary South has partnered with the Rotary Club of Calgary to undertake a joint project with the Rotary clubs in Sierra Leone coordinated by the Rotary Club of Freetown. The Downtown club put in \$15,000 and we added \$10,000. Our objective in this project is to provide life-saving messages and other communications through radio stations regarding the spread and treatment of Ebola to the hardest hit regions of Sierra Leone.

In addition there will be community mobilization and support of a hand washing campaign complete with supplying faucet-fitted buckets and bars of soap, purchase of some protective gear and delivery of food and water to quarantined homes. This is a large priority of our World Service Committee, supported by our Board and we feel the local Rotary Clubs will ensure this money will be well spent and will make at least a small difference.




