


Educating for effective global citizenship



Keith Davis introduced our speaker. **John Lamming** is an impressive young fellow. Born and raised in Ontario, graduated in 2006 with Master of Arts. In 2007 he joined RCMP and was posted to Grande Prairie, then to AB law enforcement with ALERT and has been involved in combatting serious and organized crime every since. In 2013 John transferred to Calgary where he continues to work with the organized crime units. John attended Rotary Peace Fellowship in Bangkok where there were people from around the world learning from each other and sharing experiences.

John said each participant had to look at a conflict at home. He chose organized crime and impact in Northwestern Alberta communities. John's findings were that we needed a two prong approach: 1. strategic attack on leaders of organized crime, since a realistic response to crime may deter youth from getting involved. 2. tackle substance abuse at community level in order to shrink the market.


His Rotary Peace program took him to Nepal where they learned of the rebels coming into villages to recruit children as soldiers. Learning was focused on how to approach the conflict, learn both sides, and come to reasonable conclusion.

When John came to Calgary he wanted to take his experience and learnings and apply "service above self", where he is now involved with Calgary Centre for Global Communities. Their programming is rooted in a strong conviction that we are at a crossroads but through capacity building, development and education we can bridge the gap between local and global.

The Centre offers a number of programs including: Human Voice Project: learn using story telling, Solutionaries Leadership Training which builds capacity of leaders in our community, and Seminars in Peace and Global Citizenship: concept of global citizenship.

Senator. In Rwanda Mr. Dellaire tried to stop genocide of 800,000 but unfortunately the world turned a blind eye. He did what he could and saved as many as possible. He now suffers from post traumatic stress disorder which is prevalent in soldiers and police force. He will be honoured at the event and awarded the Peace Prize. John's definition of peace: it must start from within. People must find capacity in themselves to understand how to move forward. We are all capable of doing terrible things, as well as great things. He also teaches that as a leader, we have an obligation to recognize opposing points of views and have empathy.

Terry Allen thanked our speaker whom he met last year. Terry acknowledged John's work with students in District 5370. Calgary South supported the development of seminars and the club gave \$2500. Terry thanked John for his work and congratulated him on his success as a Rotary Peace Fellow. On behalf of the Club, President Allan added his gratitude for the time spent with us today by making a donation on John's behalf to the Rotary Stay in School Program.




Mark officially launched the 2015 Dream Home. The "Go Live" date is

year being Martin's convention we want to be well represented. If you need a hand with any planning, or have any questions, speak with Earl.




Sherri Austin: What does Mardi Gras mean in French? Translation is Fat Tuesday which Sherri got right so table owed.

To the group: How many watched the Flames last night? Those who didn't owed a dollar for missing a great effort by our Calgary Flames team.





History Moments Rotary Club of Calgary South 1955 -2015

History Moments will be published on a regular basis in our Club Bulletin as a lead up to our 60th Anniversary meeting on April 2nd. The primary source for these articles will be our 50th Anniversary Publication –Manchester to Calgary South 1955- 2005 authored by Peter Penner.

Excerpts from Manchester to Calgary South 1955- 2005

Fertilizer, Garage Sales, Concession Stands

Common amongst all of the activities that any Rotary club needs to undertake is to find a way to raise money to fulfil their mandate to provide support to their community and to fund International Projects.

The Rotary Club of Manchester selected as their first major project in 1955 the sale of advertising for the Stampeder Football Club; there is no record of the proceeds from this endeavour. The club also undertook to park cars during the Stampede resulting in a net profit of \$366.85. In 1957 a Grey Cup pool was proposed and accepted, this raised \$2,000.00

In 1962, George Seaborn proposed hands on project, the sale of fertilizer in bags weighing 50 pounds. In the first year the club members sold 1,043 bags while in the second year enthusiasm for the project had waned and only 715 bags were sold. It was decided that the physical work and pressure on families and neighbours did not justify the rather modest monetary return, so other initiatives were proposed.

The Calgary Brewery and Malting Company had a wonderful aquarium on the grounds just off 9th Avenue and one of the members, Jim Kerr, helped the club secure the rights to the concession stand within the building in 1960. As one might imagine this commitment required a great deal of planning and support from the club members and not unlike our continued efforts to recruit volunteers for the Dream Home, manning the concession booth had the same issues. In the first year of full operation, the club realized more than \$2,500.00, while in subsequent years the amounts raised for club projects varied from \$2,800 to \$3,500.00. In 1969, the Brewery closed the aquarium and this source of revenue was lost. Other fund raising initiatives in 1966-1967 included the sale of Grey Cup tickets, and wine tasting and fashion show and the sale of tickets to the Stampede spring horse show.

The Giant Garage Sale, was advertised as "everything was saleable, except your Rotary Ann and the clothing on your back." The first sale was held in May 1970, but the collections of items began in early March. The Rotary Anns added clothing by making it a rummage sale, when it was over they had made \$6,000.00. As one might imagine this was a labour intensive project and required the support of all Rotarians and their families. In 1971, the club realized a much reduced amount of \$4, 395.00 but in 1972 the amount was \$6,500.00. The garage sale continued until 1978 and in the last three years of operation raised \$35,000.00 for community projects.

The Garage Sale brought all of the members together for a common cause and required a great deal of hard work over a long period of time, so there is no doubt that all of the Club member were delighted to learn in 1977 that the Club was officially designated as the group to sell Raffle Tickets on the \$150,000.00 Dream Home at the Calgary Stampede. 





