My father was a railway telegrapher in Virden, eventually moving to become the freight agent in Calgary. He was a Rotarian in the Calgary Club, so I have been part of the Rotary family for many years. My mother was a nurse in Virden and a stay at home mom in Calgary. I attended Crescent Heights High, then the University of Alberta in Calgary and in Edmonton.

I started my teaching career at Connaught Jr. high, then Mount Royal Jr High, Administrative Assistant in the CBE central office, Assistant Principal at Viscount Bennett, first Principal at H. D. Cartwright Jr.



High, then Principal at Bowness High, Winston Churchill High and Western Canada. After retiring I went back to work for the Science Alberta Foundation for 6 Years. I continued to volunteer with Science Fairs, but I also served on the Education Committee of the Calgary Foundation and then was Chair of the Grants Committee for 9 years.

I am proud of the fact that over my 34 years in Education, I think I have had a major impact in helping thousands of young people to achieve their education goals. Two of the grads from Winston Churchill, Craig Stokke and John Labun, are Members of our Club. And, of course, the SISP in the Club is a significant program for students and I am gratified that I have been part of that program.

During the past 26 years Rotary has become an important part of my life, and it has allowed me to make many new friends, both those of you sitting in this room and other Rotarians I have met at Peace Park and conferences. Waterton Glacier International Peace Park is an important aspect of Rotary to me and serves as an example of what can be accomplished regardless of borders. My time as Chair of that organization was very rewarding for me. I would also like to thank those who served on the Board of Directors during my Rotary Year. Their assistance and dedication was very much appreciated.

We do great work in Rotary and we must all be proud of the commitment we make to our Motto – "Service Above Self". I truly appreciate the opportunity to continue to serve and thank you for this honour.

Past District Governor Ken Copithorne thanked **Terry** and **Sharon** for their help and support during his year, which was both the Rotary Centennial Year and the Club's Golden Anniversary, with many events and projects.

President Ken noted that he had served on **Terry's** Board during his Rotary Year and was impressed by his leadership. Now that he is President the ability to reach out to Past Presidents such as **Terry** for advice and guidance is much appreciated.

She is a previous Rotarian in Yellowknife, where amongst other responsibilities, she led an Interact group, ages 12 -18, on a field trip to South Africa. She has agreed to come and share some of those experiences with us. **Susan** is a guest of **Dorothea Schaab**, who is our Interact Liaison with our St Mary's partnership.

I was a member of the Yellowknife Rotary Club for 17 years and occupied most positions.

In October 2008, Interact was created at the school where I was working as a career practitioner.



In 2011 and 2014, members of the Interact Club travelled for three weeks to South Africa. We chose South Africa as we could develop an ongoing relationship with a school and Interact club in Richards Bay, and we had a personal contact with a friend who also volunteered there.

We were hosted by families of Grantleigh School, and stayed in their boarding facilities while we were in Richards Bay. We did a number of volunteer activities and some tourist activities as well, including a safari. We also spent a week living and volunteering in Soweto, which is the poorest town in South Africa.

In December 2012, a group of students from Grantleigh visited us in Yellowknife where they were hosted by us, volunteered, attended classes, and were good tourists, being introduced to a Canadian winter.

When we returned in 2014, we went back to many of the places we volunteered, and also spent some time in Cape Town and again in Soweto (also finally got to see an elephant in the wild). What will I remember most? The friendships we made, the beauty of the country, and the spirit of the people – many had nothing, but had everything.

Wayne Dean SMITH

"When he shall die,
Take him and cut him out in little stars,

Wayne passed away peacefully on January 18, 2017 at the Colonel Belcher in Calgary.

Born on September 25, 1920 in Milk River, Alberta to Harry and Francis Smith, he grew up skating and swimming on the river.

Wayne wanted to be in business since childhood. His first venture as a teenager was selling Liberty magazines. At the age of 18 Wayne attended Garbutt's Business College in Calgary. After graduation he joined the <u>army</u> on August 30, 1939. Assigned to the Corps of Military Staff Clerks, he worked in Calgary and Ottawa until his discharge in June of 1947.

A family man, Wayne married his beloved Ethel in 1946. They were happily married for 49 years. Together they opened Smith's Grocery. Eager to embrace new challenges Wayne started at Associated Grocers. With one truck driver and an accountant Wayne developed the business into the largest wholesale grocery company in western Canada and the second largest in Canada, employing around 800 people when he retired.

A longtime member of Rotary he valued people and friendships. Wayne was a man of faith and a great believer in the power of positive thinking. Often imparting words of wisdom such as "keep your eye on the doughnut and not on the hole."

He loved westerns because the good guys always won. An avid gardener, Wayne was also active in golf and swimming. We lost a true gentleman with a kind spirit whose sparkling blue eyes embraced every aspect of life.

He was predeceased by his wife Ethel, grandson Justin, brother Don and stepson Nigel. He is survived by his daughter Candace, granddaughter Solveig (Giovanni), great-granddaughter Sophia, stepson Lawrence (Pat), grandchildren Debra (Art), Laura (Pete), Brent (Kelly) and Mark (Sherolee), Dean (Lena), Craig and numerous great-grandchildren, nieces and nephews.

Thank you to Dr. Donovan Kreutzer and the staff of the Colonel Belcher on the Dover and Strathcona units for the compassionate care provided to Wayne. A special thank you to Dr. Lisa Morrison for her help over the years.


