Gena Rotstein introduced our Speaker, Kevin Crowe. Gena spoke of the incredible energy you feel when walking into our Club. She had that experience when she first met Kevin. She learned he has an audacious goal: to provide 1 billion miles of customer loyalty program points to those in need of visiting a terminally ill or critically sick loved one.

Kevin Crowe asked us to consider the hardest question anyone had ever asked us. His hardest question came for a 41/2 year old boy who asked: "What is wrong with my dad?" The dad was Ryan, a good friend of Kevin's and he was dying of brain cancer. It was heartbreaking to lose his friend and he needed to do something. Ryan had taught him the power of time... time with family during illness. He heard a statistic-that 10 trillion travel miles go unused. He asked himself; Why don't we take these travel miles and arrange compassionate flights?

Kevin started this amazing program called: "Give a Mile".

They get connected through Social Workers, Healthcare Workers and Hospices. They put the requests on their website and use technology to make it as easy as possible.

# **KEVIN CROWE:**



This is the second year for **Give A Mile** and they have arranged 200 flights per year. To date they have used 4.3 million donated miles. One of their partners, Aeroplan, recognizes them as a charity and eliminates the transfer fees.

Kevin explained that there are 3 key elements to the idea we are trying to make happen:

- A tangible outcome your miles are not going to an organization, they are going to a specific person's story that you choose to connect with. This is how we believe the new social media giving model works. Donate to a specific person and a tangible outcome.
- 100% donation model all points given go to that specific person's story to help them not to an organization in the middle. Funds that go to running our operation are raised separately and declared as such.
- Via the Web the transaction has to be easy and simple for those donating and those receiving points.

Kevin then told us of two compassionate flights. The first was a daughter from South Africa who hadn't seen her father in 35 years as she couldn't afford to fly to Canada. Her father was dying and the reunion of daughter and father was arranged. The second flight was arranged for another daughter. Her father, Pedro came to Canada from Nicaragua to find a better life for his family. Before he could save and send for his family, he became terminally ill with stomach cancer. His dream was to show his daughter why he came to Calgary.

**President Al** added his thanks to Kevin and provided him with a certificate acknowledging the \$100 contribution to the Stay in School program on Kevin's behalf.







## **RCCS: SMALL GRANTS FUNDING**



#### **Helping Families Handle Cancer Foundation**

\$7,500

This not – for – profit organization helps families who are struggling financially with their household bills when their child is battling cancer at the Alberta Children's Hospital. They deal only with families who are referred by social workers at the hospital. Some of them have been dream home shift volunteers for us.

Providence House \$7,700

This money is part of a \$52,700 contribution being made towards the purchase of an Aeroglider to expand the playground at the Windsor Park facility. This is a wheelchair – accessible glider to be installed at the busiest playground / classroom Providence Facility. It has room for two wheelchairs, two large benches for many other passengers, internal table / handheld and allows all children with disabilities to participate.

#### **Vecova Centre for Disability Services and Research**

\$6,000

This is for the purchase of two specialized water wheelchairs for mobility challenged patrons who wish to avail themselves of the many benefits of swimming in their accessible Recreation Centre. These chairs will allow individuals who live their daily lives in a wheelchair to participate in a sport that might otherwise be off limits. The Centre serves a greater population of persons with disabilities than other recreation centres in Calgary.

L' Arche \$5,000

L' Arche provides support for 29 people with developmental disabilities. They have 5 homes in Calgary, a Supported Independent Living Program and a Day Program. They are in critical need of a new van to replace a 2003 model that has become unreliable. Our \$5,000 grant is one of 3 at \$5,000 to purchase a lift for the can to allow wheelchair access.

Hull Homes \$10,000

Hull homes have a comprehensive continuum of 28 programs and services that reach over 3,500 kids and families every day. Their vision is to help children be free from behavioural and mental health challenges that impact them, their families and society. This grant is a very small part of their Work Experience and Life Skills Centre where young people will be taught personal grooming, money management, grocery shopping, laundering, food preparation, job finding, resume writing and much more.

#### **Boys and Girls Clubs of Calgary Bowness**

\$10,000

The Boys and Girls Club of Calgary started in 1939 under the leadership of the Rotary club and Calgary Police department. They now have over 40 different programs in over 25 locations in Calgary but are in real need of these funds for the renovation of their kitchen at the Bowness Club location.

#### **Brown Bagging for Calgary Kids**

\$15,500

There is a tremendous need for children who come to school without a lunch or without a complete meal to be properly fed so that their focus is on education rather than hunger. They currently work within 140 schools feeding 2000 kids per day but need upgrades to their kitchen because demand is growing. This grant will provide these upgrades.

Hospice Calgary \$5,000

The projects we look at never provide for the dying and bereaved in our community so the committee felt that it was time to look in this direction. Our recommendation for the \$5,000 will cover the cost of 2 sleeper – lift chairs which go in the patient bedroom and are used by both patients and family member to sit or recline for a nap.

Sonshine \$8,500

Each year Sonshine becomes home to approximately 50 families, the majority of whom are considered high risk for fatality or serious injury as a result of domestic violence. Two thirds of the women who enter their shelters come with children. They have built a Sonshine Children's Centre; our grant will go to the provision of needed appliances for the kitchen so that the centre can officially open.

Inn from the Cold \$12,190

Inn from the Cold provides temporary emergency shelter to homeless families and those in need. Their shelters feature semi- private rooms for guests. Every family is linked to a family support worker who will help access the programs they need as they prepare for housing and life in the community. This grant is needed for renovations that are necessary for the entrance to the facility.

The Calgary Drop – In & Rehab Centre Woodshop Training & Production \$5,500

The Calgary Drop in Centre Woodworks project is an educational / employment training branch of the Drop in Centre. The woodworker's project assists individuals who suffer from homelessness, addictions, disabilities and at risk teenagers who fall through the cracks in the Social Services net. These individuals are taught Life Skills and Woodworking Training (Ages run from 16-30) to assist them in finding work or apprenticeship within a trade. Our grant will be used in the purchase of a table saw.

#### Calgary Women's Emergency Shelter

\$8,200

This shelter is a stand – alone organization with the mission to support individuals and families in their efforts to live free from family violence and abuse. In 2013 over 12,800 women, children, youth and men were served by the agency. Only 5% of clients actually use the emergency shelter facility but a need has been identified for better security there and our grant will go to an upgraded video intercom system.

Recipient of the Rotary Club of Calgary South 'R.A.P.' \$1,500 Scholarship was Kurtis Rybachuk who will study welding at SAIT. Kurtis was also the recipient of the award for Fabrication 30 (Career & Technology Studies).



Mirabelle Harris-Eze (she placed third in the 4-Way test speech competition) was awarded for Theory of Knowledge 35 IB, the St. Mary's Class Valedictorian Scholarship and a scholarship for \$5,000 from St. Mary's Girls School Alumnae. She plans to study Business and Law at the University of Calgary.

Rebecca Mesay (who placed first in the 4-Way test speech competition) was the recipient of the Yonas Amahazion Memorial Scholarship and the Premier's Citizenship Nominee Award. It is Rebecca's plan to study Political Science at St. Francis Xavier University in Antigonish, Nova Scotia.




