

Jim Fitzowich introduced our Speaker, Sean Chu. In 1985 Sean Chu moved from Taiwan where he provided 3 years of military service. Once in Calgary Sean attended Mount Royal University.



Sean was elected to his

first term as City Councillor for Ward 4 on October 21, 2013. Prior to that he was a member of the Calgary Police Service for 21 years. He worked as a member of the Motorcycle Unit, Traffic Unit, Asian Beat Unit, Wire Tapping Unit and the Diversity Resources Team, where he received both the Calgary Police Service Distinguished Service Award and the 20 years Service Award medal. His contribution to community initiatives such as the Federation of Calgary Communities, Wildrose Lion's Club and Sien Lok Society has been recognized with both the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal and the Alberta Centennial Medal.

Currently Sean calls the community of Sandstone home with his two beautiful daughters. He sits on the following City of Calgary Policy Standing Committees and Special Committees: Transportation and Transit, Utilities and Corporate Services, Land and Asset Strategy, Calgary Homeless Foundation, Gas, Power and Telecommunications and Calgary Housing Company.

Councillor Chu described himself as a fiscal conservative and told us that Calgary is the economic engine of Canada. He spoke of the "Calgary Advantage" rather than the "Alberta Advantage". He wants to work toward a more efficient and accountable City. He noted that he had voted "No" to increase property taxes. His priorities were focussed on the economic side. Calgary needs to do more to attract businesses. More business means more money. Without business we will not have the City we have now. We need more diversification. Oil is low which will result in a 7 Billion dollar hit to our economy. We want to revitalize at the community level and cut the red tape. We need "one stop" shopping. There are too many silos at City Hall We need to change the thinking and the outcomes.


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

department do the parks? We also need to look at vacancies within the City. Do we always need to replace? We are not talking layoffs but attrition and efficiency. There are currently 700 vacant positions, maybe we could manage a 1000.

Councillor Chu then took some questions. When asked about Premier Prentice's recent statement blaming Albertans for the current deficit, Sean did not see it as blaming but rather advising that we all need to tighten our belts. Another comment that "Council doesn't get it" by approving bike lanes and questionable art projects, Sean agreed that Council needs to approve what makes sense . He further commented that a proposal to have a cycle track on McLeod Trail was "craziness" and not worth it. Another question was about the provincial decision to postpone the new Cancer Centre and the fact that no one at City Hall spoke out against this decision. Councillor Chu responded that it was a provincial matter and any critique should be done behind closed doors. The last question had to do with the continuing controversy of secondary suites. Sean agreed that the issue needs to be dealt with

once and for all and recalled the Referendum in Scotland and the British Prime Minister's comments following the "No" vote that the matter was now settled for a generation to come. Finally, Jimmy Cho our Exchange Student a fellow Taiwan resident was formally introduced to Councillor Chu. Councillor Chu concluded by asking all of us to remember the Calgary advantage. Terry Allen thanked our speaker and wished him all the best in dealing with the tough issues facing City Hall.



President Al added his gratitude to the speaker for spending time with us by making a donation on his behalf to the Rotary Stay in School Program.

Tree Planting – A Tradition of Remembrance and Honour

Past President and Past District Governor, Bob Dawson began the tradition of planting trees to recognize each member of the Club in 1972. The bulletin of the day stated that Bob "had everything under control today at River Park for the planting of 125 May Day trees". It was a memorable occasion and some tears were shed as six trees were planted in memory of past members.

Tree planting has now continued as a Club Project on a fairly regular basis, with trees being planted in many city locations such as Lindsay Park (Talisman Centre), Pierce Estates, Rotary Challenger Park, Prairie Wind Park and Rotary Park. Later the tree planting moved to the vicinity of Stampede Park where it is believed that this will continue after the renovations and changes which are planned have been completed.

When our Rotary Club celebrated our Fiftieth Anniversary in 2005, our tree planting was a significant and somewhat sombre event. While we were celebrating our birthday as a Rotary Club we also honoured the memory of the Fallen Four, members of the RCMP who were killed in Mayerthorpe that year and recognized the contributions of fallen members of the fire department and armed services. We were honoured at that event to have the Lieutenant Governor of Alberta, Norman Kwong as our guest.

In 2004- 2005, District Governor Ken Copithorne initiated a joint program to mark the Centennial of the Province of Alberta and of Rotary International, by providing a lasting legacy of trees to communities across Southern Alberta. The trees and shrubs provided under this program helped to beautify the landscape and to sequester carbon dioxide emissions, mitigate noise, deliver shade and provide habitat for wildlife. In some cases the trees and shrubs were planted in Centennial Parks to pay tribute to Alberta's pioneers. \$50,000.00 was dedicated to this project during that time.

The number of trees planted by our Rotary Club since 1972 is extensive and probably num-

bers over 1000, when you consider the large number of Rotarians, spouses and other individuals who have been honoured by the Club. During the past years the tree planting program has been organized by Terry McDonough whose work has been very much appreciated.



Jimmy's Jottings





The Rotary Club of Calgary South National Immunization Tours



Hello District Rotarians

Re: National Immunization Day (NID) tours

A committee of interested Rotarians met on February 11, 2015 to discuss the possibility of increasing our member involvement with NID tours.

Over many years, Rotary members have visited countries where polio is still a threat, to immunize children by administering the oral polio drops. The organization of an NID tour is carried out by professional tour organizers who are usually Rotarians themselves. A group of Rotarians who have previous experience will link up with Rotarians who are inexperienced to form an NID team. The NID portion of a tour runs about 7-10 days but your time outside Canada may be longer should you wish to include before or after the NID tour hands-on service in an international project or do some personal travel either within the host country or elsewhere. Normally these non-NID activities would fall outside the scope of the tour organizer but the organizer may be of assistance as a few of them are also tour agents.

The start of an NID tour consists of some acclimatization time while visiting nearby polio or other health facilities where interaction with the children is encouraged, attending one or more local Rotary meetings, visiting Rotary/Rotaract projects either completed or in progress, participating in Rotary/Rotaract activities and events and, not to be overlooked, enjoying sightseeing in the area.

Then the real purpose of the visit begins – the immunization of young children. Depending on the targeted area and the number of children to be immunized, 1.5 to 3 or even 4 days are spent walking door to door administering the vaccine under the guidance of local officials, including Rotarians, and partners of Rotary such as WHO and UNICEF but it is the visiting Rotarians who will place those two precious drops in the mouth of each young child. (When speaking of Rotarians we include spouses or others who may come on the tour as Friends of Rotary. A minimum age may be applicable.) Typically your costs could average around \$8000 per person, taking into account travel (to the country and locally), visas, hotel and food, required travel immunizations and insurance, and other miscellaneous expenses.

We are proposing to join the following tour groups. If you have an interest, which means you would like to be on the mailing list as we develop the plans, please e-mail Garth to that effect. (e-mail below). You can also indicate specific interest in one of the Tours below, if you wish, and we will keep you informed of developments regarding it.

Tours -

October 2015 – Ethiopia (with optional 7-10 day organized side trip to Uganda post-NID program) – Gail Williams, Co-Chair of our committee will investigate through her contacts to see if our District could have 5-10 spots on the tour. Since this is coming up quickly, a July firm commitment to the organizer will be required.

Other Fall tours - Possibly West Africa - specific countries to be determined

February-March 2016 – India – location to be determined.

Other tours, going farther into the future will also be considered if there is interest.

No tour will be organized to go into areas considered to be dangerous, such as Pakistan or Afghanistan, or into areas where Ebola is of concern

For further information on NID Polio tours, type NID Tours Rotary into Explorer, or Firefox. Several websites will come up and you can research further as to what is involved in a typical tour.
