




President Murray Flegel: Dream Home Project



President Murray enlightened us with a very special presentation on the Dream Home.

We have been after Stampede Lotteries for years to have something else to sell and they have come through with the

About 300 selling and printing shifts have already been released to our "Legends" – those 54 Members who are over 75 years old, and all of these shifts were booked within 24 hours.

This leaves about 500 selling and 300 printing shifts for the 100 Members (and Partners) who are younger than 75.

There are also about 150 shifts allocated for Supervisors, Cashiers and Accounting. We want Rotarians in as many of those 500 selling shifts as possible, so to keep it "Fair to all concerned", we are asking that these shifts be spread between Members and Partners and that volunteers be used to fill in as required and for printing shifts.





GENA ROTSTEIN: INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY

Gena Rotstein gave a very cogent presentation to recognize International Women's Day, even though she confessed to being nervous because she had invited her parents to the meeting.

To be an entrepreneur is to be courageous and brave. Each one of us in this room have taken on risks and dug deep to launch our companies, or rise to a leadership position in our organizations. This week I was given the opportunity to reflect on what it means to be an entrepreneur, business owner and mentor and it hit home on Tuesday when I was celebrating International Women's Day with a



group of 100 equally courageous and brave business leaders and professionals. When I looked around that room I realized the sacrifices that were made for all of us to get there. Bravery is something that is not readily taught to young girls, and overtly discouraged as those same girls turn into young women.

International Women's Day is a day dedicated to raising awareness around social, economic and political issues facing women nationally and internationally. I would add to this list, it is a day to celebrate and encourage girls and women to be courageous and take risks that open them up to failure.

I was born in 1974, the eldest of 3 daughters and 8 granddaughters. I grew up in a household where my mom worked with my dad in our family pharmacy. My parents instilled in me the values of hard work, social activism, and responsibility so I find it interesting that over 40 years later we, as a society, need to have a day recognizing the achievements of, and issues facing, 50% of our population... It seems to me that gender parity in the workforce, the right to vote, the right to own land, the right to equal education, the right to inherit wealth, and the right to create my own wealth would be a political, social and economic no-brainer.

In past years for my talk on International Women's Day, I have raised awareness on the plight of women refugees, the issues facing women in the developing world around land rights and opportunities for inheritance and other social issues. This year, I want to bring the discussion home and celebrate the successes that women in business have achieved in Canada.

Today I want to talk about workplace parity. This is different than equal pay. Parity follows an economic **and** social line, as opposed to equality which is about social balance and leads itself to interpretation of value.

I want to address this topic, **not because it is 8672** as was our Prime Minister's reason for a gender balanced cabinet. But because, as a woman who owns a company that straddles two male dominated industries - technology and finance with the female dominated sector of philanthropy we need to have this conversation. As business owners and leaders in our communities we should not be satisfied with status quo and we absolutely should be fostering environments that extoll the virtue of bravery and self-authorization. For it is these two characteristics that will serve us well as we tap into the 50% of the population who make up the workforce and who feel as though they cannot, or do not, have the voice to take risks.





GENA ROTSTEIN: INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY

On the global scale, according to The World Economic Forum Canada ranks 30th when it comes to closing the gender gap in four key areas: health, education, economy and politics. This is not too shabby and provides us with a baseline for improvement.

The WEF predicts that the global gender gap won't close entirely until 2133; in Canada we are positioned to close the gap in the next two decades... if we make a concerted effort to do so.

Today, Canadian women earn 73 cents for every \$1 a man earns in the same job with the same education. There is much to unpack in these numbers, which I won't get into today. Suffice it to say, even if we keep our social mores the same these figures translate into trillions of dollars of economic benefit to Canada.

What if we took the parity question in a different direction and focused on building out an entrepreneurial

spirit that supports and embraces courage, risk and bravery in young women? 80% of Canada's economy is built on small and medium sized business and research shows that companies with women in key leadership positions out-perform their competitors and the market year-over-year.

In 2013, 15% of businesses were owned by women, representing 7% of the GDP. What would our business communities and industries look like if we started teaching and encouraging young girls to be brave and courageous, rather than strive for being a "superwoman" or perfection – two ideals, that I feel are unattainable, unrealistic and result in dissuading women from creating their own businesses and striving for higher rungs on the career and social ladders.



What would it look like if we as business owners and community leaders created mechanisms to engage women more effectively at the board level or in upper management? From a business perspective we know that when there is diversity in the workforce, on the management team and at the board level, companies outpace their competitors who have limited gender balance. In fact, according to Catalyst, a multinational HR and recruiting firm, by integrating women in leadership positions within a company your firm will have measured results in reputational standing amongst customers and vendors, at a governing or strategic level there will be a bulwark against "groupthink", and from a productivity perspective a diverse workforce positively shifts group dynamics and improves creativity.

So today I ask you to consider the make-up of your companies, and perhaps look at ways that you can engage, mentor, diversify, support and encourage women to grow and expand their integration and voice in your circles of influence. I have said it before, my Rotary experience in this club is something that I cherish and value.

When we consider the four-way test:

Is it the truth? Is it fair to all concerned? Will it bring goodwill and friendship? Will it be beneficial to all concerned?

Gender parity, like the right to vote, the right for equal education, the right to inherit land and create one's own wealth is just a no brainer. Please join me in raising a glass to the women business leaders, community activists and tree-shakers who have paved the way and continue to pave the way for others, men and women, to be brave and courageous and take risks in business.

Classification Talks: Two New Members gave their Classification Talks today.




