

Harry Saunders: Myth Busters

Rick Scott introduced our guest speaker Harry Saunders. Harry was born in Drumheller in 1966. Harry grew up with a love of historical buildings and went on to earn an honors degree in history from the University of Calgary. He is an author and broadcaster, having worked at the Glenbow, Heritage Park and the



Calgary Jewish Museum. He is currently Heritage director at the City of Calgary. He is married with two children.

Harry describes his profession as applied history and in his case his research is used in city planning. Occasionally he is called on to do "emergency" historical research, one such occasions was the Centre Street Bridge Lions.

The Hunt House is an example of how continued research tells us more about our historical properties. The Hunt House has been considered the oldest property in Calgary. It had been reported to have been built by a Hudson Bay company Metis freighter by the name of Lois Roselle in 1886. Other evidence suggests it may have been built later and may have been used for a variety of purposes including a possible brothel. The Hunt house is in Inglewood, Calgary's first community.

When the government contracted with the CPR to build the transcontinental railroad, they gave them \$25 million in financial incentives and 25 acres of land and right-of ways. They built the station on the site of the current Calgary Tower and encouraged all the residents of Calgary to build or move their homes close to the station. That is how "downtown" Calgary ended up in its current location rather than Inglewood, the original center of the city.


Harry went on to talk about Calgary's first mayor, the Park Hotel and the Calgary Fire. Due to a complicated series of election events around elections, the city was "ungoverned" for 10 months. In that time, the new fire engine was not paid for and was sitting in storage and 18 buildings burned down.

As a fourth generation Calgarian, Roselyn thanked the speaker for all the new information he brought to us.



Jim Gorman: 50/50: Don O'Dwyer won \$160.00 today, Congratulations Don.


Glen Potter: Songs: Lisa and Glen led the club in an old familiar song Bye Bye Blackbird. We sounded much better on our second try!

Ken Copithorne Family Scholarship


The Ken Copithorne Family Scholarship was founded in 2006 by providing funds to begin the process of the scholarship.

What is the Calgary Rotary Clubs Foundation?

It is a place where all Calgary Rotary Clubs can invest their charitable funds and is overseen by a Board representing all participating clubs. Each year funds are distributed according to a preagreed formula to these clubs. We have about \$2.6 million invested at this time and about 5% is returned to our Club on an annual basis.

Why should I donate?

There are no administrative fees for this Foundation. Every dollar you donate goes directly into the Foundation. All funds that you commit will remain in our local community to help those in need. Through your generosity you will help feed those who are hungry, help house those who are homeless, help those living with disabilities, help those who are sick, and help those who just need your support to re-build their lives so they, too, may contribute to their community.

How are donations recognized?

Donor recognition begins at \$1000 and you receive a Calgary South Benefactor pin, a personalized certificate, and your name is included on the Donor Recognition Board. Each successive donation of \$1000 includes crystals on the benefaction pin.

What are our Club targets?

Our goal is to raise \$4 million for this Foundation.

We would like to encourage all members to work toward becoming a Calgary South Benefactor. All donations are gratefully received and records will be kept for you.


How do I make a donation?


Better Business Bureau Purchases New Building

top.






Johnson Lake has great mountain views as shown in this panorama shot.

Rotary Club of Calgary South Cleven Awards Program

This special Calgary South Club internal awards program was established in 2006 to recognize the outstanding contribution of club members who take on significant responsibilities and commitments in furthering the work of our club.

The award is named the "Cleven Award" in honor of and recognition of the first president of the Rotary Club of Calgary South chartered as the Manchester Rotary Club in 1955. Harry Cleven was a very active Calgary community leader and a well-known and respected business man. He was one of 62 people who were killed in the crash of a TransCanada Airlines flight which crashed on Mt. Slesse near Chilliwack on December 9th 1956. He made many positive contributions to the startup and a strong foundation for our Rotary Club.

We already have sixteen members in this special program and expect to induct another two or three this year. New members are nominated by club members with a review by a committee, followed by our club Board of Directors support.

We need your input for future Club Cleven Award nominees and following you will find the important criteria.

CRITERIA

- Ø The award recognizes a strong commitment to and involvement in all club activities.
- Ø The nominee should be an active participant in club committees, who accepts major responsibilities in the committee. They should demonstrate a strong work ethic and timely completion of commitments.
- Ø Members of Rotary Club of Calgary South with membership of at least 5 years qualify for this award.
- Ø Nominees for this award must have an attendance over the last three years of at least 75%.
- Ø This award does not have any repeat winners.

NOMINATION PROCESS

- Ø Nominations can be made by members of the Club through a nomination letter and/or by members of the Recognition and Award Committee.
- Ø Deadlines for nominations will be published in the Bulletin.
- Ø The Recognition and Awards Committee will receive the nominations and make recommendations to the Board for those Club Members who will receive this award.
- Ø The Board is responsible for approving the recommendation of the committee.
- Ø The Award will be presented at a time to be determined by the Board.

GUIDELINES FOR THE RECOGNITION AND AWARDS COMMITTEE

- Ø Normally, there will be 1 to 2 recipients per year.
- Ø Presidents and District Governors are not eligible until 5 years after serving term.
- Ø Members of the Recognition and Awards Committee are not eligible.
- Ø The profile of club committees varies with the type of work, it is therefore important that the Recognition and Awards Committee ensure that all nominations which are received for this award are given equal consideration.
- Ø The Committee will meet within two weeks of the nomination deadline to review the nominees and choose appropriate recipients which will be approved by the Board.
