## **OUR ROTARIANS**



#### IZZEDDIN (IZZY) HAWAMDA: THE KOFFEA

**Note:** Izzy explained to me that "the Koffea is the traditional Palestinian head dress. It has become a symbol of our struggle and resistance worldwide. For me, the koffea is the link between my roots and my heart.

The collective story of my people shown on the face of my grandmother.

The koffea is the proof that I am from that land and I am a witness."

Izzy gave his permission for me to include this recent post from his Facebook page on January 12, 2021

"As a boy, the koffea meant the vivid connection between the land and me. It also demonstrated that the land and I share the same destiny as the land shaped who I am and it's not the other way around. During the olive picking season, as I walked into a land full of olives, I would see my family picking the olives gently as if they were in intimate conversations with the branches. After a long a day of picking olives, my grandfather would take his koffea off and use it as a cloth on the ground. My grandmother would take out our lunch and lay it out on the koffea. As a family of 12, we would sit on the ground and eat together under the olive tree. My grandmother would say that the koffea is the witness and the protector of the olives and we are here to be part of the story.

Living in Canada has been a constant reminder that my story is ignored. My story is written in Arabic, highlighted by years of struggle. So, I often find myself in a space where everything I knew about my world is challenged and miscommunicated. Many times, my story is gasping for air. I find myself fighting to reclaim my agency. My story is unique. It tells of the olive tree and it can be found on the walls of the old city. Being indigenous to Palestine has lent me a full and deep understanding of the power of my story. Today as a teacher, I invite my students to share their stories in my classroom, so I can learn from them and continue my own story



#### **ABDIKHEIR AHMED (ROTARY ALUMNI)**

Abdi has a new Permanent Full Time position as **Executive Director, Aurora Family Therapy Centre**. Many of you will recall that Abdi is a former **Rotary Peace Fellow** who studied at the University of Queensland, in Australia. Abdi has been a speaker at our Club and spoke about his work as Director of the Immigration Partnership Winnipeg/ Social Planning Council of Winnipeg. (5 years)

#### **KAWSER AHMED:**

New Global Grant approved for "Female Adolescent Centred Education [FAE] for the Rohingyas in Bangladesh." (A Rotary Club of Winnipeg supported Global Grant Project)

The proposed objectives of the project are to provide: 1) a needs based education in the selected camps; and 2) inclusive education and life-skill training to 100 adolescent girls who are otherwise deprived of their right to education.



The project will address Sustainable Development Goals #4 (Quality education), and #5 (Gender equality) and at the same time help Rohingya adolescent children to achieve useful skills whether they live in Bangladesh or ultimately are repatriated to Rakhine.

Target group is adolescent children of age 12-18 at the ratio of 3:1 (female: male).

This project will be implemented with the support of Winnipeg Rotary Club in collaboration with Chittagong Rotary Club and a local NGO (Prantic Unnoyon Society).

A Rotary Global Grant GG 2016381 was received in January 2021 for implementation of the project.

#### **ROB TISDALE - MY JOB AS "ASSISTANT DISTRICT GOVERNOR":**

A District Assistant Governor serves primarily as a two way liaison between the District Governor and the clubs. Their primary function is to attend meetings of their groups of clubs at least on a quarterly basis.

My clubs are Selkirk, Gimli and our club. They also attend quarterly meetings coordinated by the DGD and include the DG and PDG as well as two Training and Development meetings that are held for Club Presidents. They are also expected to attend District Conference as well



as any special meetings of their clubs when a District representative is needed for special events.

From these meetings they maintain a familiarity with Rotary International's initiatives and the District Strategic plan. The AG's observe their clubs activities and advise when asked about any issues related to the strategic plan of the district and/or RI. They also ensure there is idea sharing between clubs. They report back to the DG on a quarterly basis with their observations regarding how the clubs are doing. The point of the whole exercise is to ensure clubs can still feel engaged with the District Board and to a certain extent, with RI.

AG's are experienced Rotarians who have served as a Club Board member, President and who have also served on various District Committees. My experience was as a Board member of our club and President in 1996/97

I served on the District Youth Exchange Committee, The Club's Centennial Committee (2001-2010), The Winnipeg/Montreal 2010 Bid Committee, The RI Host Committee for the RI Convention in Montreal 2010

Presently I am Co-Chair of Rotary Adventure in Human Rights Committee (2014 to present.)

#### **NINA LAM (ROTARY ALUMNI)**

Nina spoke to our Club on March 11, 2020, about the **Youth Parliament Manitoba**. (This may have been our last in person meeting.) I recently communicated with Nina and received an update on her involvement with the Manitoba Youth Parliament and a **Testimonial about her Rotary experience.** 

"I joined **Youth Parliament Manitoba** in December 2015, inspired by my experience with Rotary Adventures in Citizenship. After attending my first

session, I went on to serve two years on their organizing committee (first on the public relations team, then on the recruitment team) before being elected to the board of directors. In order, I served as the Director of Procedures, Director of Finance, Vice-Chairperson, and now Chairperson, where I lead the organization in its 100th year. I'm most proud of my behind-the-scenes work for the organization, which includes a redesign of the website, consolidating a closer relationship with the Association of Former Manitoba MLAs, and extensive database development to improve recruitment and community connections."

#### **Testimonial:**

"My involvement in Rotary first started in 2015, when I was chosen by my school's (Fort Richmond Collegiate) Interact Club to attend the Rotary Adventures in Citizenship program in Ottawa. It was one of the first extra-curricular activities that I ever participated in, at a time when I was still figuring out my interests and what I eventually wanted to study in post-secondary. As part of the application process, participants were asked to write a short essay in response to the question, "What does Canadian citizenship mean to you?" My essay was about the freedoms guaranteed to individuals in Canada, which, out of over 200 participants, was chosen as the Best Written Essay. I consider Adventures in Citizenship to be the single experience that catalyzed my passion for politics and civic engagement.

In 2016, I joined my school's (Model United Nations Assembly) **MUNA club** and attended MUNA, where my partner and I earned the **Bert Friesen Award** for best prepared delegation. That year, I also took over my school's **Interact Club** as the president, organizing several fundraisers throughout the year in support of electricity access in Zimbabwe.

It is through these Rotary programs that I came to realize what I wanted to dedicate my life to: serving others and bridging inequalities. For this reason, I chose to pursue a B.A. in Global Political Economy at the University of Manitoba. During my time there, I was actively involved in student government and volunteered hundreds of hours as a student ambassador, peer mentor, and volunteer captain.

I am now currently a student at the Graduate Institute, Geneva, where I am doing my Masters in Development Studies. I hope to eventually work for an NGO in the field of human rights, especially for forced migrants, and/or community development to address poverty/inequality. When I pass by the United Nations headquarters in Geneva, I often think back to the time I had already been at the UN – except the assembly was held in a Canadian Mennonite University gym.

I would not be where I am today without the foundational experiences I gained from Rotary programs in the early stages of my professional development. I am a living testament to the incredible work that the Rotary Club does and how it changes lives. I can only strive to pay it forward and make an impact on others' lives as the Rotary Club has with mine."
