


Annual Fund Appeal has successfully achieved



WHAT ARE YOU READING?

Frank Cosway: You may remember that Terry Hidichuk from the Kiwanis told us about an Israeli and a Palestinian who met through their membership in Rotary Clubs in Escondido and Coranado, California. Their relationship builds from such simple things as visiting each other in their homes. The Israeli had never visited a Palestinian home and vice versa. Their relationship grows from fear to engagement with them making joint presentations to Rotary Clubs. The author says, "Rotary is an organization made up of people who take on impossible tasks and make them happen, and those were just the kind of people with whom we needed to be in touch." It is a very personal story.

Ripple Effect San Pedro Scholarship Programme (Guatemala): The youth and chaperones of St. Andrews United Church went to Guatemala. They also built a garden with irrigation at Pezzarossi School as well as helped them dig for a new foundation as they hope to expand the school. We visited Las Victorias School to deliver 24 laptops that were donated by Balmorall Hall School and refurbished by the technicians at Nav Canada. We met with the Rotary Club of Metropoli to continue building bridges between the Rotary Club of Winnipeg, St. Andrews United Church and the Rotary Club if Metropoli.


