




AWARDS:

Maureen Matthews, a member of our Club, and author of Naamiwan's Drum: The Story of the Contested Repatriation of Anishinaabe Artfacts, won the Alexander Kennedy Isbister Award for Non-Fiction at the 29th annual Manitoba Book Awards held on April 23rd.

Naamiwan's Drum follows the story of a famous Ojibwe medicine man, his gifted grandson, and remarkable water drum. This drum, and forty other artefacts, were given away by a Canadian museum to an American Anishinaabe group that had no family or community connections to the collection. Many years passed before the drum was returned to the family and only of the artefacts were ever returned to the museum.

Maureen Matthews takes us through this astonishing set of events from multiple perspectives, exploring community and museum viewpoints, visiting the ceremonial group leader in Wisconsin, and finally looking back from the point of view of the drum. The book contains a powerful Anishinaabe interpretive perspective on repatriation and on anthropology itself. Containing fourteen beautiful colour illustrations, Naamiwan's Drum is a compelling account of repatriation as well as a cautionary tale for museum professionals.



HUMAN RIGHTS UniverCITY

Emerging Issues in Human Rights

Course HR-2600-001

Classes August 8-18, 2017; final assignments due August 31, 2017



For the seventh year, the unique intensive 6-credit hour course developed by UWinnipeg Global College, with Rotary World Peace Partners 5550 and the Canadian Museum for Human Rights, is being offered to a wide range of students. High school graduates gain an advantage with this course as a "jump start" to their first year in university. Rotarians know that human rights can only be lived in times of peace. This course can be a next step in peace education, including for secondary students in Rotary's *Adventures in Human Rights*. Some Rotary WPP tuition bursaries are awarded each year.

Our city is our human rights campus!

This unique University of Winnipeg Global College course starts with the "class on a bus" for Folklorama, partners with the Canadian Museum for Human Rights - with classes at CMHR, on campus, and at community agencies like Winnipeg Harvest.

Senator Marilou McPhedran, the course founder, returns to direct the course with guest faculty including CMHR experts, filmmaker Darcy Ataman (Panzi Hospital, Congo), Aboriginal rights leaders and global citizenship expert, Prof. Lloyd Kornelsen.
