Vocational Training Team (VTT) from District 5550, in Guatemala: From Feb. 5 - March 5 a team of 6 Rotarians will be at the Joya Verde School in Fraijanes, Guatemala to work with the teachers and students. Joya Verde school is a K-6 school with approximately 175 students. This project is sponsored by Rotary who have been working for years to build a school and improve educational opportunities for the children.

Eva reports: "The project is called "Interactive Learning". We are working with the teachers daily, introducing new teaching techniques and then having them work with these techniques in the classroom.

Our curriculum has been reviewed by a local university and was approved as a certificate program for the teachers we are working with if they complete the session and prepare a portfolio detailing outcomes of new techniques.

We work in the school every day and meet with the teachers after school twice per week for additional coaching sessions.

The kids are amazing and the people in the community are incredibly nice and appreciative of all that we are able to do. The Rotarians of Rotary Club Norte have been gracious hosts, showing us their beautiful country in our few moments of spare time.

It has taken very little time for this place to work its way into our hearts and while we miss home and family, it will be difficult to leave.

Rotary Foundation - Annual Fund appeal: In order to continue to be eligible to apply for Global Grants, our Club must contribute a minimum of US\$50 per member to the Annual Fund, by March 31, 2017. Currently, we are at US\$20 per member. Our Club goal is to contribute US\$4,000 by March 31st. All donations to the Annual Fund count towards a Paul Harris.

For an example of what this means, read the Global Grant for South Africa update under "Rotary Project Updates" below. Our Club contributed US\$10,000, several other Clubs & Districts contributed US\$27,000 and the Rotary Foundation matched it with a grant of US\$28,000., for a total of US\$65,000. I think that is a great return on our investment of about US\$5,000 per year.



ROTARY ALUMNI AND CONNECTIONS:

Susan Thompson: With the approach of International Women's Day, on March 8th., I thought you might enjoy this excerpt from Susan's recent book, "Her Worship".

"He (her father) never accepted that discrimination would stop a woman from achieving anything. His belief in the power of perseverance is one of the most valuable legacies he gave me. My favourite definition of perseverance is: "When the world says 'give up', hope whispers 'try one more time'. And so that is what I did. I applied to the Rotary Club every year for at least eight years and was rejected every time. Finally, in 1989, I was accepted to become the first woman Rotarian in the city of Winnipeg. Perseverance pays off."



ROTARY PROJECT UPDATES:

Global Grant for South Africa, valued at US\$65,000 has been approved by the Rotary Foundation. As part of a large GG project which our club supported in the rural area of Mphopomeni in the province of KwaZulu-Natal in South Africa, computers and televisions were purchased and the teachers were trained in how to access lessons in the major subjects in order to prepare their students for the Grade 12 exams. This was extremely valuable as the first language of these teachers and students is Isizulu while the exams are in English. So successful was this initiative that the pass rate of the students in this school rose from 40% to 70% in the first year of the project.

The Department of Education indicated interest in expanding the initiative to include 10 new schools in the surrounding area.

Our sister club, the **E-Club One of South Africa,** approached us to support this venture which we did very willingly as this initiative is making such a great difference in the lives of so many underprivileged students. Our club's contribution of US\$10,000 matched by our District's contribution of a similar amount constituted the bulk of the total contribution of US\$37,000. This amount along with matching funds from RI resulted in a total budget of US\$65,000.

Boys and Girls Clubs of Winnipeg 40th Anniversary, by Pat Vallance. On Tuesday evening, February 14th, the Boys and Girls Clubs of Winnipeg celebrated 40 years of service to the Winnipeg community. The event was held at Government House.

Members from the various branches of BGCW were present including CSI (Community Schools Investigators) and YAA (Youth Agencies Alliance) which runs the Rotary Leadership Circle summer program, together with supporters.

The Rotary Club of Winnipeg was represented by Strini and Emelia Reddy and Pat and Roy Vallance. Lieutenant Governor Janice Filmon was a warm and generous host who spoke highly of the work being done by the organization and by the many volunteers.

It was a delightful evening during which old friends were met and new friends made amongst people committed to improving the lives of young people in Winnipeg. It was a humbling experience. Honouring Indigenous Peoples Committee (HIP) - Report on "Indigenous Unity Gathering" by Roy Vallance. On February 23rd, the Police held their first Indigenous Unity Gathering at Riddell Hall at the University of Winnipeg. The objective was to



build positive relationships between police officers and youth. Our Committee was one of the sponsors and three of our members attended. It was a very successful evening attended by over 100, with 25 of them being police officers. We ate together, played a game together, were entertained together, and we chatted and got to know each other. We had joint MC's for the evening, an indigenous youth and a young policewoman. They called upon Elder Carol Moar to offer a prayer at the start. After we chatted for a while, we played an ice-breaking game which had all of us scooting around the room talking to many different people; the atmosphere became energized with much laughter and chatting.

The meal was then served by Diversity Foods, a social enterprise; the meal included bison and pike in keeping with the wishes of the Ma Ma Wi Youth Council to have a traditional meal.

There were a few very short speeches, including one from Winnipeg Police Chief Danny Smyth.

Entertainment was provided by a seven year old hoop dancer and Double the Trouble, a dad and his identical twin sons playing fiddles and guitar. David Newman and one of the young ladies at his table showed us how to dance the jig.


South Sudan Educational Scholarships

Elizabeth are now settling into their schools


