**Frank Hornung** celebrated his 88<sup>th</sup> Birthday in early May. His wife passed away last September, and his son shortly after. So as you might guess, he feels a little lonely in his big house in St. Vital. He is considering his options for the future. We talked about his time with Cambrian Excavators, which is part of the Terracon Development group of companies

He grew up in the eastern part of Germany and was a soldier for 4 months, and ended up in a Russian Prisoner of War camp. After

the war, and with the help of the Red Cross, he made contact with an uncle living in Winnipeg. The uncle encouraged his to come to Canada. He then discovered that he needed to get to the western part of Germany to emigrate to Canada. After waiting for two years, he was finally able to get on a ship to Canada. His wife followed 7 months later.


Frank also renewed his membership foe 2017/18

He has had 4 operations on his vocal cords but nothing has helped. Dick use to own Mulder Construction which he sold several years ago to Maple Leaf

Co. Dick nominated Sarah Mulder for membership in our Club. Sarah is no longer a member but is still involved with MUNA. Dick informed me that Sarah is expecting a baby.

Dick has been involved in Rotary for 40 years. He always speaks very positively about his Rotary experience. Because of his voice and mobility challenges Dick has decided not to renew his membership. But he still likes to see people.

Myrna King: I talked with Myrna King on June 21st and she had just moved into her new Condo at Starlight Village at 1112 - 65 Fiorentino St. She said her telephone and e-mail are still the same. She was very excited and very tired from all the moving, but some of her family were there with her. Myrna's father is 96 and currently in hospital.

**Breaking Barriers Building Bridges:** We have completed the first year of our Honouring Indigenous Peoples committee's "Breaking Barriers Building Bridges" project in collaboration with Community Education Development Association Winnipeg. The program is intended to build bridges between indigenous and non-indigenous high school students in our city as part of the Reconciliation process. It turned out to be a great success and we used this first year as an opportunity to receive feedback from the students, teachers and elders. We are in the process of revising the program for next year based on this feedback. We produced a video which will give members a good idea of the impact of the program. #### South Africa:

**Mpophomeni Education Project #2:** You may remember the success of our Mpophomeni education project in 2015. Our major contribution of \$12,000, along with smaller contributions from other partners, resulted in a Rotary Global Grant of over \$50,000. Among the goals of the project was the purchasing of computers and TVs along with



the training of the high school teachers to access lessons from the Internet. English is

not the first language of students or the teachers so these lessons proved to be of great importance so much so that the Grade 12 pass rate in that year jumped from 40 to 70%. Other rural schools requested the same equipment and training so we contributed to another Global Grant application to provide the same service to an additional 10 rural schools. The great news is that this grant has just been approved by Rotary International and the project is about to begin.

## **RECENT SPEAKERS include:**


