A LEGACY OF GIVING TO ROTARY:

Rotary Foundation - Annual Fund Appeal deadline is March 30, 2020 (Important message from Eva Vida)

Good afternoon Rotarians,

In the midst of the Coronavirus Pandemic, we are trying to ensure we are able to continue the good works of Rotary in general and particularly the work of our club.

Our Goal: As you know, annually, we are required to support the Rotary Foundation to the tune of \$50 USD per capita. Our membership as at July 1 was 73, so our USD contributions need to be at \$3,650 before the end of this month. We are currently at \$2,965USD, leaving us at \$690USD short of our goal or at the current exchange rate, about \$931 Canadian.

Why is this important you may ask?

Because it impacts our Club's ability to apply for District and Global Grants for the upcoming Rotary year. That would represent about \$25,000USD per project that we would miss out on if we don't make it.

Current Global Grant applications by our Club include:

- Drilling a well with solar powered pump to provide a permanent source of water at the Lily of the Valley Children's Village in Kwazulu-Natal, South Africa (Our Club contributes US\$10,000 + District & Rotary Foundation US\$25,000.)
- Training teachers in multi-grade schools in rural KZN, South Africa and providing computers and TVs to access lessons off the internet (Our Club contributes US\$10,000 + District & Rotary Foundation US\$25,000.

Two of our recent Speakers demonstrated the ripple effect of participation in some of our Rotary programs.

Insp. Bonnie Emerson, of the Winnipeg Police Service (WPS) recently participated in an intensive 3 month program at the Rotary Peace Centre in Bangkok, Thailand and this was followed by a five day Conference on Mediators Beyond Borders "Disruptors" Mediation Training in Bali in November. From these training experiences Bonnie is having significant input to Training programs for WPS and national Police Training programs.

Bonnie Emerson (March 4th.)

Insp. Bonnie Emerson is one of 22 people from around the world (and one of three police officers) selected by Rotary International for peace fellowships in its 2019 professional certification program at the Rotary Peace Centre at Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok.

Her goal: to use the knowledge to set new paths for the Winnipeg Police Service (WPS) in the community as a whole and with Indigenous people.

Bonnie Emerson is an Indigenous woman, community advocate and police officer. She leads the Winnipeg Police Community Engagement Division and believes police should



play the role of peacekeeper. Bonnie has been actively involved in community and non-government organizations (NGO) boards for over 20 years, working to address poverty, employment, conflict resolution and safety. She has developed a number of collective impact initiatives to address root causes of crime, in nonviolent ways.
