Trying very hard not to spend too much time at any one thing. Reading, TV, computer. We have started digging out old board games. I always lose at scrabble.




Trying to resist the temptation to start writing another novel and overload my poor publisher.

How is Home Instead responding to CORVID19

As a private Home Care business we find ourselves creatively finding ways to support our amazing CAREGivers, clients and their families. It is a challenging time as we navigate through the changing landscape that is home care. The WRHA's implementation of "No Visitors" has left some of our clients without the one-on-one care they require. For example, feeding, bathing and incontinence care not to



mention the companionship that occurs during these visits. This policy has left our client's families with a seemingly impossible dilemma on how to care for their parents.

Last week one of my tasks was to assemble Activity Kits for our CAREGivers to share with their clients. CAREGivers who could not stop into the office to pick up a kit I delivered to their client's home. After a half dozen deliveries it occurred to me I was reliving one of my childhood games "knock on doors". Upon arrival at the client's home I'd jump out the car, put the kit on the doorknob, ring the bell and run before anyone answer.... it was quite hilarious (to me).

I get to play again this week when I deliver Cleaning Supplies to some of our CAREGivers.

Our on-call staff are regularly having to respond to families concerns in a caring, compassionate manner while not being able to schedule CAREGivers to go to PCH's (Personal Care Homes). As you can imagine this situation, while absolutely necessary, is a huge strain on families.

Our CAREGivers are amazing! They continue to care for our clients in the midst of so much uncertainty.

I would welcome your suggestions as to how else we might support our CAREGivers, clients and their families.

I trust you are well and, as social isolation is proving to be a wonderful restorative tonic for Mother nature, that you are finding our much slowed down living to be restorative as well.
