## **BREAKING NEWS:**


GOOD NEWS!! The WHO (World Health Organization) has certified the African region free of wild polio virus on August 25<sup>th</sup>, four years after the final case was recorded in Nigeria .... An incredible achievement worth celebrating after decades long commitment by Rotarians, our partners, and millions of health care workers and supporters. We have shown that we can defeat this devastating disease but the fight is not over as wild polio still paralyzes children in Afghanistan and Pakistan, with 102 cases YTD. 

## **NEW MEMBER:**

Gary Dawyduk (Introduced by Strini Ready)

Gary was born, raised and has always resided in Winnipeg. He graduated with a Bachelor of Arts (from the University of Winnipeg) in 1987 and complemented this with a Certificate in Adult and Continuing Education (from the University of Manitoba) in 2014. Gary retired just over a year ago having spent his previous 27 years working with the Manitoba Liquor Control Commission (which evolved into Manitoba Liquor and Lotteries as of 2014).



The main inspirations for Gary's working career were the educational programs offered by the MLCC, and for the last 13 years

he worked as a Product Ambassador to deliver and continue to develop educational courses on beverage alcohol. These courses were delivered primarily to Liquor Mart retail staff to improve their product knowledge and selling skills. Gary also delivered lifestyle-oriented courses to the general public on the types of liquor products sold in Manitoba, touching on liquor production, history and culture, while always emphasizing the socially responsible consumption of alcohol beverages.

Throughout his adult life, Gary has been keen to be mindful of issues of social justice at home and abroad. He has volunteered with a handful of community organizations, has served on the board of a local anti-racism coalition and has participated as a member of the South Africa Education Support Projects committee since its inception in the early 1990s.

#### Gary: My Tendencies & Motivations (Inductions comment)

I express my gratefulness despite the unfortunate circumstance of induction under the restrictive environment of COVID-19. However, a virtual induction it shall be. I must concede that until we can meet face-to-face and work more directly together, I will be something of a mystery to all of you except for Strini and Rob Tisdale. So, with this in mind, I am going to offer a brief personal reflection on how I have come to join the Rotary Club of Winnipeg by sharing a few key tendencies of mine that have long roots and continue to motivate me today.

The first tendency I wish to mention is that I am an idealist. What this means to me is that, throughout the very fortunate life I have enjoyed, I have always believed that <u>everyone</u> should have the opportunity to live a fortunate life under the best circumstances they possibly can.

This was a very basic tenet of my upbringing, and embedded within, of course, is the belief that we are all equal. Another basic tenet of my upbringing was that pursuing fairness within our community was the way to success, and that ensuring this requires openness, honesty, commitment and hard work.

The second tendency I wish to mention is that I am a socially-minded being. While I, like everyone else, have unique individual attributes, I believe that largest part of how I understand myself has evolved through my interaction with family, friends, colleagues and more broadly, society. From my upbringing, through my education, through my coming of age, through my vocation and career, I have come to learn that I am inseparably a part of both a narrower community and a wider community, and the histories that have shaped them. For me, understanding my community is critical to understanding myself.

Another tendency of mine is that I like concepts. I'm something of a thinker. This has been both bad and good. The bad part is, as you might guess, a tendency to over-think at the expense of doing. The good part is that developing and adhering to well thought-out ideas can provide guiding principles that lead to successful results within a consistent and cohesive framework.

The last tendency I'll mention flows from the previous, which has been a lifelong desire to match thinking with action. Ideas on their own are fine but they need to root themselves in their context. This means that deeds must follow our conceptualizations. On an individual level, it means a willingness to be vulnerable and learn from mistakes while on a social level, it means conflict, dialogue, and consensus. Fortunately, this provides a forum for action which, in the best possible circumstances, results in continued social and personal evolution.

When I first began attending University in the early 1980s, I believed, perhaps naively, that political science was the way to weave thought and action together. I spent a fair bit of time as a social activist and while there were successes, there was also plenty of disillusionment. To make a long story short, I drifted into the field of education within the context of corporate government and through continuing my learning came to realize the transformative power of education. As a result, and to my great fortune I was, in small ways, able to enact the wonderful gift of teaching.

I work closely with Strini on the South Africa Education Support Project and our correspondence to donors contains famous words from Nelson Mandela, who stated that "education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world". This quote captures for me a critical guiding principle that informs us as to how we should proceed to successfully bring together thought with action.

Since early May, Strini has invited me to join the virtual meetings of the Rotary Club of Winnipeg. I've been a wallflower for most of these meetings over the past two months and have been very impressed with what I have seen from this community. It is clear to me that you are a group committed to enacting good deeds under the guidance of strong conceptual principles. It has inspired me to learn more about Rotary through doing further research. As a community that has grown into an international organization, there have no doubt been challenges over the years but the Four-Way Test has obviously provided a conceptual basis that has led to tremendously beneficial results for many communities around the world throughout the history of Rotary. And so I humbly look forward to participating in this community and hope that I am up to the task. Thank you.

	On behalf of Willow Place, thank you for the monetary donations received by us in recent weeks. Two cheques, including \$500.00 dated June 3, and \$300.00 dated June 17, came to us at a time of uncertainty and need re: novel coronavirus (COVID-19), and we are very grateful for your generosity.
	Located in the Winnipeg Region, Willow Place operates Manitoba's largest and most-utilized family violence shelter with 38 beds, and supports between 800-900 individuals in the shelter program yearly. This translates into over 8,500 bednights in a typical year – a "bednight" is a term used in the family violence prevention sector to count each time a woman or child sleeps in one of our shelter beds. All services at Willow Place are confidential and no-cost, and emergency support is available 24 hours, every day of the year. Willow Place also offers public education, follow-up and outreach services in community, including counselling and referrals for men. Thanks to in-kind and monetary support from compassionate community and donors like The Rotary Club of Winnipeg, Willow Place has been able to maintain services and supports to some of the most vulnerable members in our community throughout the Province of Manitoba's COVID-19 State of Emergency.
