ANNOUNCEMENTS

- Earl Newton read a letter from Bob Durston regarding Rotary International approval of the Global Grant for Joy's Centre Project.
- Maureen Torr updated us about Joy's Centre in Uganda. Maureen thanked all 5 clubs for participating in the project with a combined \$10,000 donation. She will present more details to the club March 28th. Maureen is asking for the club's help sponsoring children. The cost is \$35/month or \$420 a year per child. PROGRAM.

Nuru introduced Anthony Olusola who is the Executive Director of Truly Alive Youth and Family Foundation, to speak to the club on Black History Month.

The City of Saskatoon designated February as Black History Month. They also asked the Black community what they would like the theme of the month to be. "Our History, Ours to Tell" was this year's theme. Black people have lived in Canada since the 17th century. First Black person to set foot on Canadian soil was Mathieu Da Costa who was later hired by Europeans to act as a translator between the aboriginal people and the European explorers. Others arrived in the 18th century fleeing enslavement from USA and Caribbean.

In 1908-1911, 1000 arrived in Alberta and Saskatchewan as homesteaders. In the 19th Century Black Canadians worked as porters. Other worked in import sectors like mining and farming.

Black people made many contributions to Canada's victory in WWI and WWII, plus on the home front, Black women fundraised for the war effort to pay for the medical care, burials and births of community members.

The Black population now accounts for 3.5% of Canada's total population. According to 2021 census 14.2 percent of visible minority in Saskatchewan were Black compared to 2001. The Black population of Saskatchewan numbered at least 4 per cent.

Since the 19th century, Black people have contributed to the Canadian labour marked and worked in sectors like mining, farming, etc. Despite ongoing challenges, including discrimination and systemic racism, Black Canadians have excelled in section and industries across the country. 2021 census shows 22.4% of Black population had bachelor degree or higher and 66.6[^] of Black Canadians between 15 years and older are employed.

Black Canadians have served in politics at all three levels; federal, provincial and municipal. Black Canadians are rich in culture and heritage - traditional food, dance and music. They have shaped Canadian heritage and identity. (Ex. Saskatchewan African Canadian Heritage Museum).

There are still many challenges facing Black people including systemic racism, racial profiling of Black youth, and high rate of incarceration, disparity and uneven economic prosperity.

A quote from Maya Angelou - "Only equals can become friends".
