Program – Bill Waiser

Lorne introduced guest speaker, Bill Waiser, Professor Emeritus of History from the U of S. Bill's accomplishments include: the Order of Canada; the Governor General's History Award and Literary Award; Saskatchewan Order of Merit; elected a member of the Royal Society

along with publishing 12 books.

Bill spoke on his latest book: "In Search of Almighty Voice: Resistance and Reconciliation". He detailed the story of Almighty Voice as an excellent example of contrasts. The Almighty Voice story is a popular narrative in plays, movies and in the media but the true factual story of what really happened is very different. The popular story was that Almighty Voice killed a reserve cow; was placed in jail and escaped. When the Mounties chased him down a gun battle ensued and a Mountie was killed.

Afterwards, Almighty Voice was depicted as a "bad Indian" and a "troublemaker" and needed to be brought to justice. A larger NWMP force was sent to catch Almighty Voice and after hunting him down they killed him.

Bill indicated that he spent a great deal of time researching original documents and interviewing many people associated with the factual side of the story. He indicated the 1880s were a very difficult period for the One Arrow Community. In anticipation of more settlers arriving to the west the bison herds were decimated by hunters throughout Canada and the USA.

Starvation on the reserve was caused by the lack of bison and also the department of Indian Affairs choosing to cut back on food rations. Food rations were withdrawn as a pressure tactic to force the indigenous to do whatever the Indian Agent or Indian Affairs government officials wanted. On reserve, the indigenous people were supposed to become farmers and to become self-sufficient. This was almost impossible with the poor quality of reserve land, tools and implements were often not provided and a lack of training and leadership. Also, due to an economic recession in the 1890s, the Canadian government was cutting many department budgets and this included the funding of Indian Affairs programs.

A catholic bishop called life on the reserve "A state of slavery". Almighty Voice was not prepared to accept starvation even though many people living on reserve had already experienced abuse and starvation. He decided to fight for justice.

Based on historical research it appeared that the cow that was killed was a stray that wandered onto the reservation. Almighty Voice did not dispute whether or not that he killed the cow because he did it to feed his family. He also offered to make a settlement by offering a horse but this was refused. Remember, cattle and horse stealing was quite common between indigenous peoples. To make compensation, normally the parties would negotiate a settlement. It was unusual punishment for the Indian Affairs or the NWMP to arrest and put on trial a person for such a minor offence. Almighty Voice believed these actions as unjust and discriminatory.

There were many other differences to the stories presented. Between newspaper articles, stage plays and movies such as "Alien Thunder" the myth and the fiction grew.

I believe this book is well worth reading for everyone to decide for themselves, what is truth and what is fiction. Of course, the real story of Almighty Voice is that he is one example of an indigenous man suffering abuse and discrimination by non- indigenous people and government agencies. There is a long history of such injustices and if we are to move forward with reconciliation then all peoples of Canada must learn about the past, understand the indigenous perspective and to begin working together towards a better future.

Following many questions, Bill summed up how Rotarians and Saskatchewan people can work towards reconciliation: Be patient; We need to learn and listen; and We must express the desire to work together. By 2050 half the population of Sask. will be aboriginal so we need to act now! Bob Devrome thanked Bill for his presentation.
