PROGRAM



Jim Blackburn provided the introduction for President Peter. Peter Stoicheff was born in Ottawa, obtained an undergraduate degree from Queen's University in 1978 and did his Master's and PhD (1983) in English literature at the University of Toronto

Peter came to the U of S in 1986, became Dean of Arts and Science in 2011 and was appointed the 11th President of the University in 2015.

Peter is an accomplished guitarist having recorded two albums(CDs?) and jammed with Jim Gillis while they were both students at Queens.

Peter began by reflecting on all of his previous positive interactions with the Rotary clubs in Saskatoon and

particularly with the Nutana Club.

Several years ago the University developed the motto"To be the University the world needs.' This is not a boast but rather a direction to the University to determine what the world needs from the University.

Pandemic Response

The policy is that everyone needs a vaccine passport and be masked when on campus. Compliance rate is 99%. Omicron delayed the start of in-person classes in January, it is hoped in-person classes will begin on February 7.

VIDO

VIDO has developed two vaccines, one of which is in phase 2 testing in Africa. It is close to completing a level 4 containment facility which is the highest grade of containment. This will allow VIDO to work with the most virulent infections known. VIDO is also working toward completing a manufacturing facility for vaccines, something which is lacking in Canada.

Post Pandemic University Projects

Discussions with all stakeholders has shown that the University is:

1) Excelling in remote program delivery but should persue more remote teaching world wide.

2) Formalize differing work arrangements and develop more opportunites for use of these arrangements

3) Offer different kinds of credentials other than degree, masters and doctorate. The nature of work changes rapidly and the need for different credentials has to match the pace of change.

4) The science is in place for the development of vaccines but the humanities has to match the pace of change of the sciences to react quickly to pandemics.

Future of Indiginous Peoples

U of S is and has been one of the leading Canadian universities in the accomodation of indiginous peoples and studies. 17% of enrollment self identify as indiginous, about the same as the indiginous population in Saskatchewan.

Relationships with Others

The University has developed MOU with numerous organizations including th City of Saskatoon, Waneskewin and arts institutions.

Research

In 2021 the University received \$300 million in research grants, the highest amount in the University's history. The institution is rated in the top 100 research universities in the world.

On behalf of the club Bob MacGillivray thanked Peter for his informative presentation.
