PROGRAM

Nuru introduced our speaker Kirsten Thoms.



Kirsten has B.A. from the U of S and a B. Social Work from the U of Regina. She has worked for Quint Developments for 18 years. Currently she is their Executive Director.

In 1995 residents and Community Association representatives of the five west side core neighbourhoods met and learned about Community Economic Development (CED). Quint Development Corp. was incorporated (Quint is the Latin word for five and it signified the partnership of the five core neighbourhoods.)

The core communities face disproportionate challenges in every area and we believe that a CED approach has the potential to enable our communities to regain autonomy over their day-to-day lives, take pride in their contributions, and create an environment where local, social needs take precedence over distant, corporate needs.

Quint is known primarily for its housing programs. Since its inception Quint has built or renovated 233 housing units and own 94 rental units. In addition to conventional housing Quint has built Pleasant Hill Place and the Youth Lodge.

Pleasant Hill Place is a supportive transitional home for mothers and children. Women who live at Pleasant Hill Place are either close to losing custody of their children or have lost custody of their children and are working towards the reunification of their family.

The Youth Lodge is a safe and supportive transitional home for male-identified youth who are at risk of homelessness or who face housing instability.

This is a voluntary program for youth aged 16-21. You must be involved with the Ministry of Social Services or have a Young Offender caseworker in order to qualify for the Youth Lodge.

Quint has also developed social enterprises to help youth develop occupational and life skills, Build Up Saskatoon and SWEEP.

As a non-profit social enterprise operated by Quint, Build Up Saskatoon is structured to maximize the social benefit of their services. The program offers social benefit to the community by mentoring and employing individuals who face conventional barriers to employment such as limited work experience and experience with the criminal justice system. Build Up Saskatoon provides consistent employment to crew members through a variety of residential projects in Saskatoon and Quint is looking at additional ways to grow and expand the construction program

Saskatoon Wellbeing Employment Enterprise Program (SWEEP) is a collaborative initiative aimed at improving safety and well-being through **Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design.** Our services are centred around urban maintenance and neighbourhood revitalization. SWEEP employs community members exiting corrections and/or facing complex barriers to successfully joining the workforce. In addition to stable employment, members of the SWEEP crew receive life skills training and wraparound support from finding housing to reconnecting with family and navigating parole.
