This Week's Program Highlights

Chair – Lorne Braithwaite opened the meeting by thanking everyone for signing on, welcoming our guest Jackie Bantle and acknowledging that we are meeting on Treaty 6 land and home of the Metis'.

Music – The 4 Way Test song was led on the keyboard and vocally by Betty Ann.

Program -Vegetable Growing in Saskatchewan

Joe Dierker introduced Jackie Bantle.AgBio Greenhouse and Hort Field Plots Manager, U of S. Jackie Bantle BEd, BSA (Horticulture major) has been working in horticulture at the University of Saskatchewan for the last 26 years. With 15 years of vegetable research experience and 10 years managing the USask Agriculture Greenhouse. Jackie is most famous for being a native of Cudworth.

Jackies presentation was entitled "Growing Vegetables in Saskatchewan, Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow". The indigenous population grew and harvested the native plants for survival and were self sufficient. One of their staples was Jerusalem Artichoke. When the settlers arrived the indigenous people and the settlers



shared their vegetable growing knowledge to the benefit of both peoples. The only commercial vegetable growing activity in the early days was people selling vegetables that were surplus to their needs.

Formal market gardening began in Saskatchewan with several having their own onsite stores. Commercial vegetable gardening began in Saskatchewan in the early 70's. Some growers have been very successful through hard work and the assistance of retailers who emphasized buying locally produced goods.

Saskatchewan has a very small land base devoted to vegetable crops compared to other provinces. In fact Sk barely edges out NL for land area devoted to commercial vegetable production. Saskatchewan has disadvantages for people trying to get into the vegetable crop business but there is a large potential for ambitious people to be successful.

The U of S has had a role in nurturing an industry in Saskatchewan and will continue to do so but research funding is difficult to acquire. In the short term U of S horticultural research is going in a different direction other than vegetable production.

In the future vegetable production will come from rooftops, small urban plots, tunnels and hydroponics. Some initiatives in the area of northern food security are underway in LaLoche and other northern communities.

Jim Blackburn thanked Jackie on behalf of the club for an excellent presentation.

Cheer Captain – Ravi Chibbar quizzed the assembly about Saskatchewan in 1905 with respect to the governing party, number of seats and other ephemera. The group paid out lots of \$, not many history scholars in the club.
