Program November 23, 2009 by Joy Adams Bauer

President Bernie introduced our guest speaker Dr. Wilf Keller, President and CEO of Genome Prairie. Wilf has spent the majority of his career working and researching in the area of plant biotechnology and research. He spent many years working with a top team of scientists at the National Research Council and won the Rotary Golden Wheel Award for Science and Technology a few years ago.

Wilf began by explaining that genomics is all about biology and economics. The discovery of the DNA molecule was the beginning of modern biology. Scientists and researchers have gained a critical mass of information about biology in the past 50 years. We've seen improvements in instrumentation, sequencing DNA, microchips and analyzing materials. Sequencing the first human genome was key. This sequencing is becoming less and less expensive to do.

What does this all mean in a practical sense? What are the applications in the day to day world in which we live? One example is canola, which has been transformed into a major food crop. Advanced genetics are used to improve the crop. The field of health is also being revolutionized. Identifying marker genes for certain types of cancer will lead to personalized medicine (specific treatment protocols based on the patient's genetics) and its accompanying ethical questions.

Wilf predicts that it won't take long for a whole new set of industries to develop. In 20 years there will be a total transformation of the life-sciences industry. This will mean great opportunities for Saskatchewan. Our province needs to develop the environment to create new companies that will provide specialized services. Wilf closed by extending an invitation to come and visit Prairie Genome to any members who are interested.

What does it cost?

Grades 7, 8 and 9 - \$250 \$US per year (\$260 CDN) Grades 10, 11, 12 - \$300 \$US per year (\$321 CDN) University - \$350 US per year ((\$375 CDN)

How can I get involved?

All you have to do is choose a level of support, make your cheque out to "the Rotary Charitable Trust" and give it to Joy Adams Bauer. Our Rotarian contacts in Puerto Vallarta will take care of getting your contact information to the student you will be sponsoring. You will then receive personal updates from your student.
