Program April 19, 2010

Police Chief Clive Weighill began by thanking the Rotarians for the work that they have been doing in the community in Saskatoon, especially for the Badge, Shield, and Star Dinner and the RAP Program that is a continued success. Chief Wieghill laid out his presentation in three main points: Crime, the Police Plane, and Tasers (Conductive Energy Devices). His comments were as follows:

<u>Crime in Saskatoon</u> - There has been real progress in Saskatoon as of late with robberies being down approximately 35% in the last three years. He also noted that armed robberies were down approximately 34% and assault being down 10% in the same time period. These are very good numbers

given that the City continues to grow and more and more people are coming to the City that would usually attract some elements of crime.

Chief Weighill indicated that he was recently on the John Gormley show speaking about the perception of crime on 22^{nd} Street. The Chief noted that there were 190 stabbings in Saskatoon last year, only 9 of which were on 22^{nd} . Generally the issues that drive crime are still the big issues in Saskatoon and they are not just on 22^{nd} . We are going in the right direction with the crime stats and Saskatoon is generally a great, safe to live in.

The Police Plane - The Plane has a new muffler which will keep it quiet in the sky and curb the number of noise complaints about the Plane. The muffler came from Germany and cost approximately \$8000. The Plane also received a \$300,000 infrared camera from SGI that will allow the Plane to fly 2000 feet higher and still track the bad guys. Using the Plane, officers can co-ordinate with ground and close the circle on the criminals while being able to see exactly where they are running to by tracing the heat image with the infrared camera. The Plane is also used to patrol North end industrial compounds to make sure inventory is not being stolen. The Plane is a very good value and is used approximately 800 hours per year with the piloting officers being used as regular officers when they are not in the sky.

<u>Tasers</u> - Chief Weighill also referred to these as Conductive Energy Devices. There is currently a lot of controversy about the use of Tasers given the recent media attention with the RCMP. The RCMP are able to use Tasers but the Saskatchewan Police Commission has not yet cleared their use by Saskatchewan's municipal police forces. In terms of where they would fall on the use of force continuum, these devices would be fall right under a gun on the lethal force scale. Their use would be highly regulated and the successful or unsuccessful use would have to be reported on. The Chief would like to see them as a use of force option for the police officers in Saskatchewan.

Other comments:

Chief Weighill mentioned that a CrimeStoppers tip lead to the charging of an individual in the Bob Florence assault case. Good Police work following this tip tracked the fellow down to his house and the charges were subsequently laid.

The new police station has approval for 91 Million dollars and should be completed by 2013. The requests for bidders are being secured now and

construction should start in the near future once all the paperwork is in place and the contractors are secured. The police service currently spends approximately 1 Million dollars leasing space so the new police station would be a way to save this expense.

Graffitti is down 45-50%. One Officer is dedicated full time to dealing with "taggers" and there are protocols in place to paint over any tags shortly after they appear. This is discouraging to the taggers as their hard work is wiped over immediately.

Chief Weighill would like to see Provincial legislation put in place to prevent people from carrying street weapons such as kinives, machetes, and swords. The power would be to seize the weapon without laying charges against the person carrying the weapon and would allow for a procedure to get that item back if it was not intended for a nefarious purpose. As it currently stands, there is nothing wrong with a person carrying a sword down the street so long as it is not concealed!

There are currently 5-6 gangs operating in Saskatoon with approximately 20-30 members in each. They mostly fight amongst themselves over drugs and other criminal issues. The best way to deal with them is through drug enforcement techniques.
