Program - May 9 and 16, 2011

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First Nations in the 21st Century with a Focus on Education (May 9)

Peter Zakrreski introduced Mervin Brass, Director of Communications for the Federation of Saskatchewan Indian Nations (FSIN). Mr. Brass is a member of the Key First Nation. About 200 people live on the reserve and another 1,000 members of the band live off reserve. Mervin's father served as Chief and his mother was an education officer. Mervin first attended Norquay School with about a dozen other First Nations students. By Grade 7 they were down to 4 students, by Grade 10 there were 2, and by Grade 12 Mervin was the only First Nations

care, guit school, or ended up in trouble with the law. One student tragically died by suicide.

How did Mervin get through? Both of his parents were abused in residential school and Mervin attended the hearings and heard their testimony about physical and sexual abuse. His parents vowed that their children would not attend residential school and pushed them hard to go through regular school and finish their education.

What to do after high school? Mervin played guitar and had a dream of becoming a rock star so he went to music school. Eventually a hard life of substance abuse caught up with him and in 1989 he decided to get clean and sober. He discovered journalism and got his Bachelor of Journalism degree from the University of Regina. There were no other First Nations students in his class and he realized he had found his passion. Mervin credits his successful career to date to the help of many mentors along the way. He has been able to take advantage of many opportunities. In 2000 Rawlco Radio asked him to move to Saskatoon. He realized he had become a true Saskatonian when he attended a hockey game between the Saskatoon Blades and the Regina Pats and he didn't cheer when the Pats scored, but when the Blades scored!

To date there are still very few First Nations students graduating and exploring further education. We must lower their social dependency and increase the Aboriginal work force. First Nations and Métis people are the fastest growing population in Saskatchewan and they need education and training.

Mervin Brass knew he wanted to give something back to his community and felt he could do so through politics which is why he works for the FSIN today. He takes every opportunity to speak to school groups as he believes it takes a community to raise a child. He sees a need to get kids out of gangs through sports, education and mentorship. His key to success was that whenever he was interviewed for a job, he always insisted that he be hired for his skills, and not because he was Aboriginal. Mervin believes businesses must prepare themselves for the changing demographics and can do so by understanding some basics about Aboriginal culture. For example, if an aunt dies, he would need to take 3 days off because aunts are like mothers in his culture.

Mervin ended his talk by suggesting that education for First Nations people is getting better, but not fast enough. Everybody with a stake in the future of our province must do his/her part. The FSIN sees the importance of education but we also need the full support of the private sector. Mervin left us with this quote -- "I owe everything I have today to education."

Our Rotary Exchange Student from Germany (May 16)

Johnathan Berg, our exchange student gave a presentation on his country complete with many interesting photographs. He lives in Bad Homburg, a city of 52,000 people close to Frankfurt. The "Bad" in the name refers to the many fresh water fountains found throughout the city. Germany has a population of 82 million and is part of the European Union. Chancellor Angela Merkel is the first female chancellor in Germany's history. There are five political parties and the country is always run by a coalition government.

Johnathan thinks that Canadians are very slow drivers. He is used to the famous autobahn were people drive 140 kilometres an hour! He has two sisters and two step-brothers and lives with his mother. His grandparents live close by and he regularly enjoys his grandmother's baking. His older sister went on a Rotary exchange to Ecuador last year. His family recently hosted three Rotary exchange students. Johnathan speaks English very well and told us that it is

mandatory to take English at school in Germany. He also took Latin for six years!

While in Saskatoon he attends Grade 11 at Walter Murray Collegiate. His classes have included drama, photography, math, history, theatre arts, graphic arts, aviation and English. He enjoys playing soccer on the Walter Murray soccer team.
