Prostate Cancer

Kevin Wilson introduced Dr. Larry Taranger, noted neurologist and renowned surgeon. Dr. Taranger gave a very thorough overview of prostate cancer, the most common cancer in men.

By age 50, 50% of men present with low levels of cancer cells in their prostate. By age 80 that percentage rises to 80%. One in seven men will experience prostate cancer in their lifetime, and one in 27 will die from it. However, the survival rate of 95% is very good, compared to only 13% for lung cancer. Screening and early detection is key.

There is no consensus on the optimum form of treatment for the early detection of prostate cancer. Treatment options include:

- radical removal of the prostate
- radiotherapy
- brachytherapy (using radioactive seeds inserted into the prostate)
- watchful waiting (typically for those with a life expectancy of less than 10 years)
- active surveillance (for those with minimal low risk prostate cancer)
- hormonal therapy

Prostate cancer is most prevalent in men with African heritage. White males have a medium risk and Asian males have a low risk.
