PROGRAM - SCYAP - Darrell Lechman - December 9th, 2013

Saskatoon Community Youth Arts Programming ("SCYAP")

Rotarian and SCYAP boardmember Bev introduced executive director Darrell Lechman, to speak about this unique program. Darrell is a former penetentiary officer at Stoney Mountain and developed an art program as a rehabilitative aid for convicts. Darrell stated that "Art can be a healer only if relations are built with a network of helping folks". SCYAP participants are also available for commercial contracts as a means of fund raising for the program. The SCYAP painted mural at St. Paul's hospital is the largest in the city. Darrell read a heartfelt thank you letter from the parent of a girl in the SCYAP urban campus project, who indicated the program "....gave her back her love for life." The girl is now a recent grad at the U of S!

Further information from the SCYAP website summarizes the program:

SCYAP was established in 2001 to offer visual and graphic arts training and activities to youth at risk in the Saskatoon area at no cost; provide a safe, supportive space dedicated to the arts that welcomes and nurtures youth; and involve current and former program participants in collaborative visual arts activities with the larger community.





About The Salvation Army Bethany Home & Mumford House

Bethany Home

Bethany Home is a transitional program for girls ages 13 – 18 years who are at risk in their own homes or in the community and are referred to Bethany by their Family Service Worker. The girls can stay for a period of 3 or 4 months while their worker creates a plan for them to return home or move on to a long term program. They may come to the home with addictions to drugs or alcohol, or have been abused sexually or physically and they are often experiencing difficulty in school and may have been involved in illegal activities. Some are connected to gangs or being targeted by gangs. At the Home they have the opportunity to learn to make healthy choices and how to deal with conflict / crisis situations.

The girls are expected to participate in school while they reside at Bethany Home or a program of equal value and they are encouraged to be involved in extracurricular activities such as soccer, dance, music etc. Spiritual Care Programming and Art Therapy are provided twice a week and we always make every effort to address cultural needs of the residents of the home.

Mumford House

As the need for help in our community has grown, so has the need for shelter beds for women and children. Mumford House is a 36 bed shelter for women and their children who need a safe place to call home while they look for safe and sustainable longer term housing. The staff are able to assist with finding funding and housing resources and other personal needs such as clothing, personal hygiene items etc.
