Meeting Highlights from the Club Assembly December 30th, 2013 (Thanks to Bernie for his note taking):

Member discussion - Future of the Saskatoon Rotary Club

Comments:

While the attendance was small given the time of year, the discussion was of a serious nature and clearly needs to be continued to gather more input and ideas from the members

President's questions/issues to the Club:

- o How do we maintain our club in the face of demographics, member decline over the years and increasing competition?
- o Threat of eventual charter revocation is real for clubs who cannot reverse serious declining trends

Ideas and issues discussed included the following:

- o Cost of membership may be an issue for many members
- o Should we become a breakfast club?
- o Large number of worthy but resource consuming projects may be an issue BECAS, Shelterbox, African projects, RAPP etc.
- o Probus is competiing for potential members less commitment, less cost, less attendance pressure

Other matters/issues raised by members present:

- o Parking availability/cost
- o Club has been successful in attracting membership that is now more diverse originally the downtown business crowd was the focus
- o 5 clubs in city is this potentially too many?
- o Highest cost among Saskatoon clubs for lunch plus parking
- o \$7 charge too much for coffee/dessert attendees a subsidy, in effect, to full members

o Equipment rental costs are an issue

Concluding comments:

- Current roster is 62 fewer now than ever
- Committee has been struck to review location options not limited to down town locations
- Is a survey of members needed?
- Viable club needs involvement of members in club activities/projects
- BSS dinner should be more of a Rotary event now a project-oriented event attendees should include Mayor, Police Chief, UofS President, etc.

PROGRAM - Member Al Morton - "A Tip of the Hat" - January 6th, 2014 Posted by Graham Pearson PH on Jan 06, 2014

"A Tip of the Hat"

Upon an urgent request by President Peter, our member Al Morton prepared a fascinating presentation literally (or figuratively) at the "drop of a hat"!

Al is a long time hat aficionado and entertained us with the contemporary history of the men's hat and hat etiquette. He assured us he was not just "talking through his hat".

Prior to the early 50's a man would no sconer go out without a hat, than he would without socks. Some say it was a young JFK that changed the trend in men's wear to abandon the hat, but Al is pleased to report a recent revival in hat wearing among young men.

Notable hat terms include "hang on to your hat", "old hat", "keep under your hat", "take your hat off to...", and of course "Mad as a hatter", the latter coming from the early making of felt hats using mercury nitrate.

Hat materials can include wool, wool felt or the most expensive, fur felt. The two most popular styles are the Fedora and the Trilby. The Fedora has a two and a half inch brim and is named after a popular french play. The Trilby, developed in 1895 has a shorter brim (think Frank Sinatra) and was named after another play popular in that period. Both styles were originally worn by women.

Other styles include the Alpine hat, Bowler hats worn up to the end of the first WW, and the Homburg worn by Winston Churchhill.

Al showed us his collection including a beautiful Alpine hat with a corded band and a brush, made by Biltmore Hats of Guelph. Biltmore, now sold and moved to the US, invented the "Hat trick" term, sponsoring a Guelph hockey team and giving a new hat to any player with three goals!

Mississippi gamblers popularized the "wide awake" hat with a wide brim. Canadian Tilley hats where invented by a yachtman, made out of sailcloth and designed to float. Our Canadian armed forces are now outfitted with Tilley hats.

Australians have the outback hat made of steer hide, and the North American cowboy hat is known to have characteristic creases unique to the origins of the wearer.

Al then explained hat etiquette. When doffing your hat, hold the crown away. "Doffal" is an old English term referring to a raising of the visor by a Knight, which in turn gave rise to the military salute. When tipping your hat you raise the brim. You "doff" with the ladies if the conversation with them will be longer than a quick greeting on the street, otherwise one only "tips". Of note, Wayne, John and the writer collectively failed this last test after the meeting as we all stood outside the Bess and forgot to "tip" as a female acquaintance went by!!

One may leave on a hat in a lobby, elevator or building, but it should be removed in a more private setting like a restaurant.

Al ended his presentation with the Dunn and Co. hat manufacturer's company slogan "if you want to get ahead, get a hat", and then agreed to pose with this motley crew of mad hatters from the club. Thanks Al for a most "cap"-tivating presentation.
