Program

Laura Gawletz and Alma Dirpaul provided members with information on the Jim Pattison Children's Hospital. Laura is the Philanthropy and Stewardship Manager. Alma works in the operating room for the Children's Hospital.

Anne has 35 years experience and over 20 in surgery. They repair web fingers, removal of birth marks by new laser, hip and leg issues, abdominal surgeries; cross eye repair, lazer for premature, dental surgeries, specialized airway surgery, and many more options. Children's surgery is different. Previously they were in the same large room and had to walk. There is a lot of noise.

Now they walk into a specialized small room with TV and wifi. They are given their own room, were they go for recovery. They wait in this room until the surgery. Their parents can walk to them a small waiting room, where they are given the final interview and check with them and their parent. They then go into the operating room, where the parents can see them right up to the operating table.

There are TVs in the operating room, and they use this to relax the child.

The can change the room to meet the needs of the child – dim lights, quiet, etc.

The instruments wear and tear. They need to be cleaned. They are delicate. Replacement of them is expensive. Some small item can be very expensive.

Laura works with the Foundation. She has been there 5 years.

Children come from across the province to the hospital.

Saskatchewan was one of 2 provinces without a children's hospital. The mission of the Foundation is to inspire philanthropy.

Now that it is up and running, the question is: What is the next step and new directions for the future and areas

They 80, 376 visits from babies and children annually. There were 29000 visits to Pediatric Emergency.

The care is expanded through new equipment and research on treatment techniques and approaches.

650+ pediatric intensive care stays and 770+ pediatric and NCU transport cases. About 52.6% or children are outside of Saskatoon.

The induction room (discussed above) allows families to be as close to the surgery as possible. The surgical suites are the only pediatric ones in the province. They are able to move the heavy equipment to where it is needed. They are on large tacks in the ceiling. It is designed to allow specialists to see the patient with minimum risk of contamination.

3967 pediatric surgeries annually.

The child can choose the colour of the lights. It gives them some degree of control at a time when everything is out of their control. There are pull out beds that allow the parents to stay overnight.

Impact of donors:

- Advanced technology and equipment
- Family centred provincial programming
- Innovative and ground breaking reserch

One of the equipment is the De Soutter Pediatric Por Saw CSO that is small and quiet for removal of castes. It is much less scary for the kids as opposed to the large and noisy saws.

They have the Kids Play zone where there is technology and focused on play. There is not therapy in this area. There are games etc. – both regular and technical. They can do a simulation of a procedure, which eases the process and reduces need for anesthesia, etc.

Laura offered the club the opportunity to do a tour of the hospital.
