Letter from the President

Many years ago I belonged to a tea club that met Tuesday to Thursday at 9.45 PM. As Seminarians, we talked about many subjects late into the night, with the authority of God's ambassadors. How, we thought, could such unvarnished, holy truths, be rejected by the world; there was no other explanation for this refusal to believe but willful blindness and sin! Later, the study of Philosophy taught me to speak less frequently, to say less, to be more thoughtful, and to contemplate the fact, that, the things that I consider to be most profound truths could, indeed, be false, even fanciful, not only to others but in themselves. People have the right to disagree, without being rude, even if they can't articulate the reasons for that disagreement. As the saying goes: "You may take the horse to the trough but you cannot make it drink." Something else is at work in the human condition—call it determinism, if you like—and that sense of independent determination, is not just stubbornness, it could save the horse from drinking polluted water.

We don't expect our political leaders to give us polluted water to drink, and they try hard not to do that to the public at large, but that does not prevent them from feeding us polluted ideas with messianic passion. We encourage them. We crave strong, charismatic personalities; we sometimes throw caution to the wind and follow blindly, sometimes over a precipice. Take for example three countries that have been dominating the headlines this past week: North Korea, Syria and the United Kingdom. What is the common theme of their notoriety in the news? The one is an unbending leader, barking in his corner like a frightened Yorkshire terrier, threatening nuclear annihilation; the other is actually bombing hungry citizens as they queue up to buy bread to feed their hungry families, and the third, the iron lady, as she liked to be called, sparked protests even in death. These strong leaders, and many others like them, have not brought permanent peace to their people. They have contributed more hunger, more devastating destruction, and more in abiding anger and resentment than to any lasting peace.

As Rotarians we can do a great deal of good in the world without the allure of power, but we do not possess the definitive solutions to the problems of the world. Rotarians need to be careful to listen before speaking; to weep silently before laughing out loud; to ask simple questions before acting; to respect the dignity and potential of others before dismissing their efforts, to help others before helping themselves. Remembering always that our strong convictions and clear vision do not make us infallible or absolves us from the hurt we cause by our enthusiasm. Perhaps we need to realize that we may offer service but we cannot guarantee that peace will come through service.

H.I. has a mandate hunger and poverty in the world in a sustainable manner through agricultural and animal husbandry programs. Established in 1944, now in 13 countries, assisted over 1 million families. HI, like Rotary, do project based community work. The organization is a firm believer in "passing the gift" – when a community receives an animal, the 1st born animal is passed on to another community. If the community receives agriculture help, seeds and knowledge are passed on to another.

HI works internationally and also locally. They have projects in Manitoba, Ontario, Sask. Alberta and BC with the Canadian head office in Saskatoon. Canadian budget is \$1 million, dependent upon donations.

Some of the current projects are:

- 1) Growing local food for sustainable livelihood in Northern Manitoba in inaccessible communities with high unemployment, poor access to fresh produce and small populations. 5 different projects in 5 different communities.
- 2) Urban Toronto Black Creek Community Form an area with high poverty, large immigrant/refugee population. Intended to develop a new generation of farmers using urban intensive agriculture.
- 3) Ghana a 5 year project to provide food security and improved nutrition to 15,000 families. Promote gender equity, micro-credit to women, education on HIV/AIDS. Establish Shea mills to provide value added and better product with less labour.
- Haiti REACH \$The 18 Million project to develop rural agriculture entrepreneurs. Goals are to provide long term sustained recovery with family run breeding centers, improved livestock breeds, improving Haitian soil and work to develop disaster preparedness.
