## Letter from the President

Most informed commentators seem to be skeptical about the federal government's grand gesture of appointing an ambassador for religious freedom. That is not surprising seeing that politicians tend to have their own best interest at heart, even when they are championing the causes of others. I was taught to believe that William Wilberforce (a saint in politics), was against slavery, but my later research revealed that when the bill came up in the house of commons for the abolition of slavery he voted against it. Wilberforce was against the slave trade—unworthy of Englishmen, not slavery. Far from abolishing slavery he thought the plantation owners should breed them!

Who would argue against the freedom of religion? Certainly not any one on this side of the Atlantic who shares the history of persecuted Christians in Europe that found freedom to worship in the new world. Even if some of their expressions of religion are anomalous in today's secular society, nevertheless, their freedom to worship is protected by the law of the land. But one group's freedom to worship should not infringe upon the rights of another. We have often seen those with newfound freedoms impose their will upon others who do not share their philosophy, political opinions or religious convictions.

In addition to the freedom of religion we need to cherish human rights. Indeed if we concentrate upon human rights, religious freedom will take care of its self. So why neglect human rights or even promote policies that undermine the groups and organizations that work so hard to establish human rights around the world. Perhaps it is not glamorous enough, and it brings little opportunities for photo ops and the promotion of public relations. PR seems to be more important to some politicians than human rights. As Rotarians, we are not in the house of the skeptics, but we are entitled to ask: is this fair to all concerned?

His Worship Mayor Donald Atchison was first elected to City Council in 1994 and served as councillor up to his election as Mayor in 2003. He was re-elected as Mayor in 2006, in 2009 and again in 2012.

Growing up in Saskatoon, "Atch" was involved in a variety of activities including church and school groups, piano lessons and volunteer work with his family. Most of all, he loved sports, where his talent as a hockey goaltender led to playing in the professional leagues. After hockey, he returned to Saskatoon and his family's retail business. He and his wife Mardele raised their five children in Saskatoon, carrying on the values of their parents and community.

His Worship considers Saskatoon a 21st Century City uses this premise for looking into the future when considering the direction Saskatoon should be embarking upon. There are those who consider Saskatoon in a "boom" time but our Mayor considers us in a period of economic growth. We are a city of diversified resources which include but are not limited by mining, the U of S and the international activities going on in our city. He firmly believes that our city will eventually grow to a population of one million people. Much has been said about areas such as Riverside as the inner city or core areas. His worship believes these areas should be considered as historic areas. There is a grand vision for the 254 acre of the city currently regarded as the city yards. This would include a central heating and garbage collection system for the whole area. It would contain 10 % of our total cities population in the center of Saskatoon. As for more immediate concerns is the allocation of 25 million towards fixing potholes over the next four years and the allocation of an additional 800,000 towards snow removal. Also noted was the relationship developed with Sask. Correctional Institute addressing landscaping maintenance and development programs.

On behalf of the Club, Paul thanked the Mayor for sharing his time with us at today's meeting, for his vision and leadership, and for getting reelected.

#### Dear Rotarian:

We are pleased to share that today, on Rotary's 108th anniversary, it was announced at the Vancouver Peace Forum that Canadian Rotarians have raised over \$1.6 million for the Pennies for Polio initiative. Thanks to you, we have exceeded our goal of \$1 million. This is a true testament to the continued interest and commitment of Canadian Rotarians to Rotary's priority program. Our funds, as you know, will also be further leveraged by matching funds from the Canadian government and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. By doing this we have ensured vital financial support for global polio eradication activities and we have sent a clear message about the continued commitment of Canadian Rotarians to the goal of a polio free world.

Our government has heard and acknowledged this message. Yesterday, Minister for International Cooperation Julian Fantino and International PolioPlus Committee Chair Bob Scott issued a joint <u>editorial article</u> affirming commitment to the shared goal of a polio free world and today, Minister Fantino announced that the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) will match all contributions received above the original \$1 million ceiling by Rotarians through the 1 March 2013 deadline. The Gates Foundation has also agreed to continue their match of funds donated by Canadian Rotarians. Based on the \$1.6 million in contributions are aware of to date, this already means a total of \$4.8 million in additional funding for the Global Polio Eradication Initiative.

We have one week remaining where every dollar you contribute will be matched by an additional \$2. We would encourage you to consider making an additional contribution to PolioPlus in honor of Rotary's Anniversary prior to 1 March 2013. We are planning to announce a preliminary figure for funds raised by Rotarians through 1 March to Minister Fantino when he attends the Toronto Peace Symposium on 2 March 2013.

We thank you for so clearly demonstrating the unwavering commitment of Canadian Rotarians to global polio eradication and hope you will take advantage of this unique opportunity to leverage your investment in a polio free world. We also encourage you to express your appreciation for Canada's continued collaboration with Rotary as highlighted by the extension of this match to your Member of Parliament.

Many thanks for your continued support and collaboration to END POLIO NOW!
