PROGRAM



John Dawes was invited to introduce our Guest Speaker Todd MacPherson, Saskatchewan Managing Director of Parkinson Canada a role he has held for just over 2 years. Todd was "personally trained by John C. Maxwell and his international team" and is an experienced leader and coach.

From John's introduction and from Todd, we learned many things about Parkinson Disease. It was first written about by Dr. James Parkinson who was, "....most famous for his 1817 work, Essay on the Shaking Palsy, a description of the disease which later became known as Parkinson's Disease". Todd referred to Parkinson's as a devastating neuro-degenerative disease. It is most

challenging for the person with the disease and heart breaking for the

family. The way people deal with it best, is to "live with hope" which Todd suggested is a foundational approach taken by many with the disease. We learned,

- "Each day in Canada 25 people are diagnosed with Parkinson's and by 2031 this number will increase to 50.
- Parkinson's has the third highest direct healthcare cost annually next to Epilepsy and Alzheimer's and Other Dementias."



- Professional "…tracking notes that people living with *Parkinson's have the 2nd highest annual out-of-pocket expenses at \$1,000.00 next to patients with spinal cord injury.*
- The Parkinson's community is directly affected by cognitive impairment and dementia: 40% of people with Parkinson's disease experience thinking and problem solving limitations; and, 50% experience memory limitations.
- Parkinson's disease is not a normal part of aging but the incidence does increase with age. 85% of those diagnosed with Parkinson's are over the age of 65.
- Care giver stress doubles when caring for individuals living with neurological conditions. This is compounded if the condition is accompanied by cognitive impairment or behavioural issues, which affects the majority of people living with Parkinson's.
- Individuals who develop a neurological condition will experience a substantial number of years living with restricted health (mental and physical), more so than those without one. It is projected that both men and women affected by Parkinson's will lose a total of 15 years in full health"

Parkinson Canada has three areas of focus: i) research; ii) Advocacy; and, iii) Education. You can learn more about these components by going to their Website noted below.

COMMENTARY

With only a few exceptions, Margaret and I have attended the annual April *Saskatchewan Prayer Breakfast* held in Regina. It is organized by a committee chaired by the Lieutenant Governor Vaughn Solomon Schofield. Up to 800 people attend this 90 minute breakfast including provincial and civic dignitaries – the latter group, all treating each other in a civil manner.

The Breakfast features a guest speaker who brings what is termed "an inspirational message", and this year was



no exception. This event gathers people from all faith communities in the province and we "breakfast" and embrace the things we have in common, while leaving aside those matters in which we differ. This year's Guest Speaker, Rabbi Jeremy Parnes, a former member of Regina Eastview, which in and of its self makes him outstanding, picked up on this very point. Rabbi Parnes drew an analogy between the struggles of the Jewish people some 3500 years ago and the impact *Habitat for Humanity* has on communities like Regina. Back in their 40 years of "wondering and whining," the people of Israel were continuously in disagreement until they had to work together to build the "temple".

Once they were together on this project, like a group of volunteers gathered for a *Habitat for Humanity* build, nothing else mattered other than successful completion of the project - they (we) worked in harmony. Sounds like Rotary in action – like PolioPlus – like building schools in Guatemala – warms my heart. Suggests to me that more praying and communicating and less shouting and shooting has much to say for itself and our success as a community, province, country and world.
