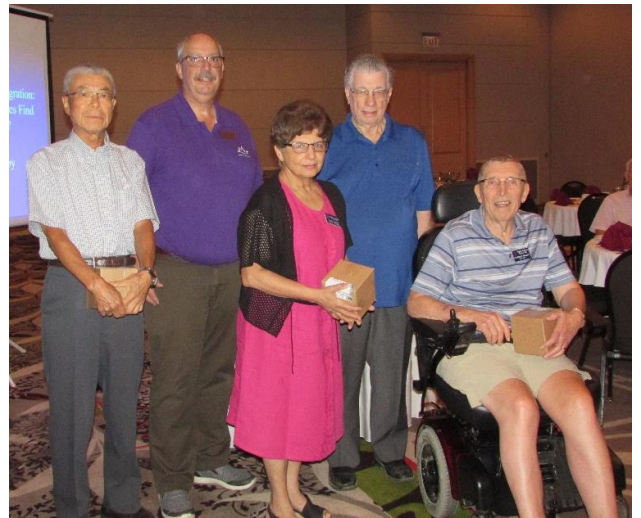

Delivering Rotary Ride 2018 Ripple Effect Funds

On August 14, 2018, Floyd Manz, Peter Neufeldt and Doug Mortin travelled to Melfort by motor-cycle to attend the Rotary Club of Melfort.

We were asked to speak to their club about the ride and the Ripple Effect program and deliver the \$12,242 donated to PDG Brian Cocks, Treasurer for D5550 World Community Service and the Ripple Effect Program. The Melfort club donated an additional \$100, bringing the grand total raised to \$12,342, the best year in our eight year history!

We brought back tax receipts which will be distributed over the next two weeks.

Total distances ridden for this event:

- July 28th – 460 kilometers
- August 14th – 600 kilometers
- Total - 1,060 kilometers

MEMBER RECOGNITION

It is important to recognize our Rotary colleagues for specific and/or special service to and through Rotary. Today this recognition was directed to long-time Rotarian **Shreedhar Jachak** who joined the Rotary Club of Fort Qu'Appelle in 1973 and upon relocating to Regina was invited to join Regina Eastview. It was appropriate that our Club's Assistant Governor Carole Bryant was at the meeting she participated in presenting



Shreedhar with a pin to recognize his 45 years of service through Rotary.



The second Rotarian to be recognized was Jean-Marc Nadeau, who President John called up and presented him with the Vice President's pin. Jean-Marc was not able to attend the Club's June 14th Change-over meeting when the Club's 2018-2019 Leadership Team was presented. Jean-Marc, a Past President of the RC of Portage la Prairie, brings unique professional and Rotary experience to our Club.

PROGRAM

Tania Woroby was invited to introduce her sister Tamara who is our Guest Speaker. In addition to some personal information related to the Woroby's family immigration to Canada from Ukraine after WW II, Tania concentrated on Tamara's professional qualifications and career. This is what we learned. Tamara M. Woroby is Senior Adjunct Professor of Canadian Studies at the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS) and Professor of Economics at Towson University. She holds a PhD in economics, with a specialization in international trade and labor economics, from Queen's University, Canada. She is the author of academic publications and monographs on International

economic issues. Her most recent publications examine the differences in immigrant naturalization rates, and include a commissioned study on refugee resettlement for the European Union, as well as academic works on North America migration, published by Brookings Press and Oxford University Press. She has served as an economic consultant and trainer to the World Bank, the Migration Policy Institute, the European Commission and the Foreign Service Institute of the US Department of State.

Utilizing power point slides, Tamara Woroby titled her presentation, *Canadian and U.S. Immigration: Can increasing Differences Find Common Ground?* Tamara noted there are basically two ways to get into Canada, i) Permanent Admission, which in Canada can occur through a Provincial Nomination program (which pick up 25% of permanent admissions to Canada.



There are three categories of Permanent Admission – Economic Class; Family Reunification; and, Refugees which tend to divide into resettlement and Asylum seekers (which has become a more recent phenomena in Canada – it is a process that moves from “visitor” to “asylum”); or, ii) Temporary and Adjusted, which allows access to foreign students and Temporary Workers. Tamara’s pie chart demonstrated the unique differences between Canada and the USA in terms of immigration patterns. Canadian immigration is 70 % “economic” and the remainder shared between “family” and “refugees”; where in the USA 70% comes from “families” and the remainder split between “refugees” and “economics” with a small percentage based on something referred to as “lottery”.

“Illegal” immigration into the USA is estimated to be 11.2 million individuals, who make up 4% of the population and 5% of the workforce. 28% are born in the U.S. and are “undocumented”, and 60% are VISA “over-stayers”, which raises the question as to whether a “wall” is required, as the people are already inside the USA. Where in the 6 year period (2010- 2016) the annual number of “undocumented immigrants” into Canada is 0, the number into the U.S is 400,000.

Canadian immigration policy a model:

1. Flexible and Transparent
2. Responsive to public dialogue and academic input
3. Since 2008/2010 number of reforms
4. Full power with Minister of Immigration yet decentralization (role of provinces)
5. So far - highly managed and ‘successful’ system

Tamara provided considerable detailed information in comparing the U.S. process and that which is in place in Canada and concluded with this slide. She suggested that the Canadian system is a unique model which allows decisions to be made at the Ministerial level, thus removing from political debate and the potential of inaction.

Tamara Woroby’s presentation was a “learned and researched” glimpse of an important topic of conversation around the world. We in Regina Eastview were most fortunate to have been provided with this experience.

President John thanked Tamara for her presentation and presented her with one of those much sought after insulated grocery bags – PP Greg took the opportunity to expand on the useful characteristics of the bag in what he thought was a private conversation – Ha!

Sushil Kumar Gupta selected to be 2020-21 Rotary president By Teresa Schmedding

Sushil Kumar Gupta, of the Rotary Club of Delhi Midwest, Delhi, India, is the selection of the Nominating Committee for President of Rotary International for 2020-21. He will be declared the president-nominee on 1 October if no challenging candidates have been suggested.

Gupta wants to increase Rotary’s humanitarian impact as well as the diversity of its membership.

“As individuals, we can only do so much,” Gupta said in a statement. “But when 1.2 million Rotarians work together, there is no limit to what we can achieve, and in the process, we can truly change the world.”



Gupta has been a Rotarian since 1977 and has served Rotary as district governor, training leader, and resource group adviser, and as a member, vice chair, or chair of several committees.
