

Alda Bouvier, a member of Regina Eastview's Membership Committee was invited to introduce today's program. Alda noted it is the intention of the membership Committee that new and veteran members of the Club be given opportunity to introduce and/or reintroduce themselves to the membership. Today this opportunity was accepted by long term member Clarence Krause and new member Tracey Schick Sparrowhawk.

Clarence indicated that he would just take a few minutes and focus his comments on his involvement with Rotary. Clarence joined Rotary in August

1982, the year Allen Smith was President of the Club. His introduction

to Rotary occurred earlier when the Krause's attended the *Beef on a Bun* fund raiser which was held in concert with Regina Buffalo Days. The fellowship around this event was a great attraction, and while the *Beef on a Bun* was replaced within a short time with selling hamburgers and hot dogs, the fellowship and comradery was maintained as it is with every hands-on event. Involvement in Bingo's was another highlight made so by the great fellowship at Western Pizza after the game.
